The Gift of Holy Baptism

Each year one more candle is added to our birthday cake until there are no more years to celebrate. What a pleasant way to mark our birth into this world. However, it is another birth that we speak of today that of which takes place in our baptism.

We know from the fall into sin all humans are infected and tainted by sin (Genesis 3:17-19, Psalm 51:5). Spiritually we are dead (Ephesians 2:1-5), blind (2 Corinthians 4:1-4), and the enemy of God (Romans 5:6-10). We deserve the wrath of God.

Death is a judgment against sin.

Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man and death through sin, and so death spread to all men^[] because all sinned (Romans 5:12).

For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord (Romans 6:23).

Death comes to all. Children die. The aged die. Teenagers and young people die. People on every continent die. In the past, in the present, and even in the future all will succumb to the grave.

We all need a Savior and we have been given a Savior in our Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6).

And there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men^[a] by which we must be saved (Acts 4:12).

God gives us the gift of Baptism (Matthew 28:19). In Baptism we are "born from above" (also translated as "born again"). Born not of flesh, but of water and the Spirit (John 3:1-6). Holding to His Word we can see that we are united to Christ. His death becomes our death, and His resurrection becomes our resurrection (Romans 6:1-11). We are set free from sin and are alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Through this great gift, we are regenerated and renewed. We are given a new birth (1 Peter 1:3), cleansed (Ephesians 5:25-27), forgiven and receive the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:38-39), and saved (1 Peter 3:21, and Mark 16:16). All of this and more by what God works in and through your baptism. These are not our words, but the words of God.

Where the candles may run out on the cake that marks are earthly birth, our birth from above in the waters of Baptism has an everlasting truth that I am His in Christ throughout eternity. May we ever remember that we are the baptized children of God.

Were you interested in attending the Death and Dying Study offered at the 6:30am Men's Study but would rather learn during hours for the living? Pastor McCalley will offer this study again later this summer. This study is designed to encourage you to Christian confidence to contend with death in this life, help prepare for death, equip to share and teach others about these issues, and answer as many questions as you have about anything and everything related to it; all this so we may fear the grave as little as our bed for Jesus' sake. We'll begin with the Scripture, discuss the rites and worship services used when death is near and for funerals, move on to planning, and finally explore many questions and issues such as organ donation, near death experiences, and hospice. Please let Heather in the Church Office know if you plan to attend so materials may be prepared. [It is not necessary to read this announcement with a Vincent Price accent].

Grief Resource Available

Stephen Ministry has a resource available to you. Journeying through Grief book sets can help you extend care and minister to people you know who are grieving the loss of a loved one. The four short books are intended to be given at 3 weeks, 3 months, 6 months, and 11 months during the first year after a loss. A tracking card is included to record when each book is due to be given and the date they were given. Each 44-page book focuses on the feelings and issues a person is likely to experience at that point in his or her grief, offering comfort, help, and hope throughout that difficult first year.

Although the books are written from a Christian perspective, they address spiritual matters sensitively, with a focus on ideas and principles that would apply for any reader, whatever his or her beliefs.



The Life Team thanks the congregation for their generosity and participation in our yearly diaper drive. We collected over 2000 individual diapers and over 2800 individual wipes! We have also collected 4 jars of diaper ointment, 3 tubes of teething gel, 3 pacifiers and 1 teething ring. These items were delivered to LFCS. The upcoming elections will possibly bring initiative petitions designed to undo all the work done in Missouri over the past 5 decades. In the coming weeks, the Life Team will be working to share information about these petitions and how you can protect life by not signing them.

Greetings in the name of Jesus who values life from beginning to natural end,

Many thanks to all who collected diapers (and reported your numbers to LFL of MO) during Missouri's largest diaper shower. Such collections support babies (and their families) at the beginning of life. Valuing the most

vulnerable at the beginning of life translates into valuing and caring for the vulnerable at the end of life. Pastor Scott Licht, CFO/COO of Lutherans For Life, recently spoke about some end of life considerations at the Annual meeting of Lutherans For Life of MO.

Some of his topics included Curative and Palliative Care, Hospice Care and caring for caregivers. Curative, palliative and hospice care will be discussed below. Caring for caregivers will be discussed in a future article.

The difference between curative and palliative care is that the goal of curative is to cure totally or partially, and delay disease progression. Examples are: for cancer: chemo, radiation; kidney failure: dialysis; an antibiotic for a bacterial infection. Palliative care relieves symptoms of an incurable disease and improves quality of life by using pain medications, treating for depression or anxiety and assistance with daily living. Palliative care may be used with curative care.

Hospice care is palliative, not curative. Usually hospice care begins with a diagnosis of less than six months to live, but may be re-certified. Patients may also be discharged and return to hospice if necessary. Hospice care may be received at home, in a hospital, in a hospice facility, nursing home or assisted living facility.

There are some important questions to ask when choosing a life-affirming Hospice:

Will my pastor be allowed to minister to me in all ways?

How do you determine what is palliative and what is curative?

Do you accept clients on oxygen? Do you pay for it?

Do you accept clients on fluids? do you pay for it?

Do you accept clients on feeding tubes? Do you pay for it? What is your procedure for infection around the feeding tube site?

How do you determine the correct dosages of pain medications? What non-pharmacological interventions do you employ to treat pain?

Do you employ morphine? What has been your experience with it?

Do you employ palliative sedation? If so, when?

Do you employ palliative chemo? If so, when?

Who decides when to discontinue a treatment? What input is given by hospice staff? My family My agent?

Can I keep my primary doctor? How does your medical director work and communicate with my primary doctor?

Does your hospice have a policy regarding physician-assisted suicide? What is it? Why don't you have a policy?

Stay tuned for more information about end of life considerations. God values life at every stage and calls us to do the same.

June 13, 2023 Board of Directors (draft meeting minutes)

The Chair called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.

- II. - III. Approval of the Meeting Agenda: The BOD Chair advised there is one addition to the agenda under new business, Item C. Report on Fundraising Committee, and a handout for the Audio Request. A motion was made and seconded to approve the Meeting Agenda as revised. The motion to accept the revised agenda was approved without further discussion.
- IV. Treasurer's Reports: The TLC Treasurer reviewed the reports from May 2023. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Treasurer's Reports. The motion was approved without further discussion.
- V. Approval of the Consent Agenda: A motion was made and seconded to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion to accept the Consent agenda was approved without further discussion.

VI. Old Business:

A. Monthly Board Report from the Board of Endowment: The Board Chair provided the members with a handout which he then reviewed. The handout outlined the three (3) Endowment funds monitored by the Board of Endowment.

TLC Main Fund: The Board Chair believes the one withdrawal in 2014 followed the joining of that fund with the TLC Youth Fund and was just a simple separation of the two accounts. Records from the board and its activity are not very good.

TLC Youth Fund – the Board of Endowment does plan to discuss the distribution of the funds per the fund plan documents.

Bourret/Elliott Education Fund provides financial assistance for Lutheran students to pursue a church related career.

The Board of Endowment Chair then made a motion that the BOD approve the recommendation of the Board of Endowment for the original principal of \$10K for the TLC Youth Fund and the original principal of \$30K for the Bourret/Elliott Fund be the principal amounts that cannot be spent per their statements in their Special Endowment Fund agreement. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. The motion was approved without further discussion.

The TLC Board to report at the July BOD meeting will be the Board of Social Ministry.

Intermissio: Pastor Thieme led the members in singing stanzas 3 & 4 of Hymn #845.

VII. New Business:

- A. Bus Use Request Zion Lone Elm: Mr. Kespohl made a motion to approve this request from Lone Elm to attend *Esther* in Branson and to be used as a Category C Bus Use Requests. Mr. Kespohl will act as the driver of the bus. Motion seconded and approved without further discussion.
- B. Audio Request: (See Handout Plan of Action): The BOD Chair made a motion for approval of \$9K to provide equipment and labor to provide audio equipment in the gym for upcoming activities that require us to use the gym. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed.

A question was raised whether this is the best bid for connecting the gym and the Sanctuary for video and sound? A suggestion was made to instead put two large tv's in the gym. Sound Design out of Mexico, MO will provide these services for \$20K. The church may also need to

consider protection for any equipment placed in the gym.

TLC will need to upgrade our Wi-Fi connections, and integrate the spaces with audio and video, and this should be factored into this consideration. And it was noted this does not include what the youth would like to add to the youth room as well.

There is a hard wire in the FH and one in the gym. We may need more investigation before moving forward. This is to allow a church service in the gym, not pump the church service in the gym while service is being held in the Sanctuary. Motion as presented was not approved.

C. Update from the BOD Chair on the Fundraising Committee: The BOD Chair directed the members to a handout and reviewed the items in the handout. The BOD Chair has not been able to appoint a person to serve as chair of the Fundraising Committee. The BOD Chair currently has two members who have agreed to serve on the committee. The BOD Chair is looking for 5-7 members to serve on the committee.

VIII. Announcements:

- A. The next BOD meeting is scheduled for July 11, 2023, at 6:30 pm.
- B. The next regularly scheduled AOV meeting is September 24, 2023, at 12 pm.
- IX. **Adjournment**: A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 7:18 pm.
- X. **Closing/Claudendo**: Pastor Thieme led members in singing the last two stanzas of Hymn #845 and a closing prayer.

Go ... Sell All You Have?

"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And he replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me" (Luke 18:18–22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, "No!" But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.


So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What's more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.
