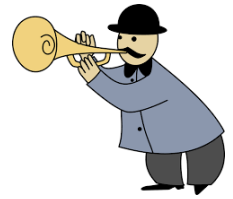

The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod (LCMS) Foundation Lifetime Plan for Giving Course that I attended the last week in September in Denver, Colorado was eye opening. I did not know that **75% of LCMS clergy believe it is wrong to speak about money in church.** Scripture provides many references to money and giving.

Every man shall give as he is able, according to the blessing of the LORD your God which He has given you. Deut. 16.17

For if there is first a willing mind, it (your offering to God) is accepted according to what one has, and not according to what he does not have. 2 Cor 8.12

On the first day of the week let each one of you lay something aside, storing up as he may prosper, that there be no collections when I come. 1 Cor 16.2 (see also Lev 14.30)

The Widow's Offering- And he [Jesus] sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the offering box. Many rich people put in large sums. And a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which make a penny. Mark 12:41-42

Stewards by Identity

It started in Creation. God formed us to be His stewards or managers. This was certainly true in terms of managing (working and protecting) the earth and everything in it (Gen 2:15). After man disobeyed the one prohibition that God gave, not to eat of the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, it became clear that humans have a problem living out their identity as stewards.

What God created as good became corrupted. Man had a desire to be like God and succumbed to the tempter's voice, “You can be like God.” The first Adam failed, and God acted to expel Adam and Eve from the Garden of Paradise. It might have seemed harsh, but God's infinite kindness was already at work. There was a blessing to fulfill. God's Word chronicles the journey He took as He faithfully loved His creation through the people who were given His promise.

We were created to be caretakers of all God made for our benefit. Christians are conduits of the Good News of salvation! “Rescued from eternal hardship, sorrow and death, the promised Messiah will be sent to deliver us,” Gen.3:15. This is the focal pivot for a full life.

The Ownership Issue

Two common myths exist about charitable gift planning that often show up in people's worldview. This myth gives evidence of a two-story view of truth that misguides perceptions about the spiritual nature and shows itself in dualism or a conflicted understanding of truth.

The first myth is that charitable gift planning is only about money. In reality, such planning is more about relationships and the aspirations and goals of people. People will not continue to give if they do not have a satisfying relationship with the mission that they are being encouraged to support.

The second myth is that charitable gift planning is about manipulation. The distinction between effective charitable gift development and manipulation is largely a motivational issue. Leader manipulation or self-interest can thwart the effectiveness of the Gospel. A self-serving motivation must not prevail in Christian organizations. Read James 2:1-12.

Within our culture of dualism, we see two realms or rooms. In the upper room, people of faith see Jesus and His Holy Spirit planning eternal gifts for the Church. In a more temporal manner, the Church's services, including charitable gift planning, advances support for the eternal benefits that the Lord of the Church has already provided. The need of His people to receive such eternal gifts is supported as stewards plan their gifts generously, even as all have been given to live in a blessed and holy circle of life.

Those with a temporal worldview see through the lens of the lower room. In this room they understand gift planning as a secular matter, as a necessary nuisance extracting money from people and concerned only with selfish purposes. In this realm such planning should only be left to secular advisors.

People of every generation compartmentalize these perspectives and therefore fail to capitalize on the potential benefits or blessings from charitable gift planning done in the name of Christ. The false sense of economics fails to see and understand the greater economies that God has given the world in Christ.

A person's understanding of stewardship rests on the ownership issue. God's Word is clear. God is the Owner and His creation are stewards or managers. But sadly, a human worldview often sees it reversed.

St. Paul gave this crucial reminder to the Corinthian believers. "Since we are God's coworkers, we urge you not to let God's kindness be wasted on you," 2 Cor. 6:1.

When it comes to money and material possessions, too many of us, if we are completely honest, are owned by the things that we own. Like slaves serving an unrelenting master, we spend our lifetimes making money so we can buy stuff that grows old or breaks down and needs repair. And then we have to make more money to replace or repair all that stuff. But let me give you four simple, single-syllable words that will give you freedom—real financial freedom. These words aren't original with me, and quite frankly, they don't sound all that profound, but I've never come across four words in all my studies that can better free us from financial bondage. Here they are: God owns it all.

Look closely at these verses.

Exodus 19:5: "All the earth is Mine."

Deuteronomy 10:14: "Behold, to the LORD your God belong heaven and the highest heavens, the earth and all that is in it."

Job 41:11: "Whatever is under the whole heaven is Mine."

Psalms 24:1: "The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, / the world, and all who live in it."

1 Corinthians 6:19: "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own?"

1 Corinthians 7:23: "You were bought with a price."

1 Timothy 6:7: "We have brought nothing into the world, so we cannot take anything out of it either."

Without our God, we would be bankrupt corpses. All that we have is His. We are born into this world with our hands empty, and we leave this world not only with empty hands but wearing clothing without pockets. When you stop to think about it, our souls have no pockets either. We take nothing with us. God owns it all.

By His infinite kindness, God has created us for a relationship with Him. He has bound Himself to us in Creation, even to the point of sending His Son to redeem us to be His holy people through the sacrifices of Christ, our Lord. God's stewards see themselves as conduits of His love.

A Study Based on Scripture and the Augsburg Confession: The Augsburg Confession, also known as the Augustan Confession or the Augustana from its Latin name, Confession Augustana, is the primary confession of faith of the Lutheran Church and one of the most important documents of the Protestant Reformation. The Augsburg Confession was written in both German and Latin and was presented by a number of German rulers and free-cities at the Diet of Augsburg on 25 June 1530.

The Holy Roman Emperor Charles V had called on the Princes and Free Territories in Germany to explain their religious convictions in an attempt to restore religious and political unity in the Holy Roman Empire and rally support against the Ottoman invasion in the 16th century Siege of Vienna. It is the fourth document contained in the Lutheran Book of Concord.

Overview The Augsburg Confession is just as relevant to the life of the Church today as it was during the sixteenth century Reformation.

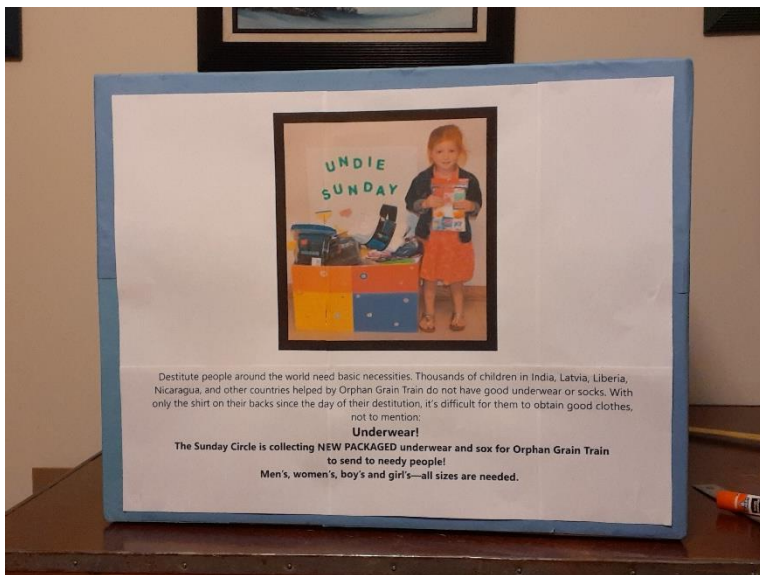

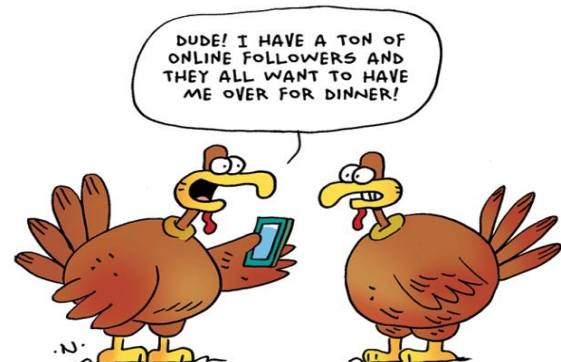
