Greetings to you in the name of Jesus!

On Sunday, June 17 the sermon was about a 19-year-old, Christopher, who died in an accident on a golf course. I was the chaplain who was called to the hospital to give comfort to the family. Many of you have asked for the rest of the story.

I met with the family in a conference room at the hospital while they were waiting to hear about Christopher's status. The father told me how he had found his son pinned between the golf cart and the tractor. At the direction of Christopher, the father had located another piece of equipment to remove the tractor from his son. At that point the physician came in and stated, "I'm very sorry we were not able to save your son. It seems that when the tractor pinned him it dammed the blood flow in his spleen and when the pressure was removed, he died from internal bleeding."

The physician quickly left. He left the conference room and left me with a screaming father. The physician had no idea that it was the father, who move the tractor, which released the pressure from the internal organs. The father pounded on the floor and yelled, "He was not baptized, he was not baptized!"

Those words led to a theological struggle for me! My upbringing had said, "He that believes and is baptized shall be saved." Questions, questions! This Catholic family apparently knew the importance of baptism or why would the father be pounding the floor and screaming, "He was not baptized, he was not baptized!" Did Christopher have faith in Jesus? Is there any comfort I could give this family? I knew where to find coffee and water. I got them coffee and water! I prayed with them, asking God for peace in this horrific moment, a peace that could only be given by Jesus. I was lost, tormented, and struggling with my own beliefs. Did Christopher have faith?

At the age of 23 and having spent the previous summer working on a golf course as a grounds keeper myself, I knew of Christopher's work. I knew how quickly accidents can happen on a golf course grounds crew. While Christopher's parents needed my help in their suffering, I had my own "stuff" to deal with! Having seen Christopher in the emergency room, I had seen the grass clipping on Christopher's pantlegs, and remembered when my jeans looked similar to that as a grounds keeper. I saw the grass stains on his jeans and I remembered

the grass stains that had been on my jeans. I saw the grass stained white socks and remembered my own socks with that green stain. This could have happened to me. Did Christopher have faith even though he was not baptized? What did Jesus mean when He said, "He that believes and is baptized shall be saved." Did Christopher have to be baptized to be saved?

I needed help, I was overwhelmed! This would be the first of eleven deaths that I would be on call for as a student chaplain during the summer of 1988, in this eleven-week Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Program at St. Mary's Hospital in Green Bay Wisconsin. I had just completed my first year of Seminary at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana. I was living with my friend, Ray Cichocki and his mom Lois, just blocks from Lambeau field, the home of the Green Bay Packers (Yes, Connie May, that year, I went to the one and only Packer game of my life: The Bishop's Charity Game on a HOT August Day! We walked to the game!!!!)

I needed help. I phoned my CPE supervisor, Father John Van Deuren (he is now 86), I explained the situation and he said, "I'm on my way!" It did not take long, and he was on the scene!

When he arrived, he led us all to the ER room where the body of Christopher awaited. Another theological dilemma! Father John place his hands on the forehead of Christopher and prayed for him! Father John prayed for Christopher, whose grass stained pants, socks and shoes were still intact. He prayed for Christopher who was cold, his ears blue! Theological dilemma! I wanted out of that room! How could he pray for the dead! This did not fit my theology!

Father John excused us, allowing the family time with their son. Father John and I walked side by side toward the ER exit, I saw an empty exam room and I took it. I lost it! I cried! I sobbed! I shook from head to toe! Was Christopher a Christian? Why did Father John pray for the dead! Why? Why? I needed air! I needed time! Father John assured me of the presence of Christ and the comfort I had provided to this distraught family by my presence and by my prayers. I shared with him my theological challenges regarding "He that believes and is baptized shall be saved."

If you know anything about CPE you know that it involves ministry and opportunities to process the ministry interaction with your peers in the same program. I called it an opportunity to "Share and Stare!" It was also an opportunity to write papers. Father John told me to take the rest of the day off, and to return at 3:00 p.m. for group report and processing. He also said, I would need to write a paper on my experience and a paper on my Theology of Baptism. It must have been about 8 a.m. by this time. I have the day off and I'm a wreck!

I needed to talk with someone. I think this is why I promote grief support groups as I do; I think it is important to talk and process the loss! I went to see my friend Ray, the friend whose home I was staying at for the summer. Ray was working as a grounds keeper at a large church in Green Bay. I found Ray and we sat on the sidewalk and I shared the events of the early morning. I cried and shook and cried some more. I then went to the empty house to sit and think, alone! I hardly got home, cleaned up, clothes changed, and Ray arrived home. He had taken the rest of the day off to help me process what I had been through in those early morning hours at St. Mary's Hospital.

My theology of baptism is found in all of Mark 16:16 (ESV) "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned." You will notice now that I have provided the entire verse, not just Mark 16:16a. It is not the lack of baptism that condemns, it is the lack of faith. Can a person have faith without baptism? Yes, the Holy Spirit works through the Word and creates faith. I Corinthians 12: 3, "Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking in the Spirit of God ever says "Jesus is accursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except in the Holy Spirit." If a person rejects baptism, then we might wonder if

they are also rejecting Christ. I do not know that Christopher rejected baptism. I do not know if he believed in Jesus as his Savior. I had to let it go! This was not for me to know, nor to decide, it is for Christ alone. I had to let go!

Through this experience 30 years ago, many threads of the tapestry of life have been woven together. Ray and I would be dorm mates at the seminary and would become close friends. Ray would visit me at the first congregation I served as a 26-year-old single pastor. His visit came in September of 1991. He came to ask me to be the best-man in his wedding! Of course, I said, yes! I had not met this wonderful gal he told me about, this delightful pastor's daughter whom he had met on his vicarage, but I was happy for him. On October 25, 1991, I held my first wedding rehearsal at Grace Lutheran Church in Wellsville, MO for Sabrina Gastler and Jeff Hopkins. They would be the first wedding that I would perform as a new pastor! The joy, the excitement, the food! It was after 10 p.m. when I walked into the parsonage that Friday night. The phone rang, I picked up and heard "Our brother Ray is with the Lord!" On October 25, 1991, twenty-six-year-old Ray Cichocki was killed by a drunk driver as he and his fiancé drove out of Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN.

My best friend was dead. I was 102 days into serving my first parish. No family, no friends, no support system, no pastor to call for help, no cell phones, no email, no instant messaging. Alone, tears, and questions. Why? It was a long, lonely night of no sleep. The person who helped me wrestle with "baptism", the person who asked me to be the best man at his wedding... wedding! In just a few hours I had to pull it together to perform my first wedding ceremony and not dampen the joy of this day! I called the chairman of the congregation and he and his wife came over and we talked for hours.

The wedding was beautiful, and no one was the wiser of what I was experiencing. I enjoyed their reception, ate, drank, smiled and laughed as best I could. I conducted the 9 a.m. Bible class and 10 a.m. Divine Service without a missing a step or shedding a tear. I think I had learned something in Clinical Pastoral Education just a few years prior when I was the chaplain for eleven deaths in eleven weeks.

I was outside greeting church members when Clarence, an elder, and his wife Shirley who would become awesome dear friends, approached me, and said, "Pastor, how are you doing?" I suspected that the chairman had spoken with all of the elders about what had happened. Many of them had met Ray when he visited me in September. With those words, "Pastor, how are you doing?" I lost it! I cried! I sobbed! I shook from head to toe! With Clarence on one side and Shirley on the other, they supported me. And I talked and talked and talked! Ray was baptized, Ray was a Christian, I did not mourn as one without hope. But I mourned! Yes, as you know Christians do mourn and we do have hope in Christ.

It has been a real joy to get to walk with persons who are mourning the death of their beloved. The stories I am allowed to experience are precious as they are shared from loving hearts. Now you have a window into why I find grief support so important. And now you all know, the rest of the story. ## Lutheran Church Extension Fund 2018 Kaleidoscope Fund

Pastor and Candy Kohnke completed the first step in applying for the **2018 Kaleidoscope Fund grants offered by LCEF**. The first step was to write up a short proposal summary for a ministry

outreach or expansion program. LCEF funds will be granted in amounts between \$25,000 to \$250,000 and are intended to help LCMS congregations, schools, church workers and the communities they impact. Input from our congregation for this grant was sought during the listening sessions that Pastor held at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, April 24th; 3:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 25; 7 p.m. Thursday, April 26<sup>th</sup> and 11:00 a.m. Saturday, April 28<sup>th</sup>. The seven people who participated in the meetings suggested we write a grant proposal for a Director of Christian Education. We did!

**The first proposed initiative** was to launch a ministry with a **Director of Christian Education (DCE) intern** to serve the youth of our congregation. We also wrote a summary proposal to **Expand the Percherons Proclaiming the Gospel Ministry**. This would provide funding so that we would not have to rely on the Thrivent Action Team gift cards to support the expenses incurred for the parades.

We will hear by July 1, 2018 if any of proposed initiatives were selected. If one is selected, then we get to write a full grant proposal which is due September 1, 2018.

**Changes are being made to our confirmation program!** Level I Confirmation will be for Students entering the 7<sup>th</sup> grade and level II will be for students who are entering the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. It will take another year before we are truly at this arrangement, as we complete the course work of students already in the confirmation program.

Parents will take on a **significantly larger** role in instruction and memory work during the school year. Parents and confirmation students will have monthly rather than weekly meetings with the pastor.

It is our hope that longer concentrated class time and more parental involvement will improve the quality of the confirmation program, enhancing the faith live of the student.

### **Our Mission dollars at Work**

Each month Trinity supports, with a gift of \$500, a recognized mission of the LCMS as approved by the voters' assembly. Our July mission is the Joint Seminary Fund. The LCMS has two seminaries: Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana and Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. In order to prevent higher tuition costs, these gifts help fund necessary expenditures, such as faculty, curriculum, facilities, student financial aid, recruitment, and continuing and distance education programs.

A total of \$500.00 to the Synod for support of the Global Mission and \$500.00 towards the Lutheran Hour ministries outreach efforts. Lutheran Hour ministries reaches one million listeners through The Lutheran Hour. From the United States to the ends of the earth. Delivering help at time, lifesaving help-to people who have little opportunity to hear the Gospel. In total God uses our support to touch 70 million souls worldwide.

### **Nebraska District Convention**

The Rev. Richard L. Snow of Seward, Neb., was elected to his second term as president of the LCMS Nebraska District at the district's 19th convention, held June 15–16 in Kearney, Neb. Snow was elected on the first ballot. Also elected were:

- Craig K. Niemeier, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, St. Libory, Neb., as first vice-president, Region A;
- Karl P. Ziegler, pastor of First Lutheran Church, Papillion, Neb., as second vice-president, Region D;
- David P. Kuhfal, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church, Neligh, Neb., and Trinity Lutheran Church, Elgin, Neb., as third vice-president, Region C; and
- David D. Ohlman, pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Polk, Neb., as fourth vice-president, Region B.

The elected officers were installed on the second day of the convention.

Delegates also discussed and passed resolutions to:

- amend the Nebraska District Bylaws to bring them in line with several changes at the Synod and district levels, as well as to allow each congregation to nominate two candidates for district president and vice-president, instead of just one.
- give thanks to God for the 125th anniversary of Concordia University, Nebraska, in Seward, Neb., which has prepared more than 23,000 students for service to the church and world, and to ask the 2019 LCMS convention to declare Nov. 17, 2019, as "Concordia University, Nebraska Sunday."
- encourage support for the Nebraska District Crisis Fund to help support pastoral candidates and other pastors in the district who have resigned their calls, especially due to persistent conflict.

Concord College Selma, Alabama closes...Challenging times in higher education



“I think it’s sad because it had 96 years of history here ... but institutions don’t necessarily last forever,” said Olson. “Circumstances change. As time moved on, black children had access to public schools, and there are multiple opportunities [for higher education] now, so we are competing for a pool of students [alongside] state-sponsored schools, and we didn’t have that base of Lutheran primary schools [that we once had feeding the college].”

Olson and his fellow regents described efforts undertaken to keep the institution afloat over nearly a decade in the face of multiple obstacles — among them, significant defaults on student loans and ongoing financial challenges.

CCA is not the first Synod college to close its doors for various reasons. Preceding the CCA closing were colleges in New Orleans (early 1900s); Conover, N.C. (1935); Oakland, Calif. (1973); Fort Wayne, Ind. (1977); Concordia, Mo. (1986); and Winfield, Kan. (1986).

The school also joins a growing list of colleges and universities, both public and private, that have closed or are likely to close their doors due to declining student enrollment, budget woes and other insurmountable challenges. Learn more: <https://blogs.lcms.org/> Search: Selma Closes
