

Dear Fellow Ministers,

I am planning on taking a sabbatical in October. One definition which I found describes sabbatical as "a period during which an employee can take time away from work to study or travel." The granting of a sabbatical is a part of the policy manual of our congregation. The South Dakota Synod as well as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the ELCA, also have policies in place which encourage rostered leaders to take a sabbatical. So far in my career I have not taken a sabbatical.


Sabbatical of course comes from sabbath, that idea of taking the day of rest in order to be ready to do what is needed in the coming week. A sabbatical is an extended period of time where rest and study, a break from the usual is provided.

My plan for my sabbatical is to spend the month of October in Americus, Georgia. That is the site of Koinonia Farm. From their website –

Koinonia Farm was founded in 1942 by Clarence and Florence Jordan and Martin and Mabel England as a "demonstration plot for the Kingdom of God." For them, this meant an intentional community of believers sharing their lives and resources, following the example of the first Christian communities as described in the Acts of the Apostles. Other families soon joined, and visitors to the farm were invited to "serve a period of apprenticeship in developing community life on the teachings and principles of Jesus." From the beginning, Koinonians emphasized the brotherhood and sisterhood of all people. When we could afford to hire seasonal help, Black and White workers were paid a fair, equal wage. When the community and its guests and workers prayed or ate a meal, we all sat together at the table, regardless of color. Our commitment to racial equality, pacifism, and economic sharing brought bullets, bomb and a boycott in the 1950s as the KKK and others attempted to force us out. As the threats of violence dwindled, we focused on the poor quality of local housing and began a project to build decent, affordable homes for our neighbors. The housing ministry evolved into Habitat for Humanity International under the leadership of Millard and Linda Fuller, who were members of Koinonia.

I learned of this farm by learning of Clarence Jordan. He is one of the author's in the collection of writings which we are using for adult study on Sunday mornings. As I have discussed my plans with others, Helen Olsen, wife of retired pastor Will Olsen, told me that she had heard Clarence Jordan speak when she was a student at Brookings. Helen grew up in the Baptist Church and was familiar with the ministry of Clarence Jordan and Koinonia Farm. I look forward to the living and working in community which I will experience this fall. It will be a return to those camp counselor days of too many years ago.



Church Council Highlights July, 2023

- Jonathan Steiner, Director for Evangelical Mission for the SD Synod, has resigned his position.
- Plans are underway for the August 5 congregational pool party.
- Trinity staff recently attended a meeting with several other entities who feed the home less in Rapid City. A centralized feeding location at the soccer field on Denver Street is under discussion, but no definitive time table is being offered at this time. Penny reported that Mary from Feeding South Dakota made a point of encouraging Trinity to continue their feeding program. Trinity is one of the few programs with regularly scheduled feeding hours and days and many people depend upon this program.
- Income for June was \$26,703.93 and expenses totaled \$26,768.89.
- KOTA continues to work with Trinity to fine tune the Sunday radio broadcast after their move to a new studio location.
- Trinity's rummage sale has been scheduled for August 11-12.
- The Council discussed forming a committee
 to envision and implement ways to invite
 our "newest neighbors" (those moving into
 apartment complexes within a block or two
 of the church) to Trinity. Several ideas of
 how to welcome people were discussed.
- Talks are underway about how to make our Narthex more inviting and roomier. Some ideas being discussed are: removing one of the pews and a bookshelf, creating a kiosk for handing out information to visitors, installing an electronic device to project a schedule of church activities and special events, and brightening/lightening the narthex.
- The Worship and Music Committee continues to seek a choir director and an additional piano player.
- The Worship and Music Committee is considering going to all gluten free communion wafers and apple juice instead of grape juice. Wine would still be an option.

You may bring rummage items to the church from July 24 through August 7.



NFL "Pick Um"



ALTAR GUILD

You may have noticed subtle changes with Communion at Trinity recently. Finding white grape juice has been difficult and when a visitor mentioned they were allergic to all things grape, the switch was made to apple juice. One more change is in the works. We are checking out moving to all gluten free wafers. Since we love the participation of our volunteer servers, it is difficult to ensure those who need gluten free would not be served following the touch of many wafers with gluten - a potential hazard. After hearing of churches making the switch, we will order the wafers and try them to see if it will work for us as well.

Boiler Issues

The Properties Committee has been watching the performance of the Trinity heating and cooling system with some concern for its operating condition. The system was purchased through a bidding process in 1996. The approximate cost at that time was \$62,600 and it was rolled into an array of renovation elements which were bundled together for financing purposes.

The system is a complex package of boilers with an automated control system that allows the system to function on a "demand" basis. The operation typically switches from one boiler to the other and usually runs during the colder months with both boilers, only in the coldest periods when the demand is at its peak. Recent years have seen some expensive repairs accomplished that have taken an extended period of time to order the required replacement parts. Our maintenance contractors have experienced difficulty in locating original equipment replacement parts and we are currently in our 5th month waiting for a critical part for the second boiler. While it is a reliable system when fully operational our concern is rising for its dependability. The age of the system is approaching 30 years and we can ill afford to lose either of the boilers throwing a long period of strain on the other during the winter months. Boilers are generally long lived but are usually operated with a much higher level of maintenance and care than these have seen for their effective lifetime.

We have shared our concern with the Church Council and the Finance Committee, and they have approved our establishment of a dedicated funding account. This account would help to defray the difficult funding for repair and or replacement should the need arise. It will take some time and dedicated effort to grow the fund to a level that would allow replacement, but we need to start planning for the inevitable problems that will surface with these 30-year-old complex systems. By a not too reliable system of estimating we expect that the replacement of the system will exceed \$120,000 to \$140,000 dollars. We project that the failure would likely occur during a time of

our greatest need and compound the issues.

Damage from a heating failure during the coldest months would create additional structural damage that we could ill afford.
