#### From Our Pastor

God bless you with peace and joy...

We'll be celebrating Easter about the same time you receive this newsletter. Have you ever thought about where the word Easter comes from? One theory is that it came from a goddess named Eostre, who represented spring and fertility. Pagans celebrated her in a month they called Eosturmonath which corresponds to what we now call April. But language experts are quick to say there's no historical source that confirms this. The fact is Easter is a very old word that people began to use over 1000 years ago.

Another theory is that the word comes from an older German word for east, which comes from an even older Latin word for dawn. Spring dawns signal the beginning of days that are longer than nights and those dawns break in the east. Many European languages, like French, have words for Easter that come directly from the Hebrew word for Passover, the religious festival that celebrates the Jewish people's freedom from slavery in Egypt. I think it's safe to say we don't know the origin of the word Easter. What we do know is the incredible, miraculous and life-changing event that occurred on that day Christians now call Easter.

Christianity is unlike any other religion that has ever existed. Every other religion teaches people they have to earn their way to God. Christianity is the only religion that teaches that God came to us. Romans 5:8 tells us that ...God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Other religions have systems of rules that have to be followed in order to pacify and appease their god in the hope that they will be rewarded. Christianity is a relationship with God that God establishes. We don't have to humor God to receive His favor. He has already shown us His love for us by sending Jesus to die on a cross in our place, for our sins. The separation between us and God is repaired and we don't have to do a thing.

Lastly, no other religion has an empty tomb. Every other major religious leader is dead. We're the only people who follow a leader who died and came back to life. The tomb is empty because Jesus rose from the dead. Matthew reminds us of this truth: He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay.

I'm looking forward to this Easter season like I always do but this year a little bit more. Last year was difficult for all of us in many ways - as a country, as a culture, and for many of us on a very personal level. Easter brings with it pictures of new birth and a fresh start. I pray that we all feel that throughout this season and this year. And I'm also eagerly anticipating your joyous response when I shout the traditional Easter proclamation with which I end this message:

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

Below is a letter from LCMS President Rev. Matthew Harrison -

Christ is risen!!! He is risen indeed!! Alleluia!

Let those words ring out as you celebrate the Lord's resurrection this year on Easter. Let those words ring out as you welcome this spring and coming summer with certain and sure hope. Let those words ring out as you speak to one another with songs and hymns and spiritual songs (Col. 3:16). Let those words ring out as you give thanks in all circumstances (1 Thess. 5:18).

"Because I live, you also will live" (John 14:19). These words of Jesus change everything. Jesus spoke these words to His disciples on the night before His crucifixion. He had given them His Holy Supper. He had washed their feet. He taught them. But they had no idea what lie ahead in the next 24 hours.

The disciples faced the anguish of loss. The loss of a friend to death, the loss of their daily routines, the loss of their teacher, the loss of hearing His words. But even worse than all that, the loss of hope. With the crucifixion, their hearts were troubled, and it seemed that the world had won. It seemed that the government had squashed Jesus. It seemed that the religious leaders had succeeded in silencing this voice of God. It seemed like Israel had lost her hope.

Many today feel lost and hopeless. Many wonder where hope could possibly be found. Some turn to science or social healing. Many turn to wealth or knowledge. Too many turn to entertainment and social media. All of us are tempted to turn to ourselves to find hope.

Yet Jesus told His disciples that night, "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). He reminds us of the same truth. The cross was a defeat, but not of Jesus. The cross was Jesus' defeat of all the things that cause you and me to lose hope. Jesus conquered sin, death and the power of the devil. Jesus paid for your sins and mine on the cross. Far from failing or losing, Jesus bore in His body on the tree the sins of all mankind. And God is now reconciled to sinners through the death of that righteous one.

Yet Jesus did not remain on the cross and He did not remain dead. He rose. And now He says to you and to me and to all who believe, "Because I live, you also will live." Christ is risen!!! There is nothing more sure and certain in this life than the life of God's own Son. There is nothing more solid for us to build our lives on than the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Because He lives, we will live. Absolutely certain.

But not everyone knows this wonderful Good News. That is why the church witnesses to this world of God's love and mercy in Jesus Christ. The LCMS works tirelessly to tell every sinner in this world that sin and death have been conquered.

#### Reflections of the Events of 2020 Global Pandemic – Covid-19 Patty Malone

Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church was all geared up to celebrate our  $100^{th}$  Anniversary then the global pandemic hit! We all had questions, how long will this last, will it even get to our city, it cannot happen to us...but it did. All the plans made for the  $100^{th}$  anniversary had to be cancelled. No celebration dinner, guest Pastors, Last Supper play, potlucks and so much more gone but was it? We have been around 100 years and we could not let a pandemic get in the way of our churchs' mission. We still had employees and bills that needed paid but how is that done when the church doors are locked? The normal as we knew it was no more. We had to adapt and figure out a way to get the Gospel to our people and to all people.

In the beginning of the pandemic everything just stopped, fear was everywhere, people shopped so they would have everything they needed at home and not have to leave. The leadership of Trinity was trying to figure out what to do too. Eventually, we were able to have prerecorded services done with Bud & Lynn Hubert's cell phone, Stephen playing the organ or piano and Pastor preaching. It wasn't what we were used to, but it was something we took comfort in. Being able to hear Pastor preach from the church even though we were not allowed to enter the building to hear.

We had stepped into the 21<sup>st</sup> century with an on-line presence for the first time ever. Pastor's words reached more than just the members of Trinity they reached others some of who we know and some that we did not know. The Worship Service could be found on our webpage, Facebook and YouTube. Who would have thought that a global pandemic would bring us to this new technology to Trinity? Jumping ahead a few months the church doors were opened with social distancing, masks and hand sanitizing (thank you Justin for making the hand sanitation station). This was the new normal. The leadership knew many people would still not be coming back into the building just yet, so the recordings continued along with in person worship.

A confirmed son of Trinity, Mr. Robertson listening from California to our services sent the church an e-mail asking what we were using to record our services. After speaking to Bud since he was the one recording the services, he offered to upgrade our sound system. With Mr. Robertson's generous offer, we were able to install a new sound system with live streaming capabilities so Bud could stop using his cell phone. Now each Sunday our service is live streamed in real-time. Thank you, Mr. Robertson!

So, looking back at 2020 it was a year we will not soon forget! It is also a year where we came together even though apart and it is my hope that family and faith will remain forefront in our lives once this pandemic is behind us!

May God continue to bless every one of you today, tomorrow and always!

Highlights – Witness (as deacon) to infant baptism of Owen Clute, observing Mother's Day in the back yard, attending the high school graduation of youngest grandson Jonathon Leiding in a condensed, walk-through ceremony, having lunch and fellowship in home of Charlotte Gunther with a few Trinity Lutheran School teachers, tooth extraction (Ouch!), tour of Michelangelo's Sistine Ceiling frescoes displayed at MacArthur Mall, and relaxing during three out of town vacation trips.

<u>Thankful</u> – Facing each day with spouse of many years, forgiveness of sins, healthy bodies, blessings and freedoms that we both enjoy.

Reflection of the Events of 2020 Rev. Jonathan Meraz November 10, 2020

The chairperson of our Board of Special Ministries (Patty Malone) has encouraged us to reflect on this extremely unusual year for posterity. I think that idea is inspired and will try to put down in a few words what this year has done to and for me. I'll also try to include a few perceptions and observations of this Trinity family that I'm privileged to serve.

2020 is the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of this congregation. We had spent many months planning events, festivities, and speakers. Many of the pastors who served Trinity previously had committed to returning to preach on special Sundays throughout the year. A big celebration was planned to be held at *Grand Affairs* in VB near the anniversary date. Outreach activities were scheduled. All of this came to a grinding halt in the middle of Lent with the arrival of the Coronavirus (Covid-19).

Many restrictions were put in place to try to protect us from an illness that we knew very little about. A new term was introduced (at least it was new to me) - social distancing. The government and the CDC 'mandated' that people maintain a 6'distance between them. The wearing of facial masks to restrain droplets expelled by respirations became the norm. Businesses shut down, employees were told to work from home, laid off or dismissed from their jobs. And churches were told they should no longer worship together in person.

We already had some experience recording and posting services online from the previous year. Now this was the only option if people were going to be served by the church. Bud and Lynn Hubert recorded services on their cell phone and posted those services on Facebook, YouTube and our church website. Stephen Pruitt, our Music Director, played the organ, I preached and Lynn and I sang.

We recorded midweek and posted on Saturdays. We finished the last few weeks of Lent, both midweek and Sunday services. We recorded the Easter service in the empty church and posted it. People were absent through the season of Pentecost.

There were a number of starts and stops nationally as doctors and scientists became more familiar with the virus. A couple weeks before Memorial Day the Virginia governor moved from the most restricted phase to Phase 2. This allowed churches to worship in person if they could maintain the safety protocols that had been established. We began to offer in person worship. People were only allowed to enter through the parking lot entrance. They had to be masked at all times. They had to maintain social distance.

We seated people by singles, couples and families. We used every other pew and seating was staggered - aisle side, two pews back wall side, two pews back aisle side again. Communion wasn't being offered yet. People in highly susceptible groups like the aged (65+) and those dealing with chronic illness (diabetics, people with high blood pressure, etc.) were discouraged from attending per CDC guidelines.

We continued this way until the middle of summer when Virginia moved to Phase 3. We now began to include communion in the service twice a month (still a departure from our every Sunday practice before Covid-19). There was a strict process in the distribution. I prepared the Sacrament alone to keep multiple hands off of it. People would come to the rail the same way they were seated, one pew at a time, whether single, couple or family. I was thankful that we could resume this practice. I also began to visit and commune shut-ins who were comfortable with me being in their home.

It would seem that all of this would have a strong effect on the members of Trinity. I believe it did but the effect hasn't been a negative one. I think many members developed a new love and respect for God, His Word and the Sacraments or strengthened an existing one. Sometimes we don't realize how much we love or need something or someone until it or they are taken away from us.

Many members have strengthened their bond with each other, in spite of the separation. Members check on each other by phone or social media like family. They have responded well with their gifts. Many who hadn't been connected to worship for a while for various reasons are now worshipping online through the recorded services. After watching the cell phone recorded services online, one of our members (Richard Robertson) was moved to personally fund a new and improved Audio/Visual capability, purchasing new recording cameras and upgrading the sound system. We can now live stream service and upload directly to YouTube and our website. God has used this time for His own purposes and I'm thankful for it.

For me, as difficult as it has been, this time has included many blessings. I've been able to sit back and reset the priorities in my life. We all lead such busy lives that we can be distracted from the things that are most important. I've had time to reflect on the gifts of family and friends. I've been able to spend a substantial amount of time with my wife (who is a nurse working through this time of virus). The congregation has been very supportive of me in all respects including continuing to provide me with an income (as I said before, not all were so fortunate). When I look closely, God has used this pandemic for good.

There's so much more to write but I'll stop here. I pray that those reading this will also be blessed with the opportunity to examine and, if needed, reset their lives. God allows or even causes things to happen that may appear to us to be bad or harmful, but He has His plan and uses those things for our salvation. Even in the face of pandemic God is good all the time - all the time, God is good.

#### November 9, 2020 Sarah Mosel, Daughter of Pastor Meraz, Omaha, Nebraska

How has this pandemic changed things? WOW, what a question. I think there are so many things that have happened or perhaps they have been happening and I had the time to slow down and realize it in that past 8-10 months. When this all started to really progress around March-April of 2020, the biggest initial impact for me was that the month I enjoy most in sports came to a screeching halt as they cancelled the 2020 NCAA basket-ball tournament better known as March Madness. It was at that moment, as I sat having drinks with a couple of friends that I knew this wasn't a joke. What would have been a night of celebration of teams making the tournament quickly became a somewhat scary situation as we watched things quickly unfold on the televisions that would have been airing excited college teams chasing after their basketball dreams. The cancelling of sports for the current seasons wasn't the biggest impact, although a very eerie feeling to have no access to live, televised competition which I hadn't previously realized fuels my social life.

I also teach third grade at a public school. The same week that sports were cancelled, school was also significantly impacted with our in person teaching shifting to teaching our children 100% remotely. This caused a lot of friction and chaos within our school community as parents tried to navigate becoming a part-time teacher while also trying to maintain their jobs which may or may not have also been shifted to remote. Those families that were unable to work remotely were put in a very tough position trying to find full time care for their child. The jobs of "day care providers" became even more intense as they were trying to meet expectations of children from different school districts maintaining their online schedules and remote work. I once concluded that one of the more challenging aspects of teaching was to find ways to motivate kids to want to learn and complete their work—that conclusion magnified X10 while working remotely. School academics quickly became secondary to checking in with kids and connecting to one another as we all sort of lived in a life of isolation with our families. There were and still are lots of emotions and ups and downs. My job as an educator became more important than ever before and in a powerful way. I took on the role of just maintaining calm and checking in while trying to provide a schedule for students to follow and work that was manageable without the presence of an instructor. Families were reaching out for help and sometimes it was simple conversations where parents just wanted and needed to vent. At this time, I knew that my own mental health was essential in order for me to serve others in this way that God was calling.

My own family has fared pretty well with the transition. As a mom of a 2-year-old and a husband who now was working remotely, we quickly had to set some boundaries and learn how to communicate effectively while feeling the emotional impact that it seems this pandemic has had on everyone. It was an interesting time of finding new ways to connect with others. We FaceTimed with family, Zoomed board game parties with friends and had Google Hangouts video time to just chat and have a socially distanced drink with one another. I found peace in the fact that I was isolated with my own family whom I love so much. I felt very blessed to be in that position as I know that was not the case for every family. I really homed in on being aware of my own feelings and tried to remember the things that I teach my own students every year—name the feeling, talk about it, don't dwell, plan for what is next and seek support.

As time has passed and I've experienced being scared, angry, sad, lonely and now content, I have realized that this pandemic has shifted my world for the better and that maybe this is God's purpose for this obstacle of a year. I was forced to slow down which in turn helped me realize the benefits of a more simplified routine. I realized that my connections with other people are an important part of my life and I've really tried to strengthen those connections. I was forced to remember that I am not in charge and as a result have become better at giving my anxieties to God, who is and always has been, ultimately in charge. I have accepted that sometimes his plan doesn't match mine but that maybe that isn't such a bad thing. My bond with my family is stronger than ever. My world at work as an educator has changed drastically, but looking back, I feel that is was a necessary change in order to better serve our kids for their future jobs. This time has taught me as an educator, not to teach how to use technology (most kids are better at that than I am anyway) but instead to teach them how to set boundaries with it, how to communicate with it, how to problem solve and collaborate and the importance of using it as a tool. I continue to pray that I live according to God's will and that people see Him through me. I pray for everyone's safety and health and that our world leaders do so according to God's will. This pandemic hasn't been easy, but I value the good that has come from it in my own life.

We played board games several nights, went swimming in our daughter-in-law's parent's pool, took walks, watched movies and went to the VIBE district to look at the art. All of this was able to be done with masks and social distancing. I do believe the worst part of the trip was her long drive from TN to VA, as normally she flies but we did not want her getting on an airplane.

I had the honor to be present when Rebecca and Tyler Clute had their son baptized. As Pastor Meraz performed the baptism, Sharyn Leiding and I came together to witness as Owen became a baptized child of God.

Our family enjoyed the prerecorded worship services at the beginning of the pandemic and once church was opened for in person we came back. I felt so good to worship again in the sanctuary with our Trinity family. Even though we had to social distance and wear masks. A special thank you to Pastor, Stephen, Bud and Lynn for getting together to make the prerecorded worship services possible.

We didn't go on our normal family vacation but stayed close with family and friends via the phone and the U.S. Post Office. Not the same but it sure is nice to be in touch with people however we can.

As the team lead for Special Ministries, I wanted to make sure Trinity was still doing the work of the church. Below you will find how we kept busy during 2020.

Trinity at the beginning of the pandemic was closed but our mission was not. Always keeping in mind, the safety of our congregation and the new normal of social distancing. On Easter Sunday when the church stood empty, we all made a difference by coming by throughout the day and flowering the cross on the church lawn. What a wonderful witness to all that drove by 6001 Granby St. on Easter Sunday the cross looked beautiful!

We were not able to serve at the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia in person, but we could collect food for those in our community who so desperately needed the assistance. Three food drives were set-up, during the time when we should have been volunteering, with each one offering a drive-by option to allow for social distancing. Even some of the church neighbors dropped off donations. Trinity was able to collect **1,447 pounds** of food which equates to **1,117 meals** for those in need.

We were unable to have *Christmas in July*, but we were able to take a shoebox or two and fill them up for "*Operation Christmas Child*". In total we collected **21** shoeboxes and they were delivered in time for Christmas halfway around the world to Tanzania.

Trinity started collecting pajamas for *Pajama Jam* a local non-profit through Lent. We were going to start collecting them in September but moved it due to the food drives. This was the first time we are collecting the pajamas and we are very excited. This 501(c)3 organization is dedicated to delivering new pajamas to children in need in Hampton Roads since 2009. They have delivered over 10,000 pairs to children in our community since 2009. We are so excited to be a part of this mission outreach this year.

#### **ART MINISTRY**

Every month Missionary Ruth Maita and Deaconess Christel Neuendorf host a craft morning one Saturday in Ponce and one in Mayaguez. We invite those that we visit as well as those who have been attending our weekly Facebook art classes. Our art ministry helps provide opportunities for us to minister to individual's social and emotional health by providing a time of fellowship. It's been a great blessing to gather together around crafts and the Word of God, as well as being able to see those we have not seen very much over this last year.

#### **ESL MINISTRY**

Teaching English as a Second language has been a big part of ministry in Puerto Rico.

During the months of November and December, we started English classes for children which has helped us connect with new families. During these classes we have used Bible stories to teach vocabulary while sharing the Gospel of Jesus. Some of the children that were involved in our English classes are now involved in our Club de Exploradores de la Creación- our children's Bible school ministry. A few students mentioned that they did not own a Bible, so we sent them a bilingual children's Bible with the stories in both Spanish and English. Our English classes are connecting children and families to the Gospel and Mercy of Jesus.

We started our third round of ESL adult conversation classes in the middle of January with the help of LCMS volunteers, with about 21 students in attendance; 10 on Tuesday and 11 on Thursday. Our kid's English program also started up again at the same time. For the children's English ministry, we have 4 different classes a week with kids separated by ages with a total of 12 kids. We have begun to make visits to the students and their families while continuing to share the Gospel of Jesus with them through the English classes.

#### **Education Centers Remodel**

During the Month of January our team has been working together to create and remodel our education rooms in both CARD locations.

<u>In Ponce</u>, there is a small building behind the church building that was used for offices from the previous owner. This month it has been cleaned up and rewired to be a place for Bible classes, Sunday school, workshops, etc. One big improvement was a ramp for anyone needing extra assistance to enter.

<u>In Mayaguez</u>, we are reworking the space at our CARD house in order to serve our students and volunteers better. Originally, all the classrooms and offices were upstairs in the house and the lower levels were apartments for short term teams. After consideration the apartment space would work the best for a class that could hold in person and virtual classes. We have done a location swap and moved all bunkbeds upstairs and the lower level will be our education center for art, music classes, and English classes as well as for workshop.


