

Those words echoed throughout the sanctuary on Easter morning. The celebration of Christ's resurrection is a powerful experience, and I am thankful for all who helped make that day more special - those who helped prepare and serve a wonderful breakfast at First; the choir for adding their voices in worship at First; and all the children who made such beautiful butterflies at Trinity that I will take on visits to our homebound members. While the Easter day festivities may have come to a close, in the Church we do not stop celebrating Easter morning. It is a Festival that lasts for seven Sundays, a perfect week of Sundays. So hold on to our Easter bonnets, and save some hard boiled eggs to last throughout this special "week".

As we journey through this Easter season, we will have a special guide helping us to hear more about what life is like as Easter people. St. Peter, one of Jesus' closest disciples, has two letters in the New Testament that are attributed to his pen. And this year, throughout Easter Season, we will be reading from the first of those two letters.

Peter was a simple fisherman named Simon. His name was changed to Peter, or in Greek Petros, which means "The Rock" because in Matthew chapter 16 Simon made a dramatic confession. "You are the Messiah," Simon said when Jesus was asking what others were saying about him.

Jesus looked Simon in the eye and then said, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood did not reveal this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it."

In that moment, Peter and his confession of who Christ is become the Rock, a solid foundation for our faith. What a gift it will be to use these weeks to learn more about Peter, his life and ministry and death, and how he serves as a Rock to our faith.

Invite your friends, and neighbors, and anyone who may be curious, to join us in worship each Sunday. Let Peter be your guide in faith these weeks, as we discover the richness of faith, the uncertainties of faith, and yet through it all - it is God who keeps us "Standing on the Rock."

# Yep, I read it! I Recommend it! By Pastor Jamie

One of the most prominent Lutheran theologians today is Martin Marty. He has been a professor of religious history for thirty five years at the University of Chicago, where today he remains professor emeritus. Marty has written a brief encyclopedia about Lutheran theology called: Lutheran Questions, Lutheran Answers: Exploring Christian Faith - published in 2007 by Augsburg Books, an imprint of Augsburg Fortress.

When I review books for the newsletter - I try to find things that are not only interesting to read, but which are helpful in developing a richer faith and deeper understanding of God. I try to find books that are authoritative, and distinctly Lutheran - since we are a Lutheran church. Marty's brief encyclopedia is all of that and more.

This is not a sit down and read cover to cover in one sitting. This resource (not even 160 pages) is meant to get us reflecting on simple and tough questions and to see how from a Lutheran perspective we approach finding an answer. What has been interesting to me is that the answers to the questions he raises are often not answers - but as I said, a way to see how from a Lutheran perspective we approach finding an answer.

For instance, answering the question "Are there errors in the Bible" you will not find a simple yes or no. You will find a discussion on what is more important - that Matthew misquoted an Old Testament prophet - or that the story of God's love is revealed through the story recorded by Matthew. From a Lutheran perspective, we begin answering this question with these thoughts by Marty: "It could be that the error we make is when we worry about 'errors in the Bible. The impulse to get it all right is understandable, since being responsive to Scripture is an urgent issue. The Holy Spirit quides us to pose better questions, such as how does this text relate to us today?" (page 32)

Organized around common teaching points (doctrines), Marty accomplishes giving the ordinary person a theological primer with the intent not on solving or resolving the tensions that exist on such questions like "Are there errors in the Bible" or "I do not remember my baptism as an infant. Can I be rebaptized?" The intent is to draw us into the on-going dialogue which is Lutheran theology – even Martin Luther "defined his theology as he went along, sometimes correcting himself and often letting apparently contradictory assertions stand unexplained." (page 15).

Marty provides us with this reference to help us better understand our Lutheran heritage - to help us feel more confident when you explain to someone else asks, "Why are you Lutheran?" - and for those times when we hear the pastor in the pulpit or on the TV say something we have never heard before and aren't quite sure if he or she is correct. This resource will provide great opportunities of

discussion and open the door to see the many wonderful riches that are found in Lutheran theology. This will serve as a handy guide that you want to have near your Bible and your devotional material. It will be for many a wonderful starting point of being faithful with a more deeply rooted Lutheran theology.

# Communion Grape Juice

At Trinity, we will be making a switch in the grape juice we use for communion. We are switching to white grape juice. We are making this switch to avoid confusion. Recent confusion during a worship service is the impetus for this switch.

This switch will allow our congregation to be more sensitive for those who need to select grape juice for health concerns and for age considerations. Using grape juice that is the same color as the wine is confusing for people coming through our continuous line to receive communion. Whether it is selecting a chalice or selecting an individual cup from the tray, having a different color for juice will make it easier in the moment to tell the difference between the wine and the grape juice.

Thank you for helping us make this switch and for being more hospitable for those

who rely on grape juice as their way to connect with our Lord and Savior Jesus during the sacrament of Holy Communion. I welcome any questions about this switch and welcome any feedback people have regarding our practices in sharing the sacrament.
