5 Things You Can Do To Have A Faithful Prayer Life

Paul J. Cain

This is the second book I have reviewed in the 9 book You Can Do It! Series described by CPH this way: The series encourages and equips believers to live out life as disciples of Jesus Christ, being formed and shaped by God's Word. Written in a clear and encouraging style, each of these topical books gives Christians achievable goals for strengthening their faith and relationships. Each book features a consistent presentation of a topic in five parts with each part consisting of a presentation, a summary, discussion questions, and several action steps.

Prayer is one of God's greatest gifts to us. When you stop to think about it the very fact that God not only allows us but encourages us to come to Him directly is nothing short of a miracle. Through prayer God keeps us close to Him and to His gifts.

One of the regrets I often hear from God's people is that they don't pray as often as they would like to. I know the feeling. Life is busy. I have to admit that prayer is something that I have struggled to include with regularity throughout my life. When 'all is well' I have a tendency to 'forget' about God. That makes me normal. What helps is being intentional and developing a discipline. My personal experience tells me that over time discipline becomes default and you find yourself praying unceasingly. I think that this little handbook can help you to develop a discipline.

The book leads you through a series of steps that can lead to a faithful prayer life. The steps include preparation. They include being intentional. They include setting aside time. Prayer is not work and we certainly do not want to turn it into a task that we have to accomplish to 'fulfill all righteousness'. It is a free gift for believers to use as often as they are able. This book, like the others in the series, is a very easy and quick read. If you are intent on increasing your prayer life, I encourage you to include this book in your reading. I truly believe it can be a blessing for you. If you would like to discuss it after you are finished I would love to talk with you.

Introduction to the Divine Service

Notes on the Liturgy #20 – Agnus Dei

The Agnus Dei was introduced to the liturgy of the church by Pope Sergius I about 700A.D. *Agnus Dei* means *Lamb of God*. It is based on the words of John the Baptizer as he testified that Jesus is the Son of God. What a wonderful passage to sing! It fills me with joy simply contemplating these marvelous words.

Christ, the Lamb of God, who was present in the flesh with John the Baptizer almost 2,000 years ago is also present in the flesh with me and all believers. But, how has He come? As a harsh Law giver? No, He comes as a Lamb in self-sacrifice for us! He comes to us in His body and blood. The church by faith recognizes this and so cries out *Lamb of God have mercy upon us*. Jesus does indeed have mercy on us! That mercy is given into our mouths as we receive the holy elements of the Lord's Supper.

At this point, these liturgy notes may seem somewhat repetitious. You see, ever since the Preface we have had a singular focus of receiving God's gifts in the Lord's Supper. This is the value of the liturgy. It has faithfully pointed us to God's gifts time and again.

Board of Stewardship

Have you ever noticed the subtle ceremony of receiving the offerings during the Divine Service? The offerings are collected in plates or baskets, and they are brought forward and given to the pastor or an assistant. The pastor turns toward the altar, and, as he slightly bows his head, the offerings are raised slightly to the Lord and placed on the altar or an adjacent table.

Why do we have this ceremony? And what does it teach us? For that is what ceremony does – it teaches, as the Augsburg Confession tells us what we need to know about Christ (AC XXIV, 1–3).

Originally, this ceremony included more than simply bringing forward what was collected in the offering plates. The elements for the Holy Communion – the bread and the wine – were brought forward with the offerings. The offerings and elements were lifted toward the Lord and placed upon the altar. The altar, now made a table, would be set for the Lord's Supper.

Gifts brought to the altar come from the sweat of His people's brow. They are the bread and wine, the fruits of His people's labor in this fallen world. After six days of labor and toil, the people are to bring a generous proportion for the Lord's work. Gifts set upon the altar are offered to the Lord for Him to take up and press into service for His gracious work.

For what is offered to the Lord from the sweat of His people's brow – the bread of anxious toil – comes back to us as the bread of life. The bread comes down from heaven that whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup will receive life through the forgiveness of their sins.

This is not unlike what the Lord did for His people in the Old Testament:

"You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always. And if the way is too long for you, so that you are not able to carry the

tithe, when the Lord your God blesses you, because the place is too far from you, which the Lord your God chooses, to set his name there, then you shall turn it into money and bind up the money in your hand and go to the place that the Lord your God chooses and spend the money for whatever you desire – oxen or sheep or wine or strong drink, whatever your appetite craves. And you shall eat there before the Lord your God and rejoice, you and your household." (Deut. 14:22-26)

What a blessing! God provides for us in all things. He provides bread from the sweat of our brows. He receives this from us in the first-fruits offerings we give to Him in thanksgiving and praise, and He turns these into spiritual bread. He gives this heavenly bread – the bread of eternal life – back to us so we might have joy.

So, the next time you are in the Divine Service, watch this ceremony in wonder. The offerings we have given to Him, the Lord gives back to us in His supper so that we may rejoice in the salvation He won for us upon the cross.

Pray without ceasing

Luther famously wrote that there are three things that make a theologian (and this applies to all Christians):

- (1) prayer;
- (2) meditation on God's Word; and
- (3) trials.

He then observed that the trials we experience really bring it all together. They drive us to rely on God's Word, and they drive us into prayer. He quipped, "I thank God for the pope. Through all his ranting and raving, he's made me a pretty good theologian."

Trials always come. You have yours; I have mine. They tempt us to believe that the Gospel is not ours, that Scripture is not true, that God does not really love us, that He might even hate us and want to punish us, if He exists at all. The art of being a Christian is, in large measure, believing in God against God. We believe the clear Word of the Gospel of free forgiveness and trust in Baptism, Absolution and Christ's body and blood in the Supper for forgiveness. We trust His promises against the pain, death, spiritual struggles and disappointments we so often experience in this life and which God allows and even brings upon us. Does God will suffering? Contemplate Jesus' prayer in the garden for the answer: "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done" (Luke 22:42). The art of being a Christian is to experience suffering, yet to trust that it is sent for good, not harm. It is to pray with Job: "Though [God] slay me, I will hope in him" (Job 13:15).

In my feeble walk of faith, in my challenged prayer life, through a multitude of trials, the Psalms have been a solace. Raising children and grandchildren; facing illness, tragedy or problems in the family or at work; struggling with faith due to assaults of the sinful flesh and the devil — all drive us to prayer and meditation on God's Word. That's how God makes "theologians" or "Christians" of us. That's what He did with the prophets too (Gen. 22). That's what He did with the apostles (2 Cor. 12). That's what He does with you. "Why, O Lord, do you stand far away? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?" (Ps. 10:1).

Open on my kneeler is the LSB Altar Book, which contains all the Psalms. The Psalms are God's prayer book especially for us. Jesus had them memorized. They express the full range of human emotion — frustration, pain, faithlessness, but also happiness, joy and steadfastness. They tell us who God is and how He regards us. They have their own contexts, like prayers for royal events. But they console us now because they tell us that God acted in the past, even as He promises to act today and shall continue to act for the well-being of His saints into the future (Ps. 145). The enemies of the faithful remain the same: the devil, the world and our flesh. The weaknesses of Christians are the same: doubt, sin and faithlessness.

My trials have driven me to the Psalms. I am daily shocked and delighted at how the words I pray from 3,000 years ago are so applicable now. I am struck low by the Law and raised to life by the Gospel. "I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord,' and you forgave the iniquity of my sin" (Ps. 32:5; see Ps. 130; 143). I resonate with the complaints of David (Ps. 9; 10; 124; 129). I am led by the words to give thanks to God for all His manifold blessings to the contrite (Ps. 147). And time and time again, the inspired and living words of these prayers pray me into joy and rejoicing. "Be glad in the Lord, and rejoice, O righteous, and shout for joy, all you upright in heart!" (Ps. 32:11; see Ps. 122; 126). I am consoled by the Lord's promises (Ps. 119:151).

More than any other prayers, the Psalms lead us directly to the life St. Paul wills for us because it is Christ's will for us. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thess. 5:16–18).
