Dear Saints at Trinity Lutheran Church,

As we continue to progress through the Divine Call process, I would like you to continue considering what it means to be a pastor. This month we celebrate the 502nd anniversary of the Reformation, so I want to share with you some of Martin Luther's thoughts on pastors.

The paragraphs below are excerpts from a 2016 article by Rev. A. Brian Flamme entitled "Luther on the Office of the Ministry." The full article may be found online at https://lutheranreformation.org/theology/luther-office-ministry/.

Your Servant in Christ,

Before the Reformation, the Papacy gave the comfort of Apostolic succession accompanied by the special grace of ordination. The Apostles handpicked their successors and gave them grace, who then handpicked their successors and gave them grace, who handpicked their successors and gave them grace...You get the point. But once [Martin Luther and the] Evangelical churches realized that the special "grace" of ordination would be withheld from them, then they had to raise up their own preachers. But how could they be sure that they were getting the real deal?

Luther began working on articulating the doctrine of the ministry already in 1523. He writes, "Either we must learn how to provide ourselves with presbyters apart from papal tyranny, or if we are not willing to do so (though it is possible) we must give ourselves into captivity..." Luther correctly argues that Jesus gives the obligation to publicly preach, teach, and administer the sacraments to his whole church, indeed to every Christian, not to a select few super-spiritual clergy persons who get to choose the priests who come after them. Yet, because it's the common property of all Christians to preach, "no one individual can arise by his own authority and arrogate to himself alone what belongs to all." However we know that someone must preach, teach, and administer the sacraments. So Luther continues, "But the community rights demand that one, or as many as the community chooses, shall be chosen or approved who, in the name of all with these rights, shall perform these functions publicly."

By 1529 Luther's language becomes clearer when he zeros in on Jesus' instituting words for the public preaching office found in John 20:29-23. In the same way as the Apostles were charged by Jesus to preach, so it must be for men in the preaching office today. Their call may be mediated through the church, but that doesn't make Jesus' charge any less clear or important. "Whoever is called to it and has the mandate should preach the Gospel, should baptize, should loose sins through the power of Absolution, should impose the ban through the power of the Keys, would rebuke and admonish, etc. Let him proceed with confidence and not be afraid, whatever may befall him on this account."

For Luther and the Lutherans, it was enough that a man be instructed in God's Word, examined, and then called and ordained by the whole church to publically preach in a certain place. This is what's reflected in the language of Article XIV of the Augsburg Confession. This is the regular practice of our Synod today. That's why it's important that your pastor has gone to one of our seminaries, so that you'll have confidence that he's been properly instructed and examined so that when he speaks he's delivering God's own Law and Gospel, not his own.

Unlike the clandestine preachers who sought to infiltrate the Lutherans and disrupt the

Inowing Christ's Love Seeking His Will Spreading His Word peace with strange teachings, Luther writes, "We do not secretly infiltrate, but are called to our office and step forward publically; we have stood before spiritual and secular tribunals to give account. Our gospel is not a 'corner sermon,' but goes forth boldly and publicly..."

Your pastor's call into the office of the Holy Ministry isn't something to be ashamed of. That's why we have ordination and installation services. It's a kind of godly boasting that shows that God has chosen this man to serve in this place. "When we boast in this way, we are not looking for prestige or the good will of the world. The reason for our proud boasting is that we are in a divine calling and in God's own work, and that the people need to be assured of our calling, in order that they may know that our word is in fact the Word of God. This, then, is not a vain pride; it is a most holy pride against the devil and the world. And it is a true humility in the sight of God."

One last thing. You may not have been placed into this special office of public preaching like your pastor, but that doesn't make you any less a Christian. Indeed, I would step away from my office a thousand times if that was the only way I could keep Christ's righteousness given to me in my baptism. There are always opportunities to speak the absolution and teach according to our respective offices. Fathers teach their families and wives instruct their children which is the pattern we learn from St. Paul (Ephesians 6:4). But notice that's different from publicly teaching. What matters is that you and I both have Christ. When we do, the works of both pastors and lay people are precious in God's sight.

PASTOR'S REPORT - Pastor Thieme

Rev. Spotts is visiting 2/3 of the Homebound each month.

Pastoral visits continue to be made with individuals, couples, families, and members of the community at large. Pastor Thieme will lead Chapel at Calvary Lutheran High School on September 18th.

One individual is taking the adult information class. Several others are looking to start class. Sunday morning is studying the Pastoral Epistles, and the Monday morning class is going through the Large Catechism (Lord's Prayer).

Confirmation begins September 15th at 6:00 p.m.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY - Not Present

For the month of August, the Regular Envelope collections are 105.20% of the anticipated monthly amount. Loose Plate collections are 33.48% and Sunday School are 94.39%. The Total Monthly collections are 102.53% of the monthly anticipated amount of \$41,579.44. The Total Year to Date collections through the end of August are 108.29% of the anticipated amount of \$322,743.24.

The BOECE is continuing to look into the Teach Missouri program for possible participation in 2020.

The Church's income for August was \$46,717 with a year-to-date income for the month ending August 31, 2019 at \$383,933 (71.03 % of the \$540,599 income budgeted for the year).

The Church's expenses for August was \$44,860 with year-to-date expenditures for the month ending August 31, 2019 at \$291,023. This includes \$15,882 of Current Year BOD/AOV approved expenses. Adjusted 2019 budgeted expenses total \$274,140 or 63.98 % of the annual expenditure budget of \$439,029 (\$550,599 -\$101,530 Pastor Contingency).

expenses was \$108,793. This number is reduced to an eight-month total of \$41,106 when the budgeted Pastor Contingency is deducted.

The Learning Center's income for August was \$60,025 with a year-todate income for the month ending August 31, 2019 at \$485,484 (68.26 % of the \$711,200 income budgeted for the year).

Budget Worksheets: Jim Harms distributed budget worksheets to each of the board representatives. Jim asked they be completed and returned by September 20th so he can compile a spreadsheet before the September 25th Budget Meeting.

CenturyLink Internet Plan: The current plan expires 11/10/19. An assessment is needed. Larry McCoig moved that the Executive Committee get two to three bids and bring the information back to the BOD; seconded and approved.

CenterPoint Energy Plan: TLC has been getting a discount on the gas plan through the Missouri School Board. Since GSLS closed, we are trying to find out if we still qualify under TLCLC. Jim Cherrington is in the process of finding out.

Cell Phone Plans for Church Workers: Last month the BOD approved a cell phone upgrade for Pastor Thieme. We will continue with our current AT&T plan. New iPhones come out on September 20th, so Pastor Thieme's new phone will be purchased then.

Building Committee Appointments: Chairman Kespohl reported that Marilyn Wise, Lorelei Adam, Pete Easterhaus and Mary Frerking are the four additional Building Committee appointments. Fred Pistel resigned. Larry Samuel will be his replacement. Larry McCoig moved to thank Fred for his service; seconded and approved.

New Budget Proposal: Phyllis White will retire from her position as Music/Jesus Time teacher at the end of the school year. No The Church's year-to-date eight-month adjusted income over replacement has been found yet. Chairman Kespohl proposed a DCE be hired to work at TLC and TLCLC. Larry McCoig moved the Chairman appoint an exploratory committee of four to figure out the needs and job descriptions for TLC and TLCLC; seconded and approved.

A recent article in the Reader's Digest laments the demise of the 'middle child'. The author points out that since so many couples are choosing to have one or two children or none at all, history's largest birth-order demographic will soon be the tiniest. That is a loss for our country, he says, because middle children tend to be skilled diplomats, loyal romantic partners and friends, natural innovators and are more likely to effect change in the world successfully than any other birth order. Having fewer children also affects church demographics. Fewer children in church means the congregation ages without the benefit of new life and more members. President Matthew Harrison has often written to encourage Christian couples to look at children as the gifts from God that they are rather than an economic burden. We can all encourage and support young parents in their vocation of raising Godly children to bring glory to God.

A recent article in LifeDate, 10 Blessings of Large Families, also speaks of the gift of children. It reads as follows:

"God loves children—and God loves having lots of children. He doesn't demand an abundance of children from every human family, however. Even little families and only children are great treasures. But our culture seems to have developed a particular disdain for big households.

- "Are those all yours?"
- "You know how that happens, right?"
- "Can you really afford another baby?"
- "You sure have your hands full!"

"Large families come with unique benefits. I surveyed my Facebook network about it recently. "My friends who have four or more children—or who have three or more siblings—what special blessings does living in a large family bring?" They had lots of positive responses. Here are the top ten:

- 1. Guaranteed friends, even into adulthood.
- 2. Ready-made laboratory for learning people skills like taking turns and getting along.
- 3. MORE HUGS, MORE CUDDLES, MORE GIGGLES!
- 4. What one forgets, another one remembers.
- 5. Less housework for Mom and Dad.
- 6. Free babysitting (also, no need to save for retirement—just live with one of them).
- 7. MORE GRANDBABIES!
- 8. God's unconditional love on every face.
- 9. Increases chances for Christians to take over the world.
- 10. Foretaste of the feast to come (Revelation 7:9)!" (LifeDate, Spring/Summer 2019, Pastor Michael Salemink)

The Mission of TLC's Life Team is to encourage and educate our church to be a voice of life out of gratitude for being rescued by God through Christ Jesus. To this end, the Life Team prepared a survey which was included in last month's newsletter and in the *Trinity Weekly News*. As of mid-September, we had received 17 surveys back and a good bit of information. Most of the respondents were 60 years old or more, and the top 3 services requested were in-home visits, home maintenance and phone calls to the home-bound. We are continuing to discuss how best to use this information to reach out to our fellow congregants.

In October, we plan to tour My Life Clinic and participate in Trunk or Treat.


40 DAYS FOR LIFE / NATIONAL LIFE CHAIN

Get ready to raise your Gospel-motivated voice. Two amazing opportunities are coming your way!

40 Days For Life is a prayer vigil. It takes place in front of abortion businesses. Participants gather for peaceful public praying from morning until evening, often in one-hour shifts and sometimes around the clock.

Its time frame recalls several episodes in the Scriptures where our Lord acted significantly over the course of 40 days (the Flood, Moses receiving commandments, Nineveh repents, Jesus' temptation, resurrection appearances).

The event began in Texas in 2007. Since then, 816 cities in 61 countries have held 6,428 spring and fall vigils involving over 1,000,000 volunteers. Organizers report 16,004 lives saved from abortion as well as 191 workers leaving the industry (most famously, Abby Johnson of Unplanned) during the campaigns—and 100 facilities where a vigil occurred have closed. This year's

fall installment starts September 25. Many of our Life Teams and Life Chapters get involved, and even congregations without organized For Life groups join in. You can find information about the one nearest you at www.40daysforlife.com/vigil-search.aspx.

The National Life Chain represents a similar witness activity.

Congregations across the country assemble along prominent sidewalks for an afternoon prayer rally. Official guidelines outline a code of conduct which discourages idle chatter, frivolity, and physical or verbal responses to motorists while urging self-reflection, repentance, and prayer (as well as spacing 25 to 30 feet between attendees along the route).

Its history stretches all the way back to 1987 when some 2,000 individuals came together in a couple of California cities. Last year, over 1,530 locations held Life Chains featuring sign messages such as "Jesus Forgives and Heals," "Adoption: The Loving Option," and "Pregnant? Need Help? 1-800-712-HELP." LFL volunteers nationwide also take part and lead their churches in a Life-Chain presence.

National Life Chain Sunday will occur this October 6 from 2:00 to 3:30 p.m. (local times may vary, and the network has designated October 27 as an alternate date). Materials and details, including a listing of sites (it even extends across Canada!), are available at lifechain.net.

BUILDING COMMITTEE UPDATE

Thank you to everyone who participated in the September 5 project review meeting. The Building Committee received a great deal of input from the seventy members who attended. Accessibility remains a primary concern, and a larger Narthex area is also an important area of interest. We have continued to make changes to our plans to reflect that input.

We held our next meeting on September 17 and reviewed all the input we received and adjusted the plans as appropriate. If we could not make the desired changes, as in the case of some proposals to relocate some or all of the preschool to the basement or a new building, we wrote a summary of our reasons why and returned that summary to the members who made the proposals.

Our next event was a City Concept Review held in the City Government Center on September 23. The purpose of this event was to acquaint various city departments with our plans and gain information on what they will expect us to include. Our architect and civil engineer, along with the Building Committee Chairman led our end of the discussion that covered topics such as sewers, drainage, fire protection, kitchen design, parking, and occupancy. These are all items that are regulated by city code and must be completed accordingly. There were about twenty city employees there, and they were all very helpful, even proposing some less costly solutions to our issues.

Our next meeting will be on October 8 and will deal with Cost and Phasing. We will begin to apply costs to each of the changes we are proposing. We will also look at the order in which we should make these changes. For example, our facility is not up to current fire and egress codes. If we wish to make even small changes to our building, we will also need to fix our current code problems to allow for future improvements.
