Grace and peace to you...

As I sit in the office looking out at about a foot of snow I can't help but think of the season of spring that is coming. I am ready for it. Of course, I realize we still have to work our way through February and March. I'm focusing on the fact that we're now in the upward cycle of the days getting longer (sunshine-wise) and temperatures slowly but surely rising.

Another thing that I think will help me through is February 14th. February 14th is a special day this year for three reasons. First, you probably know that the 14th is Valentine's Day. Second, this year the 14th also happens to be Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the Lenten season.

People are often surprised to find out that the word Lent means 'spring'. I used to think that it must have some association with suffering and death, but no, the word comes from an Anglo-Saxon word: 'lencten', meaning 'spring'. In Saxon times, the month of March was called 'Lencten-tid' (spring-tide) as it was the month when spring, lengthening days, and new growth really made themselves noticed. Since March also forms the bulk of the period leading up to Easter, the name for the season became associated with the religious season.

I am one of those people who look forward to Lent. Lent has always been a time for me to reexamine and refocus my spiritual life. I love the hymnody of Lent as much or more than the hymnody of Christmas. The words of hymns such as *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, Go to Dark Gethsemane* or *Were You There* can send shivers through me. To contemplate the fact that the holy, almighty God who created earth and heaven would come to die in my place indeed causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble.

Of course, what tops off the season of Lent is the glorious celebration of the Resurrection. While it is true that we get to observe a little Easter every Sunday of the year, once a year we get to rejoice in the grand festival. Nothing removes sorrow and melancholy quicker than pure, unrestrained joy.

I pray that you have this gift in your life. Joyfulness is a gift of the Spirit and, much like the peace of God, true joy passes all understanding. As always, I look forward to coming together and to receiving the gifts of God that He provides in worship, gifts of forgiveness and of love, peace and joy.

And for those of you who keep track of these things (OCD anyone) I mentioned at the beginning of this article that there were three reasons February 14th is special. I have already noted that it is Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday. February 14th also happens to be the exact half year of Julie's and my wedding anniversary (married August 14th). So I take this opportunity to wish my Jewel a happy 35 ½ year anniversary. I love you.

I will be appointing a committee as soon as possible. I am hoping to have some information to present at the Spring Voters Assembly on May 6.

Introduction to the Divine Service

Notes on the Liturgy #11 – The Hymn and Hymns

The Hymn of the Day is a tradition that began in the early 18th century. The idea is that the hymn is chosen to reflect the theme of the sermon. But let's first look at a big picture issue — the use of hymns in general. The argument is made that hymns are boring or irrelevant, and we need to liven up the music in order to reach more people.

This is an important subject because in many churches classic hymns have been ousted for a diet of praise music. To give an analogy, this would be like a parent taking away a child's bread, fruit, vegetables, meat and feeding him cake, ice cream, soda, and chips. Would any child complain? There is a place for cake and ice cream but not as the main meal!

With this shift in what is sung in the church, there can also be a shift in the focus of the worshipers. A steady diet of praise music can work against the idea of "Divine Service." In the Divine Service, we receive the service of God. We know He is present because He speaks to us with His Word, He feeds us with the Lord's Supper, He washes us in Baptism. A church that relies on praise music can become emotion centered. I know God was working because I "felt" Him. Thus the worshipper's attention is shifted away from the service of God in Word and Sacraments. Instead the worshipper's attention is driven inward to subjective emotions.

Lutherans are not the only ones who are concerned about this. A well-known evangelical pastor, John MacArthur, has written about the loss of classic hymns. He bemoans the fact that doctrinal content and the teaching function of hymns have been lost with the overuse of simple praise songs. Of classic hymns MacArthur writes, "They were written to teach and reinforce Biblical and doctrinal concepts...Those hymns aimed to praise God by proclaiming His truth in a way that enhanced the worshiper's comprehension of the truth. They set a standard for worship that was cerebral as it was emotional. After all, the first and great commandment teaches us to love God with all our hearts, soul, and MIND." Instead of thought, contemporary songs can become "vehicles of passion" with simple repetition designed to elicit an emotional response devoid of thought, intellect, or doctrine. Lutheran hymns support Lutheran theology. Because praise music often comes from a non-Lutheran understanding, praise music is devoid of Sacramental theology. Empty calories!

Below is Pastor's Review of a new book recently entered onto our shelves.

Night Driving: Notes from a Prodigal Son by Chad Bird

A gifted Seminary student who quickly moved from parish pastor to Hebrew professor teaching at Concordia Theological in Fort Wayne. Blessed by God with a loving wife, beautiful children and a promising career everything seemed great. When you think you are indestructible you often make bad decisions.

5 years later this same man sat on the floor of a motel room contemplating suicide. The loving wife - gone taking the children with her. The promising career - over taking with it the pastoral office. There is much more.

'Night Driving' is Chad Bird's story. Ultimately, it is a story of redemption. Chad is frighteningly honest and open about his transgressions, their cost and God's grace. I find it to be a story of encouragement because I too know the pain of great failure. When we are honest with ourselves I think we all do.

The book is a fairly easy read. I believe it causes an introspection that is beneficial for the believer (one that is all too often needed). It tells us that we have a God who loves us, who does not abandon us, who continually offers forgiveness. That is a message we cannot hear enough.

The Christmas Season is over and now we start looking ahead toward Lent and Easter. Lent starts on February 14th, Ash Wednesday. Trinity will have our traditional Ash Wednesday Service at 7:00 pm. Ashes will be distributed at this service. Please join us.

During Lent we will be having Wednesday, Midweek Lenten Services. Our Mid-week Service Theme is "Return from Exile: A Lenten Journey." (Pastor has more about this on page 6.) There will be a ten minute hymn request sing along at 7:00 pm followed by our Lenten Journey. There will be a Soup and Bread Supper 5:30 – 6:30 pm preceding the Service. You are warmly invited to join us for a wonderful soup dinner and fellowship before the Lenten Service.

On March 25th we will celebrate Palm Sunday with a Worship Service at 10am. Our Maundy Thursday Service will be on March 29th at 7:00 pm and Good Friday Tenebrae Service will be on March 30th at 7:00 pm. Easter Sunday Services will be held on April 1st. There will be a 7:00 am Sunrise Easter Service and a 10:00 am Easter Service that morning. Please bring flowers to be put on the center cross in the front lawn.

On March 22nd at 7:00 pm Trinity will sponsor a Seder Meal which will be narrated by a member of "Jews for Jesus". The event will be held in Belvedere Hall. The Seder Meal will be served. Nonrefundable tickets are \$2.50 for children 3 – 12 years old; \$5.00 for everyone older than 12 years old. The tickets are required to help cover the cost of the meal and to confirm reservations. The tickets will be sold until March 15th. It is recommended to get your tickets early, Christ Lutheran, Unity and Saint John Congregations are going to be invited. There will be a free will offering taken the night of the Seder Meal to support the "Jews for Jesus". If anyone would like to assist with this event please notify Pastor.

Due to parents not using the Nursery for their children, the Board of Worship discussed the situation and recommended to the Church Council that Trinity no longer provides a paid Nursery Attendant. This was approved. As of February 4th there will no longer be a paid attendant in the Nursery. The "Nursery" will then become the "Cry Room". The monitor currently in the "Cry Room" will move into the new space. Parents are encouraged to keep their children in service with them but when the need arises they can take their children to the new "Cry Room" where

the children can play and the parents can continue to observe the service. We would like to thank Robyn Ocana for her dedicated service to the children of Trinity.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank those people who help Pastor during the Service. Acolytes, Lectors, Communion Assistants and Ushers enhance our worship service and we appreciate their service.

Return from Exile: A Lenten Journey

Fellow Redeemed,

Once again we prepare to enter into the Lenten season as we journey through the Church Year. Lent, however, is its own kind of journey. Lent is the journey we make as we travel with Christ from the Mount of Transfiguration to Jerusalem where He will face the cross and the grave for our sakes. It is a very sobering trip, a journey that often struggles to find joy. But there is Easter!

This year our theme for our Lenten worship will focus upon the journey, but perhaps not in the way we usually walk it. Our overall theme will be "Return from Exile: A Lenten Journey." All journeys must have a starting point; and in the preaching and teaching this Lenten season, we will consider our starting point a land of exile.



The land of exile from which we begin our journey is the wilderness of sin and death. Sin came into the world when our first parents were unfaithful and disobedient, eating fruit from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Adam and Eve sinned, and we have inherited from them not only the sin itself, but also the result of that sin—separation from our Lord and God. From the first sin in the first garden, we have been exiled into the wilderness where we have wandered without any ability to find our way out.

This is the beginning of our journey: exile. But every journey also has a destination, an ending point. Our return from exile brings us into the promised land. Our relationship with our God is restored by Christ's sacrifice. Our destination, then, is the perfect place, the new garden, the courts of heaven—the ultimate destination which was established for us by His death and resurrection. There is great joy in the journey as we see where our returning brings us; but there is also a somber attitude when we consider what Christ faced on account of our sin.

All journeys consist of many events that take place between the journey's beginning and its end. Our Lenten journey is no different. Each leg of our Lenten journey begins in the Old Testament and then continues into the New Testament, pointing us to the joy that is ours in Christ Jesus. Do not be surprised to discover that from the very beginning, even outside the gates of the Garden of Eden, it is Christ who travels with us. He has always been our guide, from the very beginning, and He will journey with us to the very end. Indeed, He has even gone before us to prepare a heavenly dwelling place.

Life is full of journeys. Life itself is a journey. We enter this Lenten season contemplating the reality of our earthly journey but with eyes fixed on its destination—the empty tomb and the open gates of everlasting life. What joy there is in knowing that we do not walk this way alone!

We would like to **THANK everyone who has donated books** to Fill-a-Bookshelf. The shelf is full and the books are going to be given to *Reach, Inc.* for distribution. Do not be alarmed with the empty shelf! The bookshelf will be there to fill over again. We will be counting the books and keep a running total of the number of books Trinity has donated helping to improve literacy and education of those children ages 0-17.

We had a former member of Trinity hear about our collection through her mother and member Martha Johnson. Realizing the importance of literacy, she wanted to help and had an entire box of different aged books sent to her mom's home. Martha brought the books in to help fill the shelf. Martha even found out by taking your gently used books to the used book store at Wards Corner you can get credit to get children's books. Many more books were donated that way. So, if you have gently used books you have read and no reason to keep them please think about going to the used book store and exchanging them for children/teen books.

When *Reach*, *Inc*. comes to pick-up the books I will be getting a lot more information on the read-a-louds and book deliveries. If you see that as a niche you would like to fill stayed tuned!

If you have never heard of them - *Reach, Inc.* is a local non-profit who over the last 5 years, has supported the literacy needs of over 5,000 children, distributed over 77,500 books valued close to \$250,000. They started in 1998 and expanded from 1 Read-Aloud program to 20 shelter and community initiatives.

Serving the homeless dinner at JCOC is fast approaching! We are scheduled to feed those less fortunate on Saturday, February 24, 2018 at 3:00 p.m. That will require us to be at church early in the morning to prepare the meal and then transport to the Judeo-Christian Outreach Center (JCOC). We must be out there and ready to serve by 3:00 p.m. Our target time to get to the JCOC will be 2:00 PM. We can carpool from the church or you can meet us out there.


