



Joining the Heavenly Choir

"Glory to God in the highest, and on Earth peace, good will toward men." (Luke 2:14 KJV)

The curtain of stars had been drawn across the sky above the towns and fields. The hushed tones of the night had fallen into place. The shepherds tended their flocks. And then the silence was broken by the messenger of God who would bring fear and joy.

On that first Christmas night, the shepherds trembled in fear. Their own holiness was of little worth as "the glory of the Lord shone around them." Yet they were not left in fear but raised to stand in joy. "And the angel said to them, 'Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all people."

According to the essay "Incarnation and Music" by modern Lutheran scholar Rev. Dr. John Kleinig, the angels' song to the shepherds shows how important Jesus' birth in Bethlehem was. Psalm 29 tells us that in Heaven, the angels react to being in the presence of God by glorifying him in song. With the earthly birth of Jesus, the angels now sing God's glory on Earth for the same reason—they are in the presence of God. Jesus, God incarnate in human flesh, has come to live among mankind. We are invited to join a new choir and sing with the angels glorifying God.

To speak of the "Glory of God" is to signify God's awesome splendor and holiness.

We, His baptized people, belong to that choir that sings of His awesome splendor and holiness. We sing of that splendor beheld in the Christ child and the Christ crucified who has come in the flesh for us of the flesh. He gives peace and forgiveness. Peace with God and forgiveness for our sins. We sing of this great work on Earth for the people of the Earth.

When new fads or familiar teachings are spoken, we can test to see if they are in harmony with the messengers of God who spoke over the fields of Bethlehem. Does this new book, program, or message give God the glory? Does this familiar teaching deliver peace (and forgiveness) to the people of God?

When I first stepped into the Lutheran church, I asked these questions of Baptism. Does the teaching regarding Baptism honor God as the one who works this miracle, or does it point back to ourselves? If I am the one working Baptism (my dedication, my commitment) then the glory is mine, but then God is robbed of the glory.

What of peace? Any work of mine is never a sure thing for it is always tainted with sin, thus I am robbed of sure peace and forgiveness. But with Baptism, God's work is in giving His name, then life and salvation, and delivering it to me. The new birth is a sure thing for whatever God does is always pure and holy. With this new birth—His work, not mine—my peace is delivered without a doubt. To God be the glory and to his people, peace.

NOVEMBER 13, 2018 BOARD OF DIRECTORS MINUTES (Draft Minutes - Yet to be Approved)

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order on November 13, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. Attendees included Gary Kespohl (Chairman), Jacque Eckhoff (Secretary), Doug Kiehne, Ken Greer, Annette Kiehne, Virginia Propp, Warren Harms, Angel Arnall, Chris Bailey, Mary Frerking and Pastor Brian Thieme.

Pastor Thieme gave the opening devotion.

Chairman Kespohl added LFCS Christmas Tree to New Business, and took Downstairs Bathrooms off Old Business. Warren Harms moved to accept the Meeting Agenda with these changes; seconded and approved.

Annette Kiehne spoke regarding a call she received from a woman who is a former ADF lawyer, who now works for US Attorney General Whittaker. Attorney General Whittaker has created a new task force named "Religious Freedom Task Force". She asked if Whittaker could come to Trinity and do a goodwill visit on the TLCLC playground because it was such a high profile case. The lawyer stated the visit is from a law enforcement perspective, not political. Whittaker was hoping maybe next Wednesday, November 21st. The BOD then held discussion. Concerns included media, and looking as though Trinity is being political. The biggest question is what is meant by a "goodwill visit"? Many agreed that Trinity having a legal representative would be the next step. Angel Arnall moved that we allow Chris Kespohl and/or a current ADF lawyer to speak with Attorney General Whittaker's representative, and then let Chris report back to the Executive Committee to make the final recommendation; seconded and approved.

Chairman Kespohl updated page 14 of the BOD packet, under item 5. Current status is that the bathroom addition plan has been approved by the City. Septagon has the ball in their court. They are looking at starting a week from Friday. Also, the Executive Committee will do an evaluation of the Church Secretary the first week of December. This allows to get the evaluation on a yearly, end of year, schedule. Angel Arnall moved to accept the Consent Agenda with these changes; seconded and approved.

The Consent Agenda meeting minutes and reports are filed in the Congregation Secretary's notebook. The following are summaries of the reports, with the name of the board representative at the Board of Directors meeting listed:

PASTOR'S REPORT - Pastor Thieme

Rev. Spotts is visiting 2/3 of the Homebound each month.

Adult Classes: Two individuals are taking the adult information class, Sunday morning is going through the appointed readings, Monday morning class is going through the Large Catechism and Monday evening class is the "Five Listeners".

Bible Classes for New Members: Looking to train leaders and start new classes.

434 went through the Semisaurus museum and 62 attended the two classes.

The LCMS National Youth Gathering is July 9th - 15th.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY

For the month of October, the Regular Envelope collections are 97.73% of the anticipated monthly amount. Loose Plate collections are 138.52% and Sunday School are 104.58%. The

Total Monthly collections are 99.30% of the monthly anticipated amount of \$42,035. The Total Year to Date collections through the end of October are 100.11% of the anticipated amount of \$425,263.

BOARD REPORTS:

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION - Mary Frerking

On Reformation Sunday the BOCE laminated the placemats that were left over from the 500th Anniversary celebration last year. Each of the Sunday School children and the members of the Adult Bible studies received a placemat. Luther Rose color sheets were also given out. Closet clean out is underway. The BOCE sponsored a trunk at Trunk or Treat. There will be no Sunday School on Thanksgiving day. It will be on the Sunday following Thanksgiving. Ornaments have been ordered for all children ages Pre-K through Senior High Youth for this year's Christmas celebration. The BOCE has provided the Nominating Committee with the names of several individuals who they recommend to serve as new members of the board. Teresa Gooch will finish out her term in December.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION - Virginia Propp

TLCLC currently has one T/Th toddler opening to fill, and will have another T/Th toddler opening January 1, 2019. A current staff position will be expanded into the afternoon to assist with planning curricular programs for the afternoon. Both toddler classes have full time aides now. Another half time staff position will be added to cover afternoon curriculum. Ribbon Cutting Celebration for the Recycled Rubber Pour-in-Place Playground Surfacing was November 13, 2018 at 11:00 a.m.

EVANGELISM - No Representative Present

TREASURER'S REPORT - Warren Harms (Treasurer)

For the month ending October 31, 2018, the Church income is \$45,134 and year to date is \$478,372 (78.45% of the total income budgeted for the year). This is <\$28,227> or <5.57%> less than in 2017. The 301-Regular Envelope is down <\$7,838> or <1.91%> less than at the end of October 2017. The total Learning Center income for September is \$62,285 and \$606,858 for the year to date (89.52% of the budgeted income for the year).

For the month of October, Church expenditures are \$30,289, and \$415,938 year to date (68.2% of the annual expense budget of \$609,775). The Learning Center expenditures for October total \$51,878 and \$523,007 year to date which is 77.15% of the annual expense budget of \$677,900. Total reserve accounts at Lutheran Church Extension Fund are now \$197,932. There is currently no building loan on the books.

Angel Arnall moved to approve the Treasurer's Report; seconded and approved.

OLD BUSINESS:

Vision Plan: The contract with LCEF to help with our Vision Plan has been signed.

Called Worker Benefits: Page 25 of the BOD packet shows the recommendations for Trinity Lutheran Church Called Worker Vacation and Paid Time Off. The BOD would like to run the recommendations by Carole Eilers, so they will be kept on the agenda for the December BOD meeting.

Constitution: Chairman Kespohl reminded everyone we will look at this again in the December AOV meeting.

Budget: Warren Harms will report a small change at next month's meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

LCEF & Youth: LCEF can set up an account for our youth group at the National Youth Gathering. Our group can then draw from this account for expenses. Acct 527 is designated in our budget for "Youth Trip". Pastor Thieme asked if the leftover \$900 can be used at the Gathering for the LCEF account. Chris Bailey is going to the Gathering and is on the Board of Youth. She would be the main signature on the LCEF account, and Pastor Thieme would be a back up signature. Angel Arnall moved we set up the account for the Gathering; seconded and approved.

Facility Use Request: Wittenberg Door Campus Ministry. Pastor Thieme may be the person here, but it could also be Doug McDowell. Mary Frerking moved to approve the request with no insurance required; seconded and approved. Chairman Kespohl will sign the request and be the person here.

TLCLC Copier: A new copier has been ordered, but it's not in yet. The Executive Committee approved the new contract and asked for the BOD to approve their decision. Angel Arnall moved to approve the decision of the Executive Committee in regards to the new copier contract; seconded and approved.

Crum Contract: Andrew Saeger moved we approve the contract; seconded and approved. Andrew Saeger moved to approve the dumpster and lawn restoration contracts; seconded and approved.

TLCLC Pay Scale: The BOD would like to compare the TLCLC Pay Scale to District Guidelines. Therefore, this item will be kept on the agenda for the December BOD meeting.

LFCS Christmas Tree: LFCS would like to put their tree in the foyer and not the overflow. Discussion followed as to the best placement for the tree. Angel Arnall moved to put the LFCS Christmas Tree in the hallway and not the foyer; seconded and approved.

Greetings in the Name of Jesus the LORD of our life from beginning to end!

As we thoughtfully ponder and anticipate the celebration of the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, it is appropriate that we remember that moment of time in the life of each one of us when life began...a moment when we were changed from nothing into something; from nothing into **everything**. At that fraction of time called conception, we were in the presence of the **One**



who is life, who is light and who is love. At that time of conception there was direction, destiny and power because "IN THE BEGINNING GOD created..." He made everything, including the incredible human brain. The human brain ranks among the greatest wonders of God's creation. At that moment of conception, there is in the single fertilized egg (that which each one of us once was) 27 times more information than is found in an entire set of the Encyclopedia Britannica! The truth is that you and I didn't **come** from a fetus, an embryo or a fertilized egg. You and I once **were** a fetus, an embryo, a fertilized egg. Each individual life is a continuum that begins at conception. The same is true for Jesus. The Body that lay in the manger, the Body that hung on the cross, the Body that rose from the crypt was a body given to Jesus at His conception in the womb of Mary.

Before we were formed (Psalm 139), before God's hands made us and fashioned us into an intricate unity (Job 10:8, 12), God knew us, loved us and had a plan for us. In a world in which so many people have a poor self-image, lack self-esteem and feel rejected and unwanted, the conception, life, death and resurrection of Jesus say to each one of us, **"you are so special, so unique, so valuable that you are worth dying for."**

When a young child was asked how he got out of his mother's tummy, he exclaimed, "God made a baby door!" With all the biological, medical and scientific language we use to describe pregnancy and childbirth, fundamentally, that is what it really is. God made a baby door for physical life **and** for spiritual life, because it was God's own Baby, His own Son, who through His <u>conception</u>, life, death and resurrection became the Door by which each of us was birthed into His family. **That's cause for celebration! We ought to be so filled with the joy of being alive, so grateful for the gift of created life, that others seeing us will say, "teach me what you know; teach me your joy; teach me your peace; teach me your LORD!" Let the celebration begin!**

FROM AGE TO AGE THE SAME: "I am he, and to gray hairs I will carry you. I have made, and I will bear; I will carry and will save." Isaiah 46:4. This was the theme for the special conference celebrating Lutherans For Life's 40 years of ministry. The National Conference was held in October at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Olivette, MO with more than 240 people in attendance. Several LFL pioneers came back to share their memories and bring encouragement as they have seen the Lord's work through LFL for these 40 years. Rev. Dr. Samuel Nafzger, a highly-regarded theologian, who spent 30 years working on the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR), gave the keynote address. He was instrumental in working closely with Dr. Jean Garton, LFL's first president, in the development of Lutherans For Life. His knowledge of the history of LFL was amazing and his presentation uplifting.

Two former LFL executive directors, Rev. Edward Fehskens III and Rev. Dr. James I. Lamb, came to share their special gifts of communication and passion For Life. Their messages were inspirational, reflecting the past but also pointing to the future of LFL. Topping off the day was a presentation from Rev. Dr. Dale Meyer, President of Concordia Seminary St. Louis, and former speaker on "The Lutheran Hour." Dr. Meyer closed the conference in dynamic fashion.

Conference attendees were a mix of experienced conference participants and those who were there for the first time. The conference quickly became a wonderful blending of people—from as far away as California, Pennsylvania, Washington, Texas, and Canada—with the same heart to affirm life and support Lutherans For Life.

As prayers for this life-affirming organization continue to be given, there is unfailing confidence that the Lord will sustain From Age to Age the Same. 2019 regional conferences will center on the theme verse, *"LORD, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." (John 6:68)* Won't you plan now to attend one of the conferences near you and rejoice with your fellow "For lifers" in the gift of life that God continues to create, redeem and sanctify?







Under Lock and Key? Look and See!

A fellow missionary laughed as she walked into my house. Why? The first thing you see is a crucifix hanging on the wall, surrounded by seven sets of keys. Only the nails now remain as a vestige of the prior occupants' feature wall of crosses. The center one bears my crucifix, and the rest, my painstakingly grouped and labeled sets of keys (for the time being).

Why so many? There are 12 padlocks around my house. Beautiful ironwork gates are common here, but my house takes things to the extreme. From the sliding *portón* in front of the driveway to the cage around the backup generator battery, each entry is secured by a lock with a corresponding key.

It sounds like I live in a fortress meant to limit, restrict, and maintain distance. Yet these locks are also freeing. I can choose who and what comes in and out unbar the gates at my discretion and welcome others into my humble abode. Such is our world. The Gospel is shrouded by sin; hearts locked to its message. My task – and yours – is to love those yet outside the gates by pointing them to the cross.

Thanks be to God that His Word is not bound (2 Tim. 2:9). The Good News transcends cultural boundaries. John 20:21 recounts that Jesus appeared behind locked doors after the resurrection. He is the Key. The Advent hymn "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" summons the "Key of David" (LSB 357:5). Jesus'

death and resurrection is the greatest act of love ever known. By it, He locked up sin, death and Satan and threw away the key; simultaneously unlocking paradise for all believers. Yes, my key wall looks silly, but it reminds me of my duty and privilege to love my neighbors by leading them toward the heavenly gates so that, by the Holy Spirit, they might have eternal life.

- 5. For missionaries around the world and others who will spend Advent and Christmas far from home, and for the loved ones who will miss them dearly.

Raise the Roof

Hurricane Maria ravaged Puerto Rico just over a year ago. In the blog post about my recent trip to the *Isla del Encanto*, I alluded to the goal of outfitting 100 homeowners with new roofs in 12 months thanks to LCMS Disaster Response's generosity. That's two per week!

Community leaders help identify recipients in nearly all of Mayagüez's barrios and Ponce (80 km away), too! Home Depot delivers the materials; the recipients are then responsible for doing the work or hiring someone to do it. While this can and usually does work brilliantly, there are too many instances of materials sitting unused. Shady contractors are just one more reason why the roof put on by last week's short-term team from Wake Forest, NC, the first done by volunteer labor, was notable. The hope is to do more of the same in 2019 as well as to begin doing intentional follow-up home visits with past roof recipients, reinforcing the connection between their new and improved physical shelters and the refuge we have in the shelter of the Most High (Psalm 91).


