Dear Fellow Ministers,

Last month in the newsletter article I wrote about welcoming, about some of the efforts our congregation was making in order to make our space more welcoming. I also made the point that even the most comfortable and attractive space will not be very welcoming if there is no friendly human contact to fill the attractive space. Engagement with people who are warm and welcoming will make or break the experience of being a visitor. This month I am going to add some more thoughts about that topic.

congregation As we are relationships. We do not always do it well, but it is something for which we strive, the building of relationships. Those relationships which we create with each other are intended to encourage and build the relationship Jesus wants to have with each us and those who might be exploring what it means to enter into that relationship. As those who are disciples of Jesus part of our calling is to help those who want to explore, who are seeking, who want to understand what it means to be a follower of Jesus. The encounters we have with people who visit Trinity, as well as our encounters with those we meet each day are very important and are often what God uses to call people into that relationship.

I was at a meeting for Campus Ministry for School of Mines recently. Several students, some pastors, and a few others were gathered. There was much discussion about the ministry and what is attractive about it for the students who participate. Many of the comments had to do with the welcome they felt when they encountered someone from the ministry. There are a wide variety of students who are engaging with that ministry because of the way they have been welcomed.

One point raised during the discussion particularly caught my attention. There was a distinction made between welcome hospitality. The point was made that welcome is generally that first encounter. You walk in the door and a friendly greeter says hello. Hospitality is something a bit deeper. Hospitality is how can I care for you now that you are here. Hospitality is about making sure a new person knows that they are considered a part of the community and that they will be cared for. The effort of hospitality raises questions for those who are part of the community. "Who is this amazing person made in the image of God who is now among us?" would be one. Another would be, "What can I give of myself in order to care well for this person?" Also, "What can we give, what can I give in order to open up the ability to enter into a relationship?"

Again, a statistic from the Surgeon General, "Social isolation has a profound impact on health: It's as damaging as smoking 15 cigarettes a day, or having six drinks a day. Loneliness increases the risk of heart disease and stroke by about 30%. Chronic loneliness can increase the risk of dementia by 50%. It is also the strongest predictor of suicidality." The care we extend, the hospitality we show can be literally life saving for someone who walks through our doors. In our society it is far too easy for people to become objects instead of persons. When I am willing to be in a relationship with someone it lets them know I am viewing them as a person and not just an object from which I can get something. When we do this well God moments will abound. Truly it will be a God moment for the one to whom we show hospitality as well as one for the person who has shown that hospitality. How can we welcome, how can we care for, how can we bless those who walk through our doors as well as those who are not yet here? It is a challenge.

As people who follow Jesus and live in that blessed relationship let us meet the challenge with all the faith and all the gifts which have been given to us.




Mayor Salamun to Speak at April "Lunch and Learn"

Church Council Highlights March 12, 2024

- February contributions saw a significant drop totaling \$17,270.08 with expenses of \$28,366.23 creating a loss for the month of \$11,096.15.
- George and the Properties crew got Pastor's broken window replaced.
- Pastor will be attending the Synod Council meeting later in the month.
- Trinity will host the Bear Butte conference on March 17, 2024.
- The Lutheran Campus Ministry "Souper Chili Cook-off" is also on 3-17-2024 at 5 p.m.
- A new piano tuner has been found.
- Justin Stephens is checking on ordering a new cover for the grand piano.
- With the current updates being made in the Narthex Penny shared plans/renderings that were drawn up in 1993 by Hengel Associates, PC when an addition to Trinity was considered. Project was scaled down in 1998, however.
- A trial holding of the 2nd service twice a month during June and July is happening. It will be held on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month to correspond with the current communion schedule.
- A discussion continued on changing the 1st service to 9 am during the summer, however Pastor needs to further discuss this with KOTA. Further discussion on this will happen in April.
- Michelle has received correspondence from Steve and Prae asking for special prayers during Ramadan which is from March 10 through April 9, 2024
- Michelle spoke of a sewing ministry she learned about on her mission trip to India that she encouraged Trinity to participate in. The ministry involves a four month sewing class to teach new skills. It is their goal to provide each student a sewing machine upon graduation. The machines cost \$80.00. Sunday school students are taking this on as a project currently.
- Cindy stated that the Evangelism committee is planning to update welcome packets as well as plans to potentially share them with future residents of the area. They are open to suggestions and ideas on what to include and how to distribute them.

 A small committee, consisting of the Elder's and Krull's have begun to update the Narthex. Cindy shared the Thrivent grants and yearly Choice dollars from Thrivent are being used for costs associated with this. So far they have refurbished a couple of cabinets, are making a base for the St. John's cornerstone, and will be purchasing sheetrock to be installed over the existing paneling, ceiling tiles, and new lights for the area.


A short note from Sunday School Teachers


Bridges of Hope: Medical Missions Trip

welcome. We have a mission and we have being commisionated for." (student from Paraguay) The grammar


isn't perfect but the passion is!

Hope Remains

Back in October Trinity Lutheran Church received a call from the then director of the Hope Center, Melanie Timm. She asked if she could set up a meeting to discuss the transpiring closure of the Hope Center. A meeting was set. She talked of the Hope Center, the people who they served, and the lives they impacted. She spoke so passionately and with a broken heart about the impending closure after 12 years of being part of the community. She explained to us the evolution from the beginning, through the pandemic, and up until the end. When she was finished, her request was simple. "Would Trinity be willing to be a place who would let people with ties to the Hope Center continue to meet once a week to have devotions?"

I was unaware before this meeting that devotions even took place there until she told us of the hour or two in the morning where they gather, share scripture, talk about how it pertains to their lives, pray for one another, pray for other people, and simply just check on each other. Melanie was aware the center would be closing and coming to grips with that but she wanted to try and keep the connections, the connections with each other, and the connections with God, and their faith.

After approval was granted by the Council they were given the go ahead to use the entrance where we give meals out, standing room to conduct their weekly devotions on Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m.

The Hope Center has been closed since early December. Since December 13th a loyal group braves whatever the elements to get to the church. They range anywhere from 10-30 plus people, checking on each other, worshiping together, praying, reading and discussing scripture, drawing closer together with one another through faith, drawing closer to God.

The building is gone but the foundation is still there, the connections are still there. God is and will always still be with them.










THE IDEA FOR THE FIRST EARTH DAY


Senator Gaylord Nelson, the junior senator from Wisconsin, had long been concerned about the deteriorating environment in the United States. Then in January 1969, he and many others witnessed the ravages of a massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the student anti-war movement. Senator Nelson wanted to infuse the energy of student anti-war protests with an emerging public consciousness about air and water pollution. Senator Nelson announced the idea for a teach-in on college campuses to the national media. and persuaded McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman, to serve as his co-chair.


Senator Gaylord Nelson recruited Denis Hayes, a young activist, to organize the campus teach-ins and to scale the idea to a broader public, and they choose April 22, a weekday falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, to maximize the greatest student participation.

Recognizing its potential to inspire all Americans, Hayes built a national staff of 85 to promote events across the land and the effort soon broadened to include a wide range of organizations, faith groups, and others. They changed the name to Earth Day, which immediately sparked national media attention, and caught on across the country. Earth Day inspired 20 million Americans — at the time, 10% of the total population of the United States — to take to the streets, parks and auditoriums to demonstrate against the impacts of 150 years of industrial development which had left a growing legacy of serious human health impacts.

Park seeks 2 new staff

Hands-on and head honcho opportunities are currently available for the right individuals at Trinity Eco Prayer Park. The Park

needs a Groundskeeper/Caretaker and an Apprentice Director.

Applicants for both positions must agree to abide by the Park's vision to be "a place to reflect on how we relate to God, one another and the planet" and its mission "to find ways to work with nature instead of against it" and be an example of land and natural resource stewardship for others to follow.

Head Honcho

Director Ken Steinken has been at the helm of Trinity Eco Prayer Park since 2010, before the Park was even built. He is looking to phase out of his leadership role. As a first step in that process the Park is looking for an **Apprentice Director**.

This person would work alongside Ken learning the widely diverse tasks necessary to keep the Park up and running. This includes financial and business-related tasks like board development, fundraising, managing finances, volunteer recruitment and training.

The apprentice would also learn what's involved with managing the physical upkeep of the Park. Starting with learning how to identify native western South Dakota plant species that belong in the Park, as well as those that are not on the Park plant list that need to be removed from the Park. The director also monitors the trash, litter, recyclables, snow removal and graffiti in the Park and is responsible to create a balance between the Park's commitment to naturalistic landscaping and the Park's "curb appeal."

Communications and community outreach is another aspect of the Park Director's job. This entails: 1) writing and distributing articles (like this one) and press releases to the local media; 2)managing the Park's online presence through e-newsletters, the Park website and social media; 3) seeking out and nurturing partnerships with environmentally-conscious businesses and organizations like the Rapid City Sustainability Committee, SD Mines **Environmental Club and SDSU Native Plants**

Initiative; 4)developing educational opportunities from Park signage to school and public outreach programs; 5) organizing and scheduling events to take place in the Park.

The **Eco Park Groundskeeper/Caretaker** is a part-time seasonal position. From April through September the job would be a regular schedule of 3-5 days per week for a total of 15 hours. There would also be an opportunity to work 2-4 hours per week from October through March and possibly more if interested in doing snow removal when needed.

The groundskeeper would perform a combination of duties as directed by the Park Director in order to maintain native plantings and the grounds in a safe and functional condition following sustainable and naturalistic landscaping principles.

Regular duties would consist of basic manual labor tasks including:

- Prepping and/or cleaning landscape and garden areas using small hand tools or manually pulling weeds.
- Hand digging with a shovel or spade.
- Picking up litter, sorting recycling and trash and emptying receptacles.
- Collecting plant debris for removal.
- Edging sidewalks or pathways.
- Assist in other job duties as requested.

The Groundskeeper must be able to learn to identify plants in order to decide which to nurture or eliminate. The ideal candidate needs to be a reliable, hard worker who likes to work outdoors and is willing to get dirty and work in adverse weather conditions. Experience with garden and landscaping tools is preferred. The worker must also be courteous and friendly in dealing with the public (including street people) and volunteers.




