Introduction to the Divine Service THE INVOCATION

There are three significant elements in regard to the invocation. First, when the pastor calls out, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit," it acts as a simple creed. We are confessing whom we believe the one true God is. We worship the Trinity and none other. When outsiders come to the Divine Service, if they are paying attention, they will realize that the people they are with are worshipping the Triune God. We are clear right up front, in whose name we gather and who we are worshipping.

Second, in the Invocation, we are asking for and acknowledging God's presence in the service. "For where two or three come together in my name, there am I with them."

Finally, it is significant that the Invocation is accompanied by the sign of the cross. We received both the name of the Trinity and the sign of the cross at Baptism. We received the name of the Trinity by divine command. Since Baptism gives us the benefits of the cross, the sign of the cross was placed upon us according to the tradition of the catholic (universal) church. This then should be a reminder to us that God, who washed us and claimed us in Baptism, is the one who has brought us into the worshiping community. "We do not come as those who deserve to come because of what we have done." We come because He has called us through the Holy Spirit in the water and Word of Baptism.

Why? So that we may lead a peaceful godly and dignified life. (1Tim 2:1-2a) which is pleasing to God our Savior. How does this please God? Because God desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth v4. Knowing this we actively intercede in the Kingdom of the left through elections and mindfully praying for those in authority to follow God's word and will.

It is good for Christians to desire public servants to parallel the word of God or at least work with eyes set upon good governance which serves to provide for the Christian Church to exist in peace and unhindered freedom to communicate the Gospel truth to all.

Celebrating Stewardship

(Below is an excerpt from STEWARDCAST, a monthly e-newsletter of LCMS Stewardship)

For most, the concept of celebrating stewardship sounds a bit tinny on the ear. One might wonder just how to celebrate something that most pastors and congregations dread. After all, the mere mention of stewardship sends many men reaching for their wallets and women clutching their purses. This dread comes from too many years of stewardship committees and pastors only teaching about stewardship when there was a lack of resources for ministry. For someone to suggest that there be a celebration of stewardship sounds about as appealing as celebrating a root canal performed without Novocain.

But stewardship is indeed something over which the individual steward and congregation can and should celebrate. Why? Because stewardship is not about what we do, about what we decide to give or even how we decide to give. As the LCMS defines it, Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of God's family — the church — in managing life's resources for His purposes. This stewardship is free and joyous because everything we have been created to steward comes to us from God. St. James writes:

"Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of first fruits of his creatures" (JAMES 1:17-18). Our Lord does not burden with gifts. In fact, Luther's explanation to the First Article of the Creed reminds us that our Father in heaven gives these gifts "only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy without any merit or worthiness in me." The Lord sets the crown of His creation in a position to manage those gifts in a way that is pleasing to Him and joyful for us! When stewardship is seen this way, how can one NOT celebrate stewardship?



The purpose of the Board of Stewardship is to help members of the congregation grow as faithful stewards of Jesus Christ as they carry out His mission and ministry in their personal lives and corporately through the congregation, Circuit, District and Synod. We look at our spiritual gifts and how we use our time and talents as well as our monetary gifts to further the mission of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Our current fiscal year ended July 31, 2016. As reported in the bulletin at the end of June we are \$27,122.13 short of meeting our budget. There are certain things in our budget that we have to pay like the salaries of our pastor, organist, secretary, sexton, bookkeeper, and custodian. We have to pay for our building, electricity, gas, water, sewage. When we are short on funds the things that suffer are our missions, our outreach programs, our Christian education programs etc. I encourage you to pray about your Stewardship involvement at Trinity. Without the gifts of your talents and your tithes Trinity would have a hard time existing.

If Stewardship is something you are interested in we are looking for someone to head the Stewardship Committee. We need someone whose talent is to help us all identify and celebrate Stewardship!

IS IT ACCEPTABLE TO PAUSE TITHING IN TOUGH FINANCIAL TIMES?

The Bible does not mention anything about "pausing" tithing. Neither does it say that we will go to Hell if we do not tithe.

The tithe, which is a scriptural mandate, was not instituted for God's benefit because He already has all the money He needs. He does not need our money.

So why does He ask us to give 10% to Him? **Tithing** was created for our benefit. It is to teach us how to keep God first in our lives and how to be unselfish people. Unselfish people make better husbands, wives, friends, relatives, employees and employers. God is trying to teach us how to prosper over time.

Many people have observed that after they stopped tithing, their finances seemed to get worse. In the Book of Malachi, God promises that if you do not rob Him of your tithing, He will rebuke your devourers and protect you.

If you cannot live off 90% of your income, then you cannot live off 100%. It does not require a miracle for you to get through the month. I think that if you sit down and look at your budget, you will see that you can make it while giving at least 10%. Read the Bible and take from it what you will, and if you tithe, do it out of love for God, not guilt.

I do not beat people up for not tithing because Jesus certainly did not, but let me encourage you to keep tithing.


LWML

The Executive Board of the LWML will be meeting in August to plan our next year of service. Please review the list below of some of the items that the ladies of the LWML are responsible for at Trinity. As always we appreciate your support!

The LWML meets September through June on the second Saturday of specific months at 10:00 a.m. Our meetings usually consist of a brunch, small devotion, minutes of last meeting and conducting the business at hand and new business.

Altar Guild – The ladies (and sometimes their husbands) keep the sanctuary clean for Worship/Communion. This falls under the Altar Guild, which is an off shoot of the LWML.



Welcome Center – Have you been enjoying the coffee, snacks and fellowship in the Welcome Center on Sunday mornings? This is all done under the hat of LWML. You can volunteer to bring a snack by signing up on the Hostess Sheet in the Welcome Center. You can volunteer for after the early or late service. After the late service, the hostess rinses out the coffee pots with warm water and cleans up the food table. Plates and napkins are furnished by LWML. Donations go toward our mission work.

Receptions – The ladies are also responsible for providing receptions that are held in Belvedere Hall. Usually this occurs following a funeral as requested by the family. This requires phone calls to ask people to bring food for the bereaved families and their friends. The ladies then gather to set up, serve and clean up for the reception. It takes many hands to make each reception a success.



Prayer Shawl Ministry - We are always looking for those who know how to knit, crochet or work a loom. As the shawl is made, we ask that the preparer offers prayers to the Lord for the protection, comfort, and

blessings for the shawl's recipient. The completed shawls are placed on the altar railing, the ladies then gather as a league and kneel at the altar and we pray that God would bless the shawl and its recipient. We pray that as the recipient wears the shawl, that they receive warmth and comfort from it, and that they feel the "hugs" from Trinity's LWML.

Pantry Fund - The LWML is the custodian of this account. The money for this fund comes through offering envelopes and through direct contributions. The Pantry Fund was established after the food pantry was closed at Trinity. Money has been given to the Union Mission, the pantry at St. Timothy Lutheran Church and to help Special Ministries with their outreach programs to the homeless. This fund may also be used by the Pastor if he knows of someone who is in need of food.

Sanctuary Fund - This fund was turned over to the LWML to be its custodian because of the LWML Altar Guild which handles the upkeep of the altar needs (fair linen, purificators, communion wafers, wine and candle oil). Other expenditures include palms for Palm Sunday, the dry cleaning of stoles and paraments, and the purchase of baptismal napkins.

Laura Johnson Memorial Fund - The LWML is the custodian of this account. This fund provides for funeral receptions (at church or in the home), flowers or other appropriate acknowledgements of care and concern. Members help to fund this account through memorials, "Blessings received", and direct contributions.

Altar Flowers - Everyone enjoys seeing the beautiful flowers adorning our altar on Sunday mornings. If you have a special event or recognition please consider signing up to provide flowers one Sunday. The Flower chart is located in the hallway across from the office. We would really appreciate any donations to the Flower Fund even if you don't have an occasion to place flowers on the altar. The LWML tries to make sure we have flowers on the altar for communion Sundays. Any help is greatly appreciated.

As you can see all that we do cannot be accomplished by only one or two ladies. This takes all of us. From providing a snack, to making a call, to dusting the altar, to working at a reception, all of these things are done to the Glory of God. Please watch the bulletin for upcoming dates of meetings and happenings and please join us!

Tin Roofs for Africa

Can you imagine going to a church that doesn't have a roof? If it was sunny outside, you might get sunburn. If it was raining, you would get wet. Many boys and girls who go to church in places like Tanzania and Madagascar on the continent of Africa have this experience every Sunday. Their church has walls but no roof! Many of these Churches are out in the country, near farms and fields, along dusty dirt roads. But when it is raining or storming, they can't have services. When the hot sun is beating down on them, it's hard to listen to the pastor.
