From Our Pastor

God's peace and joy to you...

Looking out the office window today I see blue sky, trees filling up with green leaves, flowers blooming (especially the azaleas), all put in gentle motion by a tender breeze. It's enough to make me forget the long winter season we've been through. Going outside on a day like today just brings joy into a person's life. To put that feeling into a single word, a day like today is encouraging.

I spoke about being an encourager in a sermon several weeks ago. I have to admit I was a little nervous to speak of it too boldly but I believed God was leading me to do it so I didn't sugarcoat it. I've received more feedback from that sermon than from any other sermon I can remember preaching and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. That, in itself, was encouraging.

We live in a world that likes to point out flaws and inadequacies. If there's no shortcoming, then the world will make one up. If you're on social media it doesn't take long to see that the majority of items or opinions that are posted are almost immediately trashed. It doesn't even matter which side of the argument you're on, it's just about getting a chance to sound off under the guise of anonymity and pretend you're an expert on the subject.

The thinnest women are fat-shamed if they post a swimsuit picture on the beach. Parents are bashed for taking positions on raising their children no matter which position they take. You can't look at a Twitter feed without seeing at least one person complaining about a travel delay or bad customer service. There are blogs dedicated to *tacky Christmas lights* or *prom picture fails*. I think some of those were meant to be only humorous but do you want to see a picture of your house that you spent so much time decorating being made fun of?

Because we have a tendency to let our sinful natures have control, becoming a Barnabas (or a *son of encouragement*) is something that has to be intentionally relearned. I truly believe that a forgiven child of God is an encourager at heart but it's easy to get out of practice. An encourager is a friend, an advocate, a supporter, a well-wisher. An encourager finds people trying hard to do their best and thanking them for it. An encourager is a helper, a defender, a sympathizer.

I'm asking that you join me in regular prayer that Trinity would become a congregation of Barnabas'. Pray for yourself personally and then pray for your brothers and sisters here. There are plenty of people out in the world who will gladly point out all of our faults. We all need people who will speak words of encouragement to us that inspire us. I know I do. So let's **encourage one another daily** knowing that our time here is short (**as long as it is called "Today,"**).

Introduction to the Divine Service

Notes on the Liturgy #13 – The Creed

No creed but the Bible. Perhaps you've heard something like that before and wondered why Lutherans and other Christians use creeds in the Divine Service. A wonderful answer to that question, is to use another question: Why not use them!? If another Christian ever asks you that question, recite one of the creeds to them, and ask then what is it about that creed that they would object to.

We Lutherans boldly confess *Scripture alone*! We don't place creeds on the same authority as Scripture, but they become important for us because they teach what the Scriptures teach. Throughout history people have twisted the Bible. Thus, creeds become important tools for confessing the orthodox (*right teaching*) doctrine of Scripture. They say *Here we stand! This is what the Word teaches! This is what we reject!*

Speaking of pastors, Luther states they have two duties: *feed the sheep and ward off the wolves*. That is, the pastor must teach the Word purely and also condemn false doctrine. This is what the creeds do for Lutherans. In Lutheran Worship there are three ecumenical creeds – the Nicene, Apostle's, and Athanasian Creed. They are called *ecumenical* because they're accepted by many Christians throughout the world. All three creeds teach the doctrine of the Trinity. Note how the Nicene & Apostle's Creed follow a similar outline based on the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

These Creeds are ancient. The Nicene Creed began to be formed at a church council in Nicea, Turkey in 325 AD as a response to specific heresies that were invading the church. The Apostle's Creed dates to at least the early 2nd century after Christ, and it gained its name because it confesses the faith as the apostles taught it, not because they specifically wrote it. The Athanasian Creed appears in what is now Southern France in the 400's, but no one knows who the author is even though it was named after Athanasius. It too was developed to address specific heresies of the time, and it's typically used only on Holy Trinity Sunday because of its length.

We do not confess *modern* creeds written anew every Sunday and neglect the confessions of the past. Because the ecumenical creeds are built on Scripture, they're timeless. The age of these creeds remind us that we don't confess them alone. We're part of a mighty army of believers marching from of old and yet we're one church that confesses the faith *with angels and archangels and all of the company of heaven*.

Below is Pastor's Review of a new book recently entered onto our shelves.

The Screwtape Letters

C. S. Lewis

I have reviewed a couple of newer books in the past few months. This month I was inspired to read a 'classic' – *The Screwtape Letters*. You may be familiar with the author, C. S. (Clive Staples) Lewis, and his book series The Chronicles of Narnia the first book of which is The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. Other popular books he has written are Mere Christianity, Surprised by Joy and The Problem of Pain. Lewis authored The Screwtape Letters about 10 years before The Chronicles of Narnia. This is a book that I reread every so often because the content always applies.

Screwtape is a devil who has taken the task of mentoring his nephew and apprentice devil, Wormwood. The book consists of a series of letters where Screwtape offers ideas and suggestions on how Wormwood can best tempt a British man, called only *the Patient*, into sin and, eventually, into Hell. Early in the book the Patient is converted to Christianity and the remainder of the book has Screwtape describing ways to bring the person out of faith.

It is important to remember the book's perspective. This is demon to demon. God is not overtly mentioned but there are numerous references to the Enemy. The letters deal with issues of reason vs faith, lust, anger, works righteousness, etc. In other words, the things that normal believers battle day to day. I see myself and the battles I constantly fight in so many of these letters. I truly believe that you will also. Reading this reminds me that my temptations are not unique to me. There is nothing new under the sun. We are all fighting the same battles while we are on this side of heaven.

The chapters are quite short and you can read them in short bursts or binge the entire book, if you so choose. I recommend that you do read this book, if you have the opportunity. The grace and mercy of God is subtle but it is there.

It takes everyone in God's family here at Trinity to participate in the daily running of our ministry in this place. From volunteering to lead, work or just participate in activities when invited to do so. Contributing your gifts as you feel you can.

Budget - As stated before we are working with a bare bones budget. Approximately 75% of our budget covers salaries. We pay salaries to our pastor, secretary, bookkeeper, sexton and custodian. A large portion goes towards utilities – electricity, gas, water. We pay for phone and internet services. We pay for fire and security services. We are blessed with a beautiful home on Granby Street. Our home is old and requires daily maintenance. After all that is covered we can then use the remainder of your contributions to help cover our ministry work thru the many boards making up our Church Council. These volunteers do everything they can to keep expenses down. Most of the time we come in under budget each month. The notice you see each month in the bulletin shows you not what we budgeted to spend but what was spent in the last month (expenses), what was brought in (revenues) and the difference between the two. As of April 2018, we were \$6,967.68 short of meeting what we needed to pay our bills. This meant that we had to go into our savings to cover those costs. Thank the Lord we have some savings but even those funds can't last forever. Please continue to give as you feel you can. We are all a member of this family and it takes each of us to help to keep this place running so that we can continue to meet as God's family here at Trinity.

Time and Talent – How many of your households have a chore list that is divided among your family members? Someone does the laundry, someone cleans the bathrooms, someone pays the bills, someone cooks the meals, someone does the shopping. Hopefully that does not fall on just one member of the family. When chores are divided the chores get done and no one has to carry the load by themselves. That is what happens here in our Trinity family. We are so blessed with our volunteers. We thank God for each and everyone of you. If the same people have to do the same chore over and over again it begins to weigh on them. Each of us carrying our load makes this a more productive family. Not everyone is a leader, not everyone can sing or cook or do yardwork. But we all have talents that the Lord has given to us. Please consider where your talents can be used to benefit the family of God as we all share the "chores" that need to be done.

"There are three conversions necessary to every man: the head, the heart, and the purse." Attributed to Luther, though yet to be located in his vast writings, this statement echoes what Jesus taught about hearts and treasures. He said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34).

But which conversion comes first? I submit that the order is this: first the head, then the purse, then the heart. Let me explain.

Our Lord Jesus Christ dwelt among us to save us. He took on our flesh, fulfilled the demands of the law in our place, became sin for us, and suffered torture and death on our behalf, in order that we would be free from sin, death, and hell. He gives us what He accomplished through Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord's Supper.

And so, He doesn't just do it for us but gives it to us, makes what He did ours by making us His. Thus, we are called by His name: Christians. We have a new life in Him.

Through the preaching of Law and Gospel, God grants us repentance, a changing of our minds. It is a conversion of the mind. We are called to turn away from our sins and turn toward Him for forgiveness, life, and salvation. For when God calls us away from something, He is, at the same time, calling us to something.

And thus, He calls us to a new life, with new deeds. This is the conversion of the purse. Jesus said that "it is easier for a camel to enter through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God" (Matthew 19:24). "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

Notice that our hearts follow our treasures, not the other way around. As Christians, God calls us to invest our treasures in His Kingdom to ensure that the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. He calls us to share all good things with the one who teaches us the doctrines of Christ. He calls us to be generous in giving to the church, for it is more blessed to give than to receive.

So where is your treasure? If it is not invested in the kingdom of God, then the only response is repentance—a conversion of the heart—and to begin doing just that. And as our Lord promised, where your treasure is there your heart will be also.

This is not to say that you earn your way into heaven. It is simply to say that as Christians, those who have been made to be temples of the Holy Spirit, who have been given a new life in Christ, who are dead to sin and now alive in Him, we are, actually, to live — think (conversion of the mind), do (conversion of the purse), and be (conversion of the heart) — a new life in Him.

And when you fail, know that God in Christ loves and forgives you and still calls you away from that and to Himself.
