

Dear Fellow Ministers,

Have you ever visited one of those places, say a church, or maybe some historical building, some famous site that is truly impressive. Was there some sort of guide or interpreter or host who could tell you many fascinating things about the building in which you found yourself? At the very least they made you feel very welcome. It was as though they were delighted that you were there and they had been waiting just for you? Then there are those other times when you stop at some site and even though there are those whose job it is to extend hospitality they did not do so. At best your presence was ignored and at worst they acted as though you were an inconvenience, a bother. As a result your experience was much the less because of it. So often in so many places the experience you might have depends upon a lot more than physical space, than the impressive architecture.

A few months ago the issue of revamping the narthex was raised. The narthex is the area just inside the front door before you get to the nave, which is where all the pews are. The thought was how can we make better use of this space and make it more welcoming. There have been some good suggestions made and work will be proceeding in the near future to make the narthex more attractive and more welcoming.

Part of the thought behind doing something is obviously that desire to provide a warm welcome to those who visit Trinity for whatever reason. It is an answer to one of those very Important questions which congregations need to ask themselves. "Do we expect visitors?" The follow up question is "How will we welcome them?" One of the ways is to make the initial space as welcoming as possible.

One of my professors in seminary wrote of how walking into a church can be one of the most intimidating experiences we have. Maybe the visitor has not been in church for a long season. Maybe there has been some event in their lives which has caused them to seek out an opportunity to worship. Maybe they have previously had a very bad experience with a congregation and this is an enormous risk on their part to see if all congregations are of a like nature.


Maybe the Spirit has been working on them because of those faithful prayers of a family member or friend and they are thinking about living in a faith relationship once again. A warm and friendly welcome just might be what it takes to help them reenter a relationship with Jesus.

Doing work on the narthex is a good thing to do. To make the space as welcoming as possible is a very good thing to do. That is one reason I appreciate so very much the work which is done on our bulletin boards to keep them looking good and also current. I know I have visited some congregations over the years and there has been no change in their bulletin boards during that time. They have become so static you might even say they have become petrified and that is not very welcoming. Ours change regularly which is a marvelous thing.

Welcoming space, bulletin boards that are attractive and current, those things are important. However they go hand in hand with the welcome with which a person is greeted. Again, I'm sure you can remember experiences both negative and positive which have depended upon people, upon hospitality, upon a relationship. How do we care for and care about the person we just met? That I think is what is central to hospitality.

The reason for all of the hospitality we show is because Jesus likes it when we welcome the stranger, the visitor, when we let them know there would be a place for them here. That is what hospitality is and does. Moreover, when we welcome them we welcome him. Maybe that welcome which we extend, which you extend becomes a lifeline for someone who is desperately seeking. A warm welcome, a showing of love is an awesome thing to give and to receive. It becomes a marvelous compliment to a beautiful place to worship, welcoming space. It lets visitors know the people here are as beautiful as the place they have entered.

February 13, 2024 Church Council Highlights

- Pastor will meet with other downtown pastors to coordinate a Parade of Palms on Palm Sunday and to decide if an Easter sunrise service should be held at Main Street Square.
- There will be a Palm Sunday breakfast between worship services this year. Monies raised will go toward the Congregational Mission Trip house build in Mexico in 2025.
- Income for January was \$30,269.68 (this includes the \$7,500 quarterly gift from the Foundation). Expenses for January totaled \$34,227.57.
- Cindy Gruba has been hired to assist in the office on Monday and Wednesday afternoons.
- Several of the suggestions generated at the Leadership Café will be implemented right away, to include reintroducing name tags, involving Penny as liturgist on the second Sundays when Pastor is leading worship, and creating more of a social media presence for the church. Other suggestions made will continue to be discussed and implemented over time.
- The Properties Committee is working to get accurate information on the 68 sprinkler heads in the basement. It is yet to be determined whether they will all need to be replaced or if they can be "tested" and still prove viable.



Annual Congregational Meeting Highlights January 28, 2024

- Attendees at the Congregational Annual Meeting divided into small groups to discuss Sunday morning worship at Trinity. Through the "Leadership Café" format. individuals responded to two "What do you love about questions: worship at Trinity?" and "If you could change anything, adding or deleting or what would making new. that be?" Responses will be compiled and made available to the congregation.
- The church ended the year in the black and presently has four months cash on hand for operating expenses.
- The Properties Committee is exploring options for the possible replacement of sprinkler heads in the basement. The committee is also continuing to maintain the current boiler for as long as possible, but it will need to be replaced in the future.
- Several interpretive signs have been installed in the Eco Prayer Park to help educate the public about the park's goals and appearance. Security cameras have been installed and a nightly patrol by Mountain States Security was initiated to help keep the park a safe space.
- The newly created Park Vision Board hopes to hire a part-time groundskeeper and seek a replacement for the park director in 2024.
- The church served 13,151 single serving meals to our downtown neighbors in 2023.
- The congregation voted for the following individuals to serve three-year terms on the Council: Anna DeSmet, Finance Committee; Eric Braun, Youth Committee; and Jean Bouska, Council Secretary. The position of Stewardship Chairman remains vacant.
- The congregation approved the 2024 church budget of \$355,169.80. This includes a 3% salary increase for staff.



Leadership Café

Following the Leadership Café at our Annual Meeting January 28, the results were collated and made available in a hand out. They are still available in the office. We are still welcoming additional comments and leadership will continue to process what changes will come out of what has been shared.

Pastor Wilbur, Deacon Penny, President Karen Bulman and Worship and Music chair Melanie Paulson met to decide next moves. Changes proposed were presented at the February Council meeting and expanded upon. Here is what is in the works:

•	Reach out to Lutheran Campus Ministry/ Mines/ greater community	Looking into placing posters on campus

Other suggestions listed we will continue to look into:

- If we combine into one service time, have both styles of worship included (try it in the same service) and have the first or only service time be 9am
- Move second service to twice a month rather than guit it
- Find ways to get youth to attend
- ♦ Skits during sermon/interactions/ involve youth group
- ♦ Target young families. See the youth/kids more often, children's sermons when we have kids
- More singing by the choir
- Use Bible verses as parts of liturgy
- ♦ Sing Holy, Holy, Holy two times a year
- Have Communion first and third Sundays and choir sing third and fourth



SD Mines Environmental Club visits snow-covered Park

Students from the Environmental Change and Sustainability Club at South Dakota School of Mines recently toured Trinity Eco Prayer Park. Club president Emily Emond suggested the tour to the club after attending a meeting arranged by Park Vision Board member Erica Haugtvedt, who is an English professor at Mines. Others at the meeting included Mines engineering professor Heidi Sieverding and Park Director Ken Steinken.

Haugtvedt organized the meeting as the result of a Park Vision Board discussion about Park forming partnerships the and with collaborations businesses and organizations that have interests environmental and sustainability issues. One of the purposes of the club members' visit was to see if there might be ways for the students to get involved with the Park as volunteers or to possibly use the Park as a site for research projects. The Park has hosted several Mines research projects in the past.

Since the Park plant life is dormant this time of year and the grounds were mostly covered with snow, it was difficult for students to get an appreciation for the diversity of native plants in the Park. But as the sun was out and the temperature was just above freezing, they were able to observe a strong stream of snowmelt from the alley and nearby parking lots cascading into the stormwater inlet that feeds the Park's drainage channels and ponds. And the bright sunshine also meant the Park's solar panels were generating more electricity than the Park could use and putting any excess current into Black Hills Energy's power lines.

The Mines students who took the tour come from hometowns in Minnesota, Colorado and North Dakota. President Emily hails from Rapid City. The students represented a variety of majors including Physics, Mechanical Engineering, Biology and Business.

The Park Board is also exploring partnerships with Black Hills Works and the Conservation Planning and Park Management program at South Dakota State University.

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Fun Facts according to USA Today about "springing ahead"



Why does Daylight Saving Time change at 2 a.m.?

In an interview with <u>Time Magazine</u>, author Michael Downing cited his book, "<u>Spring Forward: The Annual Madness of Daylight Saving Time</u>," to explain how Amtrak and the railroads were the main reason clocks change at 2 a.m. for DST. There were no trains leaving the station at 2 a.m. on Sundays in New York City when Daylight Saving Time was established. "Sunday morning at 2 a.m. was when they would interrupt the least amount of train travel around the country," Downing said.

Which U.S. states don't change clocks for Daylight Saving Time?

As of July 25, 2022, the <u>U.S. Department of Transportation</u> noted that only Hawaii and parts of Arizona do not participate in daylight saving time. The Navajo Nation is the lone exception in Arizona.

When do we spring forward for DST 2024?

In the U.S., clocks will officially spring forward at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 10, 2024.

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The History and Floral Meaning of the Easter Lily

SPIRITUAL HISTORY OF THE LILY

Known as the "white-robed apostles of hope," fragrant white lilies were believed to symbolize the purity of Christ.

Turns out that in art dating back to the 14th century, the Archangel Gabriel is often depicted giving the Virgin Mary a lily when telling her that she would conceive a son by the power of the Holy Spirit. Thus the flower became associated with rebirth as well as a symbol of loss which is why the lily is used in funerals to connect the departed to God.

So we have ancient artists like Leonardo da Vinci to thank for this becoming part of our current traditions.



Furthermore, according to Marian T. Horvat, Ph.D., as early as the 7th century, the Venerable Bede likened the Virgin Mary to a white lily. He noted that the white petals symbolized her pure virginal body and the golden anthers, the radiance of her soul. Lovely thought, isn't it? The trumpet shape of the Easter lily also fit into the image of a trumpet sounding the message that Jesus had risen and thus loss becomes a form of rebirth too.

Others noted that since lilies start as ugly bulbs that live underground for at least three years and then bloom into these fragrant flowers, this is a metaphor for transformation. Jesus died a brutal death but then had a holy resurrection which has been the root of Christian faith.

Adding another layer to the lily's significance was how the scholars of St. Bernard's time also pointed out how the name Nazareth in Hebrew signifies a flower.

"Beautiful legends emerged to explain the origin of the flower," says Horvat. "It was told that the lily sprang from the tears of Eve, when she was expelled from the Garden of Eden. But it was yellow until the day that the Virgin Mary stooped to pick it, thus symbolizing the role of the New Eve in restoring to the world the innocence lost by Eve."

We particularly appreciate how this flower represents women as well as Christ. And speaking of Christ, even in the Bible, it is said that he had a particular fondness for this flower. In Matthew 6:25-29, Jesus says, "Be not anxious for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than the food, and the body than the raiment? Behold the birds of the heaven, that they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; and your heavenly Father feedeth them.

"Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin: yet I say unto you, that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." Isn't that cool?

So today is a time to reflect on rebirths, loss and especially the beauty of the white lily.

FLOWER HISTORY IN UNITED STATES

Another interesting fact is that the Easter lily came to the United States from Japan. Just like our cherry blossoms.

Following World War I, a soldier named Louis Houghton brought a suitcase of lily bulbs from Japan back to the U.S., specifically to his home state of Oregon. Houghton gave the lily bulbs to his horticultural friends, and soon enough, the area along the California-Oregon border, which happened to have prime growing conditions for the flowers, became known as the Easter Lily Capital of the World.

After Pearl Harbor, Japanese shipments were no longer welcome which created more demand for Easter lilies from Oregon and especially California growers. And just like Detroit became known for cars, soon Smith River, California, home to less than 900 residents, produced 95% of the world's Easter lily bulbs.

Also, the Greek Orthodox use these flowers but celebrate Easter a week later or sometimes a few weeks later. For 2020, it will be April 19th. And once you buy a beautiful lily, here are ways to take care of it.

HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR EASTER LILY

- If your Easter lily comes wrapped in foil, remove it since the plant can become waterlogged on the bottom.
- Easter lilies require a medium moisture level and should never stand in water for a long time.
- Remove the yellow anthers from the center to prolong the life of the white flowers.
- They like bright areas indoors with natural light but not too much exposure to sun.
- Don't let your cats near them. Easter lilies are toxic to cats.
- Lilies are perennials. So yes, you can plant them outdoors once the blossoms wither.
- Plant them in a sunny spot with well-drained soil at the same depth as they were in their vase or container. Many say to spread several inches of mulch then around the base of the flowers.
- Keep the soil moist during winter so the bulbs are happy.
- Do not plant them around other types of lilies. Because a virus could occur.
- ♦ Easter lilies are in a class of their own.

Yes, it is still over a year away. There is a lot of planning that goes into a mission trip and even more fundraising. This upcoming trip we do plan to build a house for a new family. Building this house will cost \$ 11,000, at this time we need another \$4000 to build that house. We will do other ministry while we are in Tijuana and we will connect with our previous 2 families that we built for. We will also do some ministry in a men's home, an orphanage and most likely we will go to the dump which is hard to describe but a ministry for sure. We will also most likely do some kind of VBS.

The next step for us is, we will start raising funds for those who would like to go on this trip. We have taken those as young at 6 years and as old as 79 years. This trip is for anyone who feels God is leading them to take that leap and try a new ministry.

IF you think you are leaning towards going I would encourage you to help with the fundraiser. If you know this isn't something you want to do you can still help. Helping with, and participating in the fundraisers is being a part of the ministry, encouraging those who are going that you are supporting them, financially, all ways to be a part of the 2025 Tijuana mission trip.

Missions Trip with Answer the Call

In February, I was blessed to be able to travel to India and Nepal with Answer the Call International, a non-profit ministry started by my friend and coworker, Lea Haisch. ATC (Answer the Call) has been working with pastors and their churches in India and Nepal for over 17 years. With the help and support of people throughout the US, and beyond, they have been raising money through fundraisers at local churches, radio shows, blogs and word of mouth. Until COVID they even had a store in the Creamery Mall (The Open Suitcase) where they sold goods made by people living in the communities they support, with all the profits going directly back to them.

Our team faced some obstacles along the way. Our plane was grounded in Rapid City due to fog, we rented a car and drove six hours to Billings in order to catch our flight out of Minneapolis which delayed our trip by one day. Four planes and two days later we made it to Rajahmundry, India where the pastors and children from the orphanage met us with open For the next week we would share messages of hope and encouragement to the their wives at a Pastors and Pastors conference, to widows and lepers that gathered together to worship and receive food and provisions and to the members of the sewing centers built to teach women a skill to help them make money for their families. My favorite memory was renting a bus to take the orphans and other members of Pastor Babu Rajesh's church to the Indian Ocean. The children (and us!) had so much fun playing in the warm waters. The most powerful moment was witnessing 8 people get baptized into God's kingdom right there in the ocean! Among those baptized was a young couple that were recently married by Babu and his family. They were running for their lives as the girl's family was trying to have them killed because the young man she married was in a lower caste then her family...an honor killing they called it. We were able to bless them and her mother-in-law, who took them in, with money to help them in their struggles. We will be remembering them in our prayers.

Our last week we spent in Kathmandu, Nepal, supporting and encouraging Pastor MItra and his family as they minister to the people living in the slums of the city where the poorest of the poor live. His church is a shining light right in the middle of the slums. Over 60 children from all over the slums come to his Friday night children's service. There was so much joy coming from that tiny church! We were then invited to one of the home churches where we took turns sharing God's word and encouraging each other. They were singing in Nepalese but we quickly figured out the song from the melody..."How Great Thou Art". We all sang together, them in Nepalese and our team in English, as we worshiped together our God who is so faithful and shows up mightily for those he loves!

What I learned in February while lunching by Kayla Richters

(The following article talks about child sexual abuse)

Last month's Lunch "N" Learn featured Brandon Ferguson as the guest speaker. Brandon is the founder of an organization called Ending the Silence which was founded two years ago. The focus of this organization is ending Native on Native crime and bringing awareness to one of the large issues in our local native community by acknowledging and talking about past traumas of sexual abuse.

Brandon opened with a some shocking statistics. He told us that to date (2-13-2024) in our community that there were 51 Native American kids ages 13 to 17 listed as missing over the last 50 days. He also stated that 4 out of 5 Native American kids are sexually assaulted by the age of 12. He said that in the Native community when these kids are trying to outcry to a trusted family member they are silenced with the threats that "You can't be talking like that" or "You'll never see us again, they will take you and give you to a white family, no one can hear you say these things." Brandon attributes this instillation of fear and burving secrets as the top contributing factors to increased suicide attempts and running away. But how did they get there? How did this familial sexual abuse make its way into the Native American Community.

Let's go back. Brandon explained it to us in terms of his family by talking about his great grandmother, Dora. He explained that when she was a child and sent to a boarding school is when the start of the institutionalized sexual abuse began. He stated that the sexual abuse and rape done to these kids by nuns and priests was then learned and often they would abuse the other kids they were roommates with as well. So then, these kids age out and back to the reservation they go. Now they are young adults with no ability or help to deal with these things that happened to them so most of them turn to alcohol to numb, cover, make the pain bearable. In turn they have kids, and then those kids are sent off to the schools and the cycle perpetuates and grows.

So what can be done? Brandon told us he doesn't have the answers but he does seem to

have some wonderful ideas. He works with the youth in our community to try and give them back some of that hope that's been taken from them. He tries to let them know that they are loved, valued, and that they matter. They spend time in the Black Hills riding ATV's, they go to concerts, movies, he put on the community wide Halloween Trunk or Treat at the church last October, and these are just a tidbit of the things they do. He also organized things for the elders such as Thanksgiving dinner or February Pancake feed. He said hope was one of the big things taken away and that's what he is trying to give back.

He acknowledged the learned bias that we experience as a whole from the things we have seen over the years, for example people passed out on the street, at town festivals, etc. He asked us to imagine now how those peoples kids are also out seeing this but instead of it being just "another drunk" that it is mom or dad, and how that effects their self worth and self esteem. He stated that he personally believes that ownership needs to be taken and facts need to be accepted for change and healing to happen.

One of the last things I want to touch on that he told us was bridging the issues for transitional housing that is needed. He stated that a lot of the time when someone is ready to go to treatment or gets a date where a bed is going to be open for them in a treatment facility that the amount of time between they have nowhere to go sends them back to the alcohol and substances, or back to relationships. He mentioned Native Healing which is to be a 34 bed transitional housing for those waiting to get into treatment facilities so they aren't back on the streets with the drugs and alcohol and in a safe place with people to support and encourage them while waiting for their place in a treatment facility.
