Grace and peace to you...

Alleluia! He is risen, He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! Although it is only the early part of March as I write this, I already have my mind on spring. Julie and I have been to McDonald Garden Center in Virginia Beach and Enchanted Garden Nursery in Chesapeake. We're having our outside deck repaired at our home and we're getting ready to be outside. Spring brings with it the hope of new life. Birds build nests that will soon fill up with chirping babies. Wildlife like rabbits and squirrels have their litters. Trees break out with buds with the promise of beautiful new foliage. Green plants and flowers begin to push their way up through the ground to display vibrant hues and colorful blooms. The grass in our lawn already looks like a green carpet!

Spring is also the time of Easter. Although the date changes from year to year, the season always extends throughout spring and brings with it a celebration of life. That life is not about new flowers and baby bunnies. It is so much more than that. It is about a life that never ends. And it all begins with Jesus. Our last drive was a success and we are hoping that this year’s drive will be even more successful. Look for more information in the near future. Introduction to the Divine Service

Notes on the Liturgy #12 – The Sermon

The task of proclaiming God's Word is one of the major tasks of the Pastoral Office. It is for this reason that Dr. Norman Nagel told his students at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis *The most important thing about you that is ordained, is your mouth!* If a service is held without the Lord's Supper, then the high point of the liturgy is the sermon, and in the Divine Service it serves as the culmination of the Service of the Word that began with the readings.

The sermon is nothing more than the exposition of the Scripture with the proper balance between words of Law and words of Gospel. It is a relatively simple goal, but accomplishing it is anything but easy. The ultimate goal of the sermon, like the liturgy as a whole, is to serve the Gospel. The Law that exposes our sin and then condemns us for that sin, gives us a thirst for the refreshing drink of the Gospel that offers us the forgiveness of Christ. We will never outgrow Law/Gospel preaching this side of eternity, though we may not always appreciate it. A Lutheran pastor should never lose sight of this primary task of Christian preaching!

Some people want *how to/practical* sermons, but there is a danger here. It has been said *the most popular sermons...will draw principles from the Bible about practical issues—such as how to manage money, how to handle family problems, and how to avoid stress. Such sermons, in one sense are all 'Law,' but they manage to water down the Law so that it seems easily achievable, a matter of self-help rules, rather than demands of a righteous God. Such sermons, however popular, can never bring anyone into faith...pastors must be very careful to avoid the cultural temptation to preach sermons that are merely 'therapeutic,' as opposed to bringing their listeners to repentance, through the Law, and to faith, through the Gospel of free forgiveness through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.*

The other issue that arises with such *practical* sermons comes with the Gospel. Such preaching often excludes it altogether, waters it down so that it's unrecognizable or tragically warps the intended gospel into Law. There is nothing wrong with *practical* properly understood. The Bible does indeed have some *how to's*, but never encourage your pastor to preach practically so that Law/Gospel proclamation is lost. Train your ears to hear the word of Law/Gospel in the sermon. As C.F.W. Walther said, properly distinguishing between Law & Gospel is one of the most difficult aspects of studying God's Word. It is a fine art that is practiced, but it is never perfected this side of Paradise. Apply the Law to yourself first, not your neighbor first. Listen carefully to the words of Gospel and believe that in Christ those words of mercy are for you!

Below is Pastor's Review of a new book recently entered onto our shelves.

The Spirituality of the Cross: The Way of the First Evangelicals

Dr. Gene Edward Veith, Jr.

I read this book while I was studying at the seminary. It was not required reading, I just picked it up at random. Once I picked it up I could hardly put it down. Dr. Veith writes in a way that feels as if he is conversing with just you. Although the theology is solid it is not 'deep' and very easy to follow.

Veith interjects historical information about the forming of the Lutheran church that was new to me and I found it fascinating. The content includes explanations of subjects that I had only heard bits and pieces of throughout my Lutheran years (before I became a pastor) such as Justification, the Theology of the Cross, Vocation and the Two Kingdoms.

Dr. Veith is well-known in Christian, conservative, and homeschooling circles through his writing and speaking on various aspects of Christianity and culture. He is the author of 20 books on topics involving Christianity and culture, classical education, literature, and the arts and his writings number more than 100 scholarly articles, reviews, and papers.

In his Lutheran connections Dr. Veith was on the faculty for 19 years at Concordia University Wisconsin as Professor of English. He also served for six years as the Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences. He currently serves as the director of the Cranach Institute at Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne, Indiana.

He says this about his own book: *It's the book that I wish I had found before I became a Lutheran. It explains the Lutheran distinctives and the richness of Lutheran spirituality in what I hope is a lucid and engaging way.*

I felt this book was so important after I finished reading it that I personally purchased 20 copies to give to people when they wanted further information about basic Lutheranism. I just handed out the last one of those books two weeks ago. If you are looking for an interesting, easy but informative read regarding basic Lutheran belief this is the book for you.

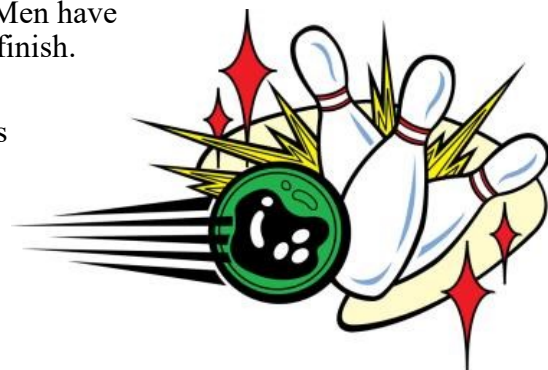
Bowling League

If you have gently used books you have read and no reason to keep them please think about going to the used book store and exchanging them for children/teen books.

If you would like to be part of the Read-Aloud program at various shelters and elementary schools your help is needed. Please sign-up on the Special Ministries board and your name will be passed along to Reach, Inc.

Many of us know someone who has been effected by cancer one way or another. The treatments can be long and trying. We are going to be getting a list of items to pack into Cancer Care Bags that will be distributed at the cancer treatment center. We do not have a list of items as this time, but please watch the bulletin and bulletin boards, for items we will be collecting.
