#### **April**, 2017

Spring greetings to you, dear saints of the Lord in Christ Jesus our Savior!

We are annually reminded in the Lenten season of the disciples' stumbling errors which they committed in the Passion of our Lord Jesus: their strong verbal support of Jesus in the Upper Room, Judas' betrayal, their slumbers and later flight from Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, Simon Peter's impetuous sword-swinging and later his denial. They all played a part in Jesus going to the cross to accomplish His full payment for the sins of the world.

Later on Peter wrote by inspiration of the Holy Spirit in his first general epistle: *In your hearts regard Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you* (3:15). The Lord Jesus Christ forgave Peter and blessed him with the Holy Spirit to turn him around from a denier to a proclaimer.

Using the means of grace, His Word and Sacraments, the Holy Spirit is at work in us to share the reason for the hope that is in us – the life, suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension of the Lord Jesus Christ.

It has been our custom over the years in preparation for our catechumens to publicly offer the vow they made at their baptism to bear witness of their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. We call it a presentation, but more accurately it is an opportunity for each catechumen to share the faith which God bestowed in the water and the Word of Holy Baptism.

Each of the seven catechumens has selected a Bible verse for the Rite of Confirmation. The presentation provides each of the catechumens with the opportunity of sharing the faith with brothers and sisters in Christ in a public setting.

This month the combined adult Bible classes on Sunday morning will be the setting for the seven catechumens to share the blessings of God's gift of faith through the words of the selected confirmation passages from the Scriptures. April 2, 9, 23, and 30 at 9:30 a.m. downstairs in the church fellowship area will provide the sharing of the faith by these saints of God for their brothers and sisters in Christ.

As they anticipate their participation in the Rite of Confirmation on May 7, may we also be reminded of the opportunities the Lord places before us in our life to "always (be) prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks (us) for a reason for the hope that is in (us)."

#### March 2017 Board of Directors Minutes (Draft Minutes - Yet to be Approved)

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held March 14, 2017, beginning at 7:00 p.m. The following people attended: Phil Glenn (Chairman), Pastor Thieme, Theresa Greer, Tammy Mangold, Pastor Gerike, JoAnn Schoenike, Gary Kespohl, Fred Luetkemeier, Virginia Propp, Annette Kiehne, Doug Kiehne, Mary Frerking, Ken Greer, Stephanie Oetting, Larry McCoig, Pete Easterhaus, Mary Raisch and Cynthia Green (Secretary). Pastor Gerike opened the meeting with devotion.

Approval of Meeting Agenda: Chairman Glenn requested that several additional items be pulled from the consent agenda and be added to the Meeting Agenda under Old Business or New Business, respectively. A motion was made to accept the agenda with these changes; seconded and approved.

Approval of Consent Agenda: The consent agenda includes: Minutes of the February 14, 2017 BOD Meeting, Senior Pastor's Report (except Membership Changes), Associate Pastor's Report, Financial Secretary's Report, Board and Committee Reports. A motion was made to accept the consent agenda, with those items pulled out to be added to the Meeting Agenda as suggested by Chairman Glenn; seconded and approved.

#### **CONSENT AGENDA**

#### SENIOR PASTOR'S REPORT - Pastor Gerike

Membership statistics provided to the Synod: Baptized Membership--784; Communicant Membership--597. Conducting Sunday Vespers at Lenoir: March 26, 1017. Midweek Bible Study on Mondays at 9:00 a.m. (North Overflow Area): Luther's Use of the Scriptures in the Catechisms. Sunday Morning Bible Study (Basement - West): Study of Galatians. Adult Information Class: Two sets of classes running on variable dates. Pre-marital counseling sessions: Two sets are being undertaken; weddings scheduled for April 29, 2017, and July 15, 2017. Junior Confirmation Class III: Seven in the class. Presentations will take place during Sunday morning Adult Bible Class time on April 2, April 9, and April 30, 2017. (See also Membership Changes.)

#### ASSOCIATE PASTOR'S REPORT - Pastor Thieme

DCEI: Site visitation was 2/16/17. Other Duties: Continues visiting with members in their homes and the hospitalized, serves on the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation Committee, leads chapel for the Learning Center, taught several classes at Calvary Lutheran High School, and Mill Creek Villa has asked that he present the "Israel Trip" on March 9, 2017. Youth: Senior High Youth Bible Study on Sunday morning; The Senior High Youth will have a servant event in July at the Boy's and Girl's Dakota Ranch in Minot, North Dakota; The Senior High Youth offered babysitting for the Gala; and he is talking with "Kids Against Hunger." District-Fourth Vice President: Helping with a devotional. Continuing Education: Studying the works of Robert Gognan, John Kleinig, Tom Eckstein and others, with regard to sexuality. He is reviewing Tactics: A Game Plan for Discussing Your Christian

Convictions by Gregory Koukl.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT- JoAnn Schoenike, Financial Secretary:

For the month of February, the Regular Envelope collections are 94.19% of the anticipated monthly amount, Loose Plate collections are 88.20%, and Sunday School collections are 132.46%. The Total Monthly collections are 94.01% of the monthly anticipated amount of \$41,669. The Total Year-to-Date collections through the end of February are 97.98% of the anticipated amount of \$85,709.

The historic period in the full report is a five-year average which includes 2012-2016 data.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION (Mary Frerking): Sunday School: Palm Sunday-- the children will participate in a procession into the church at both the 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services, with the children also singing at the 10:30m a.m. service. All children, K-8th, are invited to sing at the service. Easter--The children will participate in an Easter Celebration with the telling of the resurrection story and a craft, and an Easter egg hunt in the church playground area will be held, weather permitting. Junior High Youth will assist in hiding the eggs. Curriculum-Each Sunday School family was provided with a Lenten devotional to be used at home for the 40 days preceding Easter. This will be supplemented each week by our teachers during Sunday School, with a Lenten lesson for the week. This is in addition to the regular weekly curriculum. Vacation Bible School: VBS will be 7/10-13/17 from 5:30p.m. - 8:00 p.m. Volunteers are needed to assist with teaching and activities. Please prayerfully consider working as a VBS volunteer this summer. Lenten Supper: BOCE will co-host the Lenten supper with the Board of Youth on 3/15/17. **DCEI**: There is no word yet on our application for an intern. A reply is expected within the next few weeks.

### BOARD OF EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (Virginia Propp) **Enrollment**:

Current Enrollment is MWF 83/78; T/TH 78/78.

Summer enrollment begins 2/24/17. Toddler:8/16 MWF, 7/16 T/TH; Pre-School/Pre-K:44/60 MWF, 49/60 T/Th. Pre-K half summer only (new program): 3 M-F, 1 MWF, 1 T/Th. School age (new program): forms sent out on 3/1.

Fall 2017/Spring 2018 Enrollment began 3/3/17. Toddler: 12/16 MWF, 12/16 T/Th. Pre-School: 23/30 MWF, 23/30T/Th. Pre-K: 34/35 MWF, 35/35 T/Th.

**State of Missouri**: TLC was randomly selected for inspection of immunization records on 3/6/17. There were issues with 8 of 30 records. There will be a follow up with parents. It is felt that there is a need to change to a different parental opt out form.

**Staffing**: Annette Kiehne participated in a panel for the National Religious Broadcasters on 3/1-3/17.

**Budget**: TLCLC participated with GSLS in the Pancake Breakfast on 3/11/17, to raise money for shelving in the library. PTO meeting scheduled for 3/22/17.

**Facilities**: The parts to repair the dishwasher are on order. Kevin Kiehne is working on a sandbox and lid for the toy storage chest, for the toddler side of the TLCLC playground, as an Eagle Scout

project. He plans on presenting his project at the next BoECE meeting on 3/26/17.

**Other**: The Pre-K took a field trip to Rock Bridge H.S. planetarium on 3/6/27. The Parent Handbook is currently being updated and a Food Policy is being created.

#### BOARD OF PAROCHIAL EDUCATION (Mary Raisch)

Current enrollment is 39. The third quarter ended 3/10/17. The offering went towards Lutheran's For Life- Owen's Mission. Fourth' Quarter offering will go to LOVE Inc. Open house continues on the third Thursday of each month from 10:00 a.m. till 2:00 p.m. Another one is scheduled for 3/16/17 from 5:00p.m. till 7:00 p.m., in conjunction with the science fair. The Gala event raised over \$27,000. All profits will go towards the operational budget for next year. GSLS would like to thank everyone who attended the Gala and/or donated items. The GSLS/TLCLC pancake breakfast was 3/11/17.Proceeds will go towards the school library. GSLS and TLCLC would like to thank everyone who attended the breakfast and/or helped with it.

A financial report is included in the agenda packet.

BOARD OF YOUTH (Stephanie Oetting): The Trinity Lutheran Church Youth Fellowship Account report is included in the agenda packet.

BOARD OF ELDERS (Doug Kiehne and Larry McCoig): The Elders are conducting a book study regarding the frequency of communion, using the book *The Blessings of Weekly Communion*. The book has nine chapters and they are covering one chapter a month. The worship pattern list that shows members who have not attended service in more than 3 weeks was reviewed. Selected members were contacted via postcard to encourage attendance. A total of 15 members, who have not attended for more than two years, were removed from the list. They will be sent a letter to try and make contact with them. The elders discussed many ideas for their Footstep to plan an Information Technology Ministry. They provided the Lenten Light Supper on 3/8/17.

BOARD OF SOCIAL MINISTRY (Theresa Greer): The Board hosted Circle of Friends on 1/11/17. They co-hosted the Lenten light supper on Ash Wednesday and sponsored a blood drive on 3/11/17. Plans were made for hosting the Circle of Friends on 4/8/17 and the Senior Ministry Lunch will continue on Thursday.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE (Fred Luetkemeier): The Board did not meet this month. The Board will be serving the Lenten Lite supper on4/5/17. Warren Harms and Laura Grice are counting this month and Robin Tipton and Fred Luetkemeier will be counting in April.

BOARD OF TLC ENDOWMENT FUND (Pete Easterhaus): Balances as of January 31, 2017 are: TLC Fund: \$15,871.44; Youth Ministry Fund: \$12,056.48; Bourret/Elliott Fund: \$31,204.25. The full financial report for the three funds is included in the agenda packet.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES: (Ken Greer) The Board reported that their members have been busy repairing numerous items in TLCLC and other areas of the church. A complete list of repairs is included in the agenda packet. Reed is working on a HVAC bid and Jim Niederjohn is working on the elevator inspection.

Temperature data from 49 stations continues to be collected, for performance evaluation of the HVAC systems.

Five Hundredth Anniversary Committee: The date of the final 500th Anniversary of the reformation will be November 5, 2017. A "Save the Date invitation will go out in May to all Lutheran Churches within a 60 mile radius of Columbia. There will be a combined choir and hymn fest at 3:00 p.m. on November 5, 2017. Those wishing to be part of the combined choir will have practice at 1:00 p.m. There will be a punch and cake reception following the service. The full 500th Anniversary Committee report is included in the agenda packet.

EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT PROPOSAL PRESENTATION: Chairman Glenn introduced Joshua McDowell to the Board. Joshua presented his proposal to build a raised bed vegetable garden for TLCLC, as his Eagle Scout project. The proposed garden will be on the west side of the lawnmower shed. His proposal currently includes six raised garden beds and the spacing will be such, that there will be a three foot walkway between them. The students and staff of TLCLC will be responsible for the plantings in the beds and the maintenance of them. There were several suggestions from the Board as to changes that might be made to the design of the project. Joshua will take the suggestions under consideration. There was a motion to accept the concept and location of the Eagle Scout project proposal as presented. It was seconded and approved. The handout from Joshua McDowell, setting forth additional details of his Eagle Scout Project, is included in the agenda packet.

**BOARD OF THE MONTH (Board of Christian Education):** Mary Frerking, presenting on behalf of the BOCE, went over their Footsteps for 2017. The Board is still looking for a Sunday School Superintendent; is seeking help for Vacation Bible School, to be held in July; and is entertaining ideas for involving the Sunday School children, along with the GSLS students, in the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation Celebration. Their six Footsteps, in further detail, are included in the agenda packet.

A motion was made to accept the Membership Changes; motion seconded and approved.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT – Gary Kespohl, Treasurer

For the month's ended February 28, 2017, the church income is \$99,153.90, which is 15.82% of the total budget for the year. The Learning Center income is \$127, 384.97, which is 21.17% of the budget for the year. Total income is \$226,538.87, which is18.44% of the budget for 2017.

2015: Regular Envelope: \$520,082; Loose Plate \$19,212; Tuition \$505,723

2016: Regular Envelope: \$501,929; Loose Plate \$22,823; Tuition

\$601.685

Through February 2017: Regular Envelope: \$80,778; Loose Plate \$2,974; Tuition \$122,690

After two months, the percent of budget used is 16.66% of total budget. Total income through February is \$226,538.87 or 18.44% of the annual budget. Expenses are \$193,780.38or 15.77% of the annual budget.

There was a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report and place it on file; seconded and approved.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

Personnel Manual Revisions: The Elders requested a motion to the BOD that the BOD slow down the process of the changes proposed to the "personal time off" policy of employees of Trinity Lutheran Church for time to review and communicate with interested parties the purpose of said changes for the sake of good order and Christian charity. The motion was seconded, but failed to be approved by the BOD. Chairman Glenn reported that the draft revision to the Personnel Manual for Paid Time Off would be presented three times on 3/22/17. The purpose of the meetings is to answer questions concerning the new draft policy and to listen to comments, suggestions and concerns of the employees and other interested parties. The Task Force will then meet again to make the final revisions, if any, to the draft policy. Chairman Glenn indicated that he hoped a final draft of the policy would be presented at the April or May BOD meeting and then be presented at the Assembly of Voters meeting in May.

<u>Director of Christian Education Intern Application Update</u>: We are hoping to hear back from Concordia University-Seward, by 3/20/17, as to the status of our application.

<u>CLAS Facility Lease Update</u>: Chairman Glenn reported that there is no update at this time.

<u>Lift Annual Inspection Status</u>: It was reported that there is no further update at this time.

<u>Learning Center School Age Program:</u> Annette Kiehne, Director, reported that two families have already paid their money and that a lot of questions are being asked concerning the new program for school age children. She is also working on the license revision, which is required for this program.

<u>Yellow Pages Advertising Renewal</u>: Gary Kespohl reported that he will be speaking to our specific representative at Century Link very soon. He suggested that the number for TLCLC also be included in the advertisement.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

<u>Dutch Doors for TLCLC</u>: There was a motion presented that the BOD approve up to \$1,000.00 for two Dutch door installations for toddler classrooms. The motion was seconded. A discussion followed. It was reported that the existing door frames would be used and that Odd Job Jay, quoted an estimate of \$500.00 per door. The motion was approved.

Scholarship Policy Document and Application Procedure: There was a discussion as to what guidelines or rules there should be concerning scholarships. Currently there is no written policy on

the subject. Pastor Thieme put into writing, the guidelines and practices that have been followed over the past many years, and handed this out. Based upon the discussion held on this topic, at the Assembly of Voters meeting in February, Chairman Glenn made a motion to form a task force to come up with appropriate guidelines for future scholarship recipients. The motion died for lack of a second. After additional discussion, a motion was made to accept the historical guidelines written down by Pastor Thieme, with two minor changes and the additional request that the guidelines be published quarterly to the congregation, so that all interested parties may know of them. The motion was seconded and approved:

Scholarship Guidelines to be published quarterly to the congregation, by the Church Secretary:

- 1. It was awarded to those going into LCMS church vocation (teacher, pastor, DCE, Deaconess, etc.).
- They must be attending one of our synod Universities or Seminaries.
- 3. They need to be a member of our congregation.
- 4. The checks are written to the institution or to the institution bookstore (put into an account under their name).
- 5. A letter of request goes to the Assembly of Voters.
- 6. Annually requested and approved.
- The budgeted line account item was used first and if necessary the designated line account (LCEF) was used next.
- 8. If there was no request made in a year, the budgeted amount was moved into the designated account.
- 9. Summer school has been considered.

Martin Luther –The Idea That Changed The World: The 500th Anniversary of the Reformation Committee has been actively trying to bring the new Luther movie to one of the theaters in Columbia, as part of the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. The committee would like to purchase advance tickets and sell them at a discounted amount to members of the congregation, to encourage attendance at the movie. The movie will be shown on April 19th. Exactly which theater it will be shown in, is still not resolved. A motion was made to approve up to \$650.00, for the purchase of these advance tickets. The motion was seconded and approved.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

A motion was made to adjourn; motion seconded. The meeting adjourned at 8:45p.m. Pastor Thieme closed the meeting with prayer.



#### A Blessed Easter to each of you as we celebrate Jesus' redeeming work,

Since this is the 500 year celebration of the beginning of the Reformation, it seems appropriate that the theme for Lutherans For Life this year is "*Here We Stand*". Martin Luther stood on the Scriptures even when it endangered His life. At the Diet of Worms, 1521, he



said, "Unless I am convinced by the testimony of the Scriptures or by clear reason...I am bound by the Scriptures...and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience. I cannot do otherwise, **here I stand**, may God help me, Amen." God did help Luther and his life was spared at that time, but he did not know how it would all turn out when he made his bold stand.

As the secular culture looks more and more to death as the solution to problems, it is imperative that all Lutherans For Life bravely stand for the truth that God gives value to every human being because He creates them, He redeems them, and He calls them into a relationship with Himself through the Holy Spirit. It may be tempting to avoid this 'sensitive' subject, but again, Luther has something to teach us. He said, "If I profess with the loudest voice and clearest exposition every portion of the truth of God except precisely that little point which the world and the devil are at the moment attacking, I am not confessing Christ, however boldly I may be professing Christ. Where the battle rages, there the loyalty of the soldier is proved. And to be steady on all the battle fields besides is merely flight and disgrace if he flinches at that point." The battle continues to rage around the value of every human being everywhere you look. Babies continue to be aborted in numbing numbers and suicide is promoted as the answer to suffering, illness and old age.

St. Paul also exhorts us in Ephesians 6:13 with these words: "Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm." Won't you stand firm with Lutherans For Life and speak up for those most vulnerable among us? Here is how Lutherans For Life is standing:

Here We Stand to declare and defend the precious value of every human being.

Here We Stand to celebrate the many blessings of abundant and everlasting life.

Here We Stand for anyone vulnerable or victim to violence against life---as Gospel-motivated voices For Life.




#### WHY I AM A LUTHERAN...

My spiritual walk is probably not unique: infantbaptized in a conservative Presbyterian church, active in the church youth group, off to college where I strayed from my roots, married a very devout Lutheran, realized the past errors in my life and became a confirmed Lutheran. During the first 30 years of our marriage, my active-duty military service took us to locations far and wide. Amazingly, we generally found welcoming Lutheran parishes at these locations - even on Okinawa, Japan. Following each move to a new location, the Church became our constant anchor and stability in our family life. However, we found that not all "Lutheran" churches ministered to a deeper spiritual One Lutheran church (at that time an American Lutheran Church which eventually merged with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America [ELCA]) had fast membership growth but also a significant turnover in membership. It quickly became apparent that these big-growth churches catered to the "feel-good" ministry and members departed seeking a deeper understanding of the Christian faith. Eventually, we returned to Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod churches because of the strong adherence to biblical truths and solid Reformation Christian doctrine. In actuality, it's not about being "Lutheran." It's all about God's mercy and grace and His Son, Jesus Christ as our faithful

pastors so consistently preach from the pulpit. In a world under siege by sin, focusing on what Jesus has done for us provides comfort and hope for the future. It's truly all about Jesus!

#### **US SUPREME COURT HEARING DATE SET**

The oral hearings for the TLC litigation in regard to the MO Dept of Natural Resources Solid Waste Division recycled vehicle tire grant program has been set by the US Supreme Court. Wednesday, April 19, 2017 is the scheduled date. The Court conducts two oral hearings in the morning starting at 10am and then two in the afternoon. Trinity's case is scheduled for the morning session so it could be 10am or 11am as counsels are allowed one hour for the hearing. This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to witness a Supreme Court case

that was not only initiated by TLC but is receiving national attention as an extremely important case for religious liberty. Court proceedings are open to the public but the court room gallery is relatively small and the case will probably draw a moderate amount of public attention. Depending on the visibility of a case, those desiring entry to the gallery may stand in line 24-48 hours ahead of time! Some individuals hire professional 'line standers' and pay them an hourly amount to stand in line and on the day of the event, they switch places with the line stander. Even then there is no guarantee that you will gain entry because entry is solely based on line position. For cases of religious freedom, some individuals just congregate in front of the court building and pray during the session and then provide support to attorneys and plaintiffs during the media session on the front steps of the courthouse following the hearings. You are cordially invited to attend these oral hearings, understanding the constraints outlined above.
