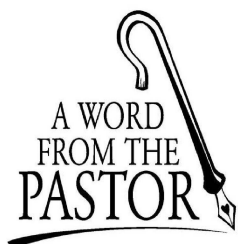

Light Has Come



Merry Christmas! Yes, I know it's January, but this is the Epiphany season - the Gentile Christmas. It's called that because we remember the Magi's visit to the Child Jesus. So early in Jesus' life God was already showing that His Son did not come for any one nation or group of people, He came for everyone who would receive Him for who He is. As a matter of fact, the entire season of Epiphany is a celebration of God revealing Himself to us in His Son Jesus.

Epiphany is from a Greek word, meaning to "reveal" or "make manifest." The season of Epiphany is our time to focus on the revelation of "who" Jesus is: both true God and true man. On the Festival of Epiphany, we hear the reading of the visit of the Magi. In that event, these foreigners bowed down in acknowledgment that this Child was indeed the Christ, the Son of God. Then we hear the account of the Baptism of Jesus. Here, God the Father confirms that this man standing in the water is His beloved Son. Next is the account of the changing of water into wine at Cana. Through this event, Jesus revealed His glory and His disciples put their faith in Him. In all these ways, God is shining the light of His love on a dark and sin-filled world by revealing to us our Savior Jesus.

Unfortunately, even though God has revealed the True Light in His Son Jesus, many misguided people still look for their Epiphany elsewhere. They grope around in their sin darkened world for some sort of light to show the way. To these lost souls we must bring the light of the Gospel of Jesus. It will be a difficult task because mankind's natural sinfulness will always try to stand alone and deny God. But like a candle in a darkened room - no matter the darkness, it cannot ignore the light. Shine the light of the Gospel and let the Holy Spirit do the rest.

For the Magi, the God who dwells in unapproachable light set the heavens ablaze and created a sign that led them to a child of flesh and blood like them. The hidden God was revealed. With them we behold the true Epiphany: In all our searching we could not come to God, but in Christ, God has come to us. Jesus is **Immanuel "God with us."** That is the Light that has come. God in flesh made manifest. Jesus Christ our Savior.

This Epiphany season, we will do well to remember the lesson that the ancient Magi teach. The heavens point not to a god above; removed, cold and distant; but to the God below - here with us to save us. If they had searched for a glorious king, they would have missed Him altogether. Instead they looked for Him in the place His Word said He would be: "**In Bethlehem in Judea . . . for this is what the prophet has written.**" Let's remember that the next time we are tempted to ignore the way God is and try to go after the way we want Him to be.

We may indeed see God in other places as well; Scripture says that the stars do proclaim His glory, but His mercy and love will not be found in them. Water, bread and wine, and words that come from mouths like yours and mine may not flash with heavenly glory. Nevertheless, they are where we will find our God. In them we have found our light - our Epiphany: God is with us. He has saved us from our sin. We will live with Him forever.

Board of Stewardship News

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin than stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.

Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have - whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time - is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.

Board of Evangelism News

We had about 30 participants for our Christmas caroling outing. It was an evening of sharing the joy of Christ's birth with six different households of shut ins. It was very rewarding to see and be a witness to our members who cannot join us for Sunday worship. The fellowship afterward was also very enjoyable and uplifting.

Ethiopia Project Visits

In the last month I had the opportunity to visit each of the projects in Ethiopia that LBT supports directly. I use the word “directly” because LBT supports work in over 20 languages in various ways. We work with the Department of Mission and Theology (DMT) which manages active translation projects as well as the Mekane Yesus Seminary which is training future translators for more language projects. The projects I visited are ones for which we provide funding.

I first made a trip to Arba Minch in the southwest part of the country with Rev. Dr. Lalissa, the DMT Director, and Solomon, the head of the Bible Translation division. Janine Pluger, an LBT missionary who serves as the Ethiopia Data Coordinator, also accompanied us. In Arba Minch we were joined by Rev. Getachew, the translation coordinator for the region.

We visited the Dhirytia project in Gidole. The New Testament was completed not long ago by another organization, and LBT started sponsoring the OT a couple years ago. There are three translators, but unfortunately two of them were not able to be there due to medical issues. We were able to meet the language committee and some of the reviewers. The local churches have been working to take ownership of the project, but the language community has recently been experiencing internal conflict which is making it difficult for them to support the work they way they would like.

We also visited the Zayse project. Similar to Dhirytia, the New Testament was recently completed by another organization and LBT is sponsoring the Old Testament. We were able to spend time with the three translators, the language committee and some of the reviewers. It was encouraging to hear the impact that scripture has already had on the community. One of the reviewers is a pastor who had received his theological training in a language of wider communication, not his heart language. He talked about how he had always preached and even prayed in that language. Older members of the congregation would ask him after church what he had said. When he became a reviewer he received training on how to read Zayse. Now he only preaches and prays in Zayse and no longer has to explain his sermon again after church.

A couple of weeks later I traveled to Assosa with Solomon, Janine and Rebuma (a manager for several translation projects). This time we went to visit the South Gumuz project. The New Testament has been available for several decades, but the Old Testament translation project was started a little over a year ago. Due to unrest in the area, the translators are not able to live and work in their home area, but are in another city. The security issues complicate many normal parts of the translation work, especially engaging the community. It also adds to the cost as the long and difficult transportation has to be included for each interaction. It was both sad to hear about the difficulties that were being faced and encouraging to see the translators still excited about the work.

Member Care Skill Building

As part of her role in member care, Ali has received a variety of training in lay counseling, workshop facilitation, debriefing, trauma, and more. These have all served her well over the years. With our move to Ethiopia last year, and the realization we should have more free time with the kids being in school all day instead of homeschooling, Ali was looking

for a professional development opportunity to complement her role. Now that everyone is more settled into our second year of life here, Ali joined a life coach training program in September.

Her weekly intensive classes have been both challenging and interesting. She gets to put into practice what she learns each week while meeting with her clients, pro bono of course. Ali will need to acquire 100 hours of coaching clients before she can pursue accreditation as a coach. Thankfully she will be able to use the coaching approach with LBT missionaries and staff to work towards this goal. Thinking through the reoccurring themes of missionary life, Ali is interested in the potential of becoming a transitions coach and help with life and ministry transitions that are so common in cross cultural work.

The kids

Kids have a propensity to grow and ours are now all taller than Ali. Ali is happy to use this to her advantage whenever she needs something that is just slightly out of reach. A shout of "hey, random tall person needed" is not an uncommon refrain coming from the kitchen.

Our kids are sometimes difficult to share updates about because they are not unlike American teens when you ask how is school or how they are doing. The response is always "fine" or "good." The truth is, though, that they really are fine and good. Hannah is enjoying playing volleyball this year and is honored to be the captain of her team. Levi is in what is possibly the most intensive year of high school in the Cambridge system. The first two years of high school in this system are equivalent to a full US high school diploma. He is doing well but it is definitely a challenge for him. Eden is content to be at school and content to be at home. She's our newest teenager, turning 13 at the beginning of September, and fits right into whatever group she is with. We have really enjoyed this stage of life with our teens. They are such capable people. Yes, it can be tricky to navigate at times, but it is overall enjoyable.
