

Which Heart for February



First of all, don't freak out by the cover art. We haven't "gone Catholic." The picture is of the "Sacred Heart of Jesus" from our Roman Catholic friends. We have theological differences about how this image receives "devotion" in the Roman Catholic Church, but we really have no problem with the image itself. Let me explain.

It is February. This month includes Valentine's Day. It is represented by a heart. Our modern celebration is all about "love" and includes cards,

flowers, candies, and many a disappointed heart when expressions of love (which took a lot of courage to state publically for some) are rejected. This modern celebration has dropped "Saint: from the name. Saint Valentine was a third century clergyman – either a priest or a bishop – in the Roman Empire who ministered to persecuted Christians. He was martyred and his body buried on February 14. That's where we get the date. From the High Middle Ages, his Saints' Day has been associated with a tradition of courtly love (you know, Knights and Damsels in distress and all that). That's where the "love" part comes from. Throw out the "saint" and the "courtly love" and you have what we have today - another "Hallmark Holiday" and an opportunity for Hershey, Lindt, and all the others to make a buck off of human hormones. (Did that sound cynical??)

Anyway, that's one heart to choose from for February. The other is that heart I started talking about, the "Sacred Heart of Jesus." The Sacred Heart is often depicted in Christian art as a flaming heart shining with divine light, pierced by the lance-wound, encircled by the crown of thorns, surmounted by a cross, and bleeding. That's Jesus on the cross for us! More than that though, it depicts the long-suffering love and compassion of the heart of Christ towards humanity. So, your choice is a heart emptied of all real meaning and used to make a buck or the heart of Jesus for the salvation of all mankind. Not just from a Christian point of view, but overall, the second sounds to me like an infinitely better heart for February and any time.

The long-suffering and compassionate heart of Jesus is what we need, what everyone needs, and that is what we will be focusing on this Lenten season. The special Lenten services in the evenings will look at the Seven Words spoken by Jesus from the Cross. Each one will show in a different way the suffering and loving heart of Jesus toward mankind whom He came to save by His death and resurrection. For instance, the first Wednesday service will look at when Jesus said, "Father, forgive them." Even as our sin was causing the need for Jesus' horrendous death on the cross, He did not lash out in Divine retribution, but rather, He asked His Father to forgive us. That forgiveness could only come by Jesus' sacrifice for us because the Law and it's penalty of death against us had to be satisfied. Jesus speaking forgiveness from the cross; that's exactly the long-suffering love and compassion of the heart of Jesus our Savior for us! We will continue to look at the rest of those beautiful words of Jesus from the cross that He spoke until He died and that Roman spear pierced His heart in death. (Lent may end there and with His burial but, you know that's NOT how things end. Easter victory will come.)

So, two hearts for February. Go ahead; buy that card, flowers, and candy if you want. But remember that all human love is imperfect and often doesn't last. But, the love of God in Christ is perfect and lasts forever. The heart of God in Christ is long-suffering and compassionate to all sinners. Won't you choose that heart and come an revel in that love, especially with our special Lenten services this year, and all through Lent, right into Easter?

Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, "you shall not murder," goes much deeper - down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22)

Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every "do not" in the commandments also includes a "do this:" "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but *help and support him in every physical need*" (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church's work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church's alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ.



Member Care Mania

Ali has had quite a number of opportunities to serve in a member care capacity here in Ethiopia. It has indeed been a busy season for her.

At the beginning of November, Ali, along with her friend and fellow member care provider from another organization, Hannele Secchia, facilitated a session for Ethiopian missionaries during their pre-field training. In this session, they discussed the Biblical basis for member care. Participants read Bible verses and shared how they can care for themselves and fellow missionaries on the field. Although the training was done in Amharic (through

translators), it was encouraging to hear what participants learned during this short session.

Hannele and Ali teamed up again in early December to talk to the grades 11 and 12 students at Bingham Academy, where our kids attend. This time the topic was Third Culture Kids (TCKs) and transition. Many of these students are planning to attend university outside of Ethiopia and we wanted to be able to share with them some of the things they may experience when leaving the country that they have called home, some of them for their entire lives. Ali was pleasantly surprised how quickly students engaged with the information. Even more so, it was exciting to hear from a few parents that their children were impacted by the session and were talking about it at home.

Sharpening Your Interpersonal Skills

The Sharpening Your Interpersonal Skills (SYIS) Workshop was held in Debre Zeit, Ethiopia about an hour outside of Addis Ababa. Ali wasn't originally planning to be part of the workshop team, but two facilitators were unable to participate due to illness and Ali was asked to step in. Paul had only returned from an extended trip to the US 36 hours before Ali headed out for this workshop. Although the timing wasn't ideal, Ali was reminded how much she loves being part of this workshop. This was a unique setup in that there were two sessions running simultaneously! Fifty participants, divided between two conference rooms with four facilitators for each session, made for quite a full venue. Even though it had been several years since Ali had facilitated an SYIS, she quickly found her way and was glad she could help out when this need arose.

Ali was invited to speak to the Pastoral Care and Trauma Healing class at the Mekane Yesus Seminary. She used her knowledge of trauma



together with the sessions she created for the Concordia Mission Institute last summer to present to the class. Ali shared about the basics of what trauma is, what happens to your body when you experience trauma, how to recognize the lasting impact of trauma, and how to care for yourself and others after trauma. It was interesting to hear what happens in different cultures as they respond to difficult circumstances. For some students, they were hearing this information for the first time. Others were either knowledgeable on the topic or had experienced the importance of caring for people post-trauma and not just trying to carry on with life as if nothing different had occurred.

Certified Professional Coach

Just before Christmas, Ali completed the coursework and requirements needed to become a certified professional coach. She plans to mainly use her coaching skills in the context of her role in member care with Lutheran Bible Translators. However, she is also able to use her training to coach others and has an interest in working with women who are experiencing transitions internationally. It will be interesting to see how her interest in and knowledge of trauma can also inform her coaching. Her next goal is to log 100 hours of coaching so that she can apply for certification through the International Coaching Federation (ICF).

Lots of Visits to the Doctor

Levi was innocently playing tag at school one day and as he fell, his thumb is what caught him. Although it looked a little gnarly at first, the school nurse didn't think it was a major injury but suggested an x-ray to be safe. Guess what? It was broken and needed a procedure to set it. We were truly blessed by the missionary community through this process. A pediatric orthopedic surgeon at a hospital that specializes in caring for cleft palates, clubfoot, and the like, had heard about Levi's injury through some mutual friends and asked to see him. Upon his evaluation, he asked us to bring Levi to the hospital to have the bone set and they added a wire to make sure it was stable as it healed. All of this was done free of charge, as is all of the medical care at that facility. Levi had a cast for 3 weeks and was not allowed to participate in any sports until just



before Christmas. It was hard for him to miss out on events at school as he was hoping to join the track team this year, but he persevered!

The week of Thanksgiving, Eden had complained of stomach pains that were similar to what she had experienced a few times in Ghana when she had to be admitted to hospital for treatments. Although we never got clear answers then, we knew it couldn't be treated at home, so we took her straight to the pediatrician. After a few tests, he arranged for us



to go to a trusted hospital for further evaluation. For the first time, we really felt as if the doctors listened to us as we shared what Eden had experienced in the past and how it was treated. We told of our concerns that no previous solution was really clear and that these illnesses are painful and traumatic for Eden. They treated Eden with kindness and gentleness and spoke to us about a plan that would require surgery but hopefully put an end to these issues. Paul and Ali were able to take turns being with Eden in the hospital, even staying in her room overnight. She did have surgery and it went very well. Although she is now functioning normally, her physical activity will continue to be restricted until early in the new year. We hope and pray that this is the end of these problems for Eden.
