The Seven Last
words of Jesus
on the Cross

Jesus Speaks Love to Us from the Cross



As I said in the Ash Wednesday sermon, Lent is not a season of despair. Lent is a season of both reflection and hope. Into the truth that we are dust and that we don't deserve any goodness from God our Lord speaks. He speaks from His cross where He hangs; suffering and dying for our sins. Among the agony and the bloody death we have caused Him and which He has gladly taken up He speaks to us words of love and hope and comfort. This Lenten season we are looking at these words Jesus speaks to us even as He is suffering and dying for us.

As He looks down on those who by their sin would crucify Him again - and yes, that includes us - His first words from the cross still come to the Father: "Forgive them, for the know not what they do." The Father still hears. The Father still forgives for the sake of His Son.

The second word from the cross is the personal assurance Jesus gives to the repentant thief: "Today you will be with Me in paradise." Surely we need that compassion today, we who have robbed God of so much.

Again our Savior speaks. This time it is a word of provision. "Woman, behold, your son!" Then He said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother!" Jesus, who is honoring His heavenly Father by doing His will and dying for the sins of the world, honors also His earthly mother by making provision for her. He follows the Law for us, to the letter and in its spirit, by honoring the fourth commandment to honor our parents.

The Son next cries out, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" He reminds us that the Father has forsaken His Son with your sin, so that He will never forsake you.

Jesus' simple word, "I, thirst," reminds us that we are not alone in our suffering. He is our great High Priest who has gone through everything we have and can not only sympathize with your suffering but can remove it or use it in whatever way is best.

One word in Aramaic; the language Jesus spoke. One word in Greek, tete, lestal; the language in which St. John wrote his Gospel. One word so misunderstood. One little word. One powerful word full of an eternity of meaning. "It is finished." The will and command of the Father for our salvation is completed by His Son, our Savior, Jesus as He dies on the cross for us.

In His last moments of mortal life Jesus leans on His Father and the Word as should we. "Into Your hands I commit my spirit." The death of Christ shows us that there is no fear for the believer but a joyous translation into the hands of God.

There is so much more depth to these words than I can express in this short space. Won't you come to our mid-week Lenten services so we can explore together the deep meaning and love expressed in these words by our Savior Jesus as He goes to the cross for us? We see in these words, not defeat, but the prelude to victory on Easter. As we watch the Lord pass through the gates of death into the hands of God, as we hear our Lord's final words from the cross, we hear an echo of a word which He spoke before these Seven Words: "The third day He shall rise again."

Cherish What God Has Given

In the Small Catechism, Luther follows a pattern when explaining the Ten Commandments. With each commandment, there is something prohibited, and something commanded. There is something wrong which must be avoided, and there is something right which must be done.

The one time this pattern is not followed is with the Sixth Commandment.

"You shall not commit adultery. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other" (SC I).

Here, the catechism focuses solely on the positive: we should live in a chaste and decent manner in both word and deed, and husbands and wives should cherish and honor one another.

Keeping this commandment, and all of the commandments, is a lot easier if you see your chastity and your spouse as a gift from God that is to be protected and cherished. In the same way, you will find keeping the Fourth Commandment easier if you see your parents and other authorities as a gift from God, given to you for your blessing.

This is the key stewardship insight that runs through all of the Christian life: Everything that we have has been given to us by God. We deserve none of it. All of it comes to us by God's fatherly kindness and open-handed generosity. If I know that everything I have - every possession, every relationship, every ability - is a gift from God, then my perspective changes. All of these things are both gifts to be cherished, and things that I should direct towards God's purposes. My possessions should be shared generously according to how God has called me in my family, church and community. My spouse should be cherished, loved and encouraged in faith. My children are on loan from my own Heavenly Father, and I have but a brief time to show them the path of righteousness. My neighbor is a gift from God so that I can imitate His kindness toward me.

No matter the gift, everything has been given to me by God so that I may participate in His own goodness and open-handed generosity.

Other Items


Elnora continues to send 3 guilts per month to either to Lutheran World Relief or Dakota Boys Ranch.
