# President's Message



Well, we're in the midst of the summer doldrums. Doldrums: it's an interesting word. It comes from the days when sails, and not engines, powered ships across the seas. The doldrums was the name given by sailors to the Intertropical Convergence Zone, the area near the thermal equator where the northeast and the southeast trade winds converge. The skies there are often windless and calm, and so ships could sit there unmoving for days, even weeks, their sails empty and sagging. People then came to use the word doldrums to refer to a state or period of listlessness, inactivity, stagnation and boredom. So,

in summer, when it's hot and the air is stagnant – or perhaps filled with smoke from fires in Canada – we experience the doldrums! This can even happen in worship; and especially in the summer. Perhaps your pastor is away on vacation... maybe you were on a vacation and attended another church, and found that pastor and people to be more enthused... maybe it's hot and stuffy in the church... and during the summer there are usually no special occasions or ceremonies to enliven the worship. It can make you wonder: is anything happening at church?

Listen to your Lord and take to heart what He says, and He will take away your doldrums. One of my favorite Psalms, and one I especially like to read as I settle into my pew and prepare to worship, is Psalm 100.

- <sup>1</sup> Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth! <sup>2</sup> Serve the Lord with gladness! Come into his presence with singing!
- <sup>3</sup> Know that the Lord, he is God! It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.
- <sup>4</sup> Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name! <sup>5</sup> For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

There are no doldrums in this Psalm! Quite the opposite, it proclaims and encourages joy and gladness in worship; and it does so by drawing our focus away from ourselves and to our God.

"Know that the Lord (Yahweh), He is God!" Meditate upon this as you prepare to worship. You are not in the house of One whom you do not know and who does not know you; a stranger whose attitude toward you in unknown and uncertain. Yahweh... I AM – the God who revealed Himself to Moses as the One who saw and knew the sufferings of His people, whose heart went out to them and who came to be with them and deliver them (Exod. 3) – this is the One into whose house we enter to worship! We know Him especially as Jesus, for He often proclaimed Himself to be Yahweh, the God who appeared to Moses and delivered His people.

- ➤ When the 12 disciples were in a boat, struggling to row against the wind, and saw Jesus walking to them on the water and cried out in fear because they thought they were seeing a ghost, He told them, "Take heart; I AM. Do not be afraid." (Matt. 14:27)
- ➤ "Before Abraham was, I AM" He said to His Jewish opponents (John 8:58), and for this they tried to stone Him.
- > "I AM the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die." (John 11:25-26) "I AM the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing." (John 15:5) "When you have lifted up the Son of Man, then you will know that I AM." (John 8:28) When we enter church we are not only entering the house of the eternal Lord; we are entering the house of Him who came to be one with us, our brother in flesh and in faith... who tells us that we can now call God our Father. How wonderful it is to not only know who God is, but to know that He is your Father who receives you graciously and gladly and loves you eternally! "It is He who made us, and we are His; we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture."

And so: "Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name! For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations." These words, as we take them to heart when we enter church, especially remove the doldrums-inspired thoughts, "Will anything happening this morning? Is this worth my time?" The Lord, whose presence we are entering, is good! His love for us is unchanging, and endures forever! And so, although we are sinners (as our worship doldrums themselves reveal!)... although we are at times weak in faith and downcast in spirit... still, our good Lord will receive us! He who gave His Son for us - to die for us "while we were weak," even "sinners... ungodly... and enemies" (Rom. 5:6-10) - will surely bless us with His forgiveness and love, and even come to dwell within us! Jesus pictures this for us with one of His best-known parables, the story of the prodigal son (Luke 15). The doldrums – and far worse than mere boredom and listlessness! were clearly seen in the young man as he returned to his father's house. He trudged along in ragged, worn, and dusty clothes... with no shoes on his feet, his steps slow and hesitant... and with his head down, his heart weighed down by shame and worry. But, when he saw him, his father "felt compassion, and ran and embraced him and kissed him." And he said to his servants, "Bring quickly the best robe, and put it on him, and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet. And bring the fattened calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate. For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found."

Every Sunday in God's house is such a celebration. Your Lord rejoices to be with you and receive you! Keep these words and promises of God before your eyes, in your mind, and in your heart, and your good and gracious Lord will fill you with His joy always!

# **LCMS Synod Convention Update**

The 68th Regular Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod will be held from July 29 to Aug. 3, at the Baird Center in downtown Milwaukee. The convention theme is, "We Preach Christ Crucified," based on 1 Cor. 1:18–25. In a world of uncertainty, the Church's proclamation, mission, and identity remain the same. We preach Christ crucified.

We are blessed to be members of a Church will involves its members in choosing its leaders and deciding its direction and governance. Our Synod meets in convention every 3 years, and voting delegates to the convention are drawn from our congregations. Every Circuit elects a layperson and a pastor to represent the congregations of the Circuit; our District will be sending 5 pastors and 5 laypeople.

The convention will begin with a Communion Service on Saturday, July 29 at 7:00 PM. This Service – as well as the entire convention – will be live-streamed so that you can join in at home. To do so, go to the Synod's website, <a href="www.lcms.org">www.lcms.org</a>. Click on Convention at the top right, then National Convention, then Live Stream Video.

Convention delegates will hear from Lutheran leaders from churches around the world, such as Rev. Dr. Juhana Pohjola, the bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland, and Dr. Päivi Räsänen, a member of this Church and longstanding member of the Finnish parliament. Both were charged by the government with inciting hate speech, stemming from a 2004 booklet written by Dr. Räsänen and published by the Luther Foundation, "As Man and Woman He Created Them: Homosexuality and the Challenge to the Christian Concept of Man." Thanks be to God, they were found not guilty of the charges, although the government is appealing the verdict. Convention delegates will hear from both of them and also be voting on entering into Church fellowship with the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland.

Another important thing the delegates will do is bring forward an offering from our congregations. The purpose and goal of the 2023–2026 LCMS National Offering is to produce meaningful Lutheran resources in other languages. For, God has blessed us with His Word in our native language. Our lives are enriched by all of the English materials and resources that we read each day, especially those that bring to us God's Word.

Not all are so blessed, however. As the church exists throughout the world, so God wants His Gospel to go forth to all people in all languages so that all may read, hear and speak the Good News of Christ crucified. All are invited and encouraged to participate in the National Offering, as the Lord allows, and help share His Word in other languages. Gifts to the National Offering will be accepted through 2026. Congregations can promote the National Offering through instruction sheets and bulletin inserts that are available for free download at lcms.org/convention/national/offering. Any congregation that is unable to use the digital resources is welcome to contact LCMS Mission Advancement to arrange for printed materials to be shipped.

Please keep reelected Pres. Harrison, our convention delegates, advisors, and guests, in your prayers. May God richly bless our Church and strengthen us in proclaiming Christ crucified!
