

Dear Fellow Ministers,

What sort of disagreements are there in your world? I suspect there are many and they no doubt range in significance.

Does pineapple belong on pizza? Dry rub or slathered in sauce, which is the best way to cook those ribs on a grill? Is it going to be easier to go through downtown or use Catron to get to Sheridan Lake Road when returning home from The Hills? Should I use Omaha or Main Street? Is there truly any sport more exciting than baseball?

I could go on of course because there are so many disagreements which we have in our day to day lives. Where to eat, what to eat, which businesses should we patronize? Should we shop online or shop local, natural yard or manicured grass are a few more which come to my mind.

Here at Trinity we are caught up in a rather major disagreement. In early June a meeting was held at the request of members of the Rapid City Police Department. They expressed concerns about our feeding program, not the program itself as much as the consequences or results of the program. As a result of this meeting a discussion was held at semi-annual meeting about caring for our neighbors. The same discussion has been held in other groups as well. One of the things which I have said often during this time is that it is good to have a conversation about what we do. Is it the right thing? Does it achieve what we want? What might be better ways for us to do what we are called to do?

Over the years we have made adjustments to our caring for our neighbors. We have shortened the time during which we serve food. We have limited the number of people we will serve during the day. We have instituted a co-pay system for gas vouchers and for identifying documents. In all of that though we have not wrestled with some of those very hard questions which are at the heart of what we do and the heart of who we are. That is what we are doing now. As a result of those discussions and the conversation with the police officers we have taken a break from handing out food for two weeks. That gives us time to think, to

discuss, to see what happens when something different is being done.

For me there are two central beliefs which must be held as we discuss an issue which is much more sensitive than which spectator sport is the most fun to watch. The first of those beliefs comes from Proverbs 27:17, "As iron sharpens iron one person sharpens another." When discussions are done well both parties grow in understanding as thoughts and ideas are exchanged. When what I hold is challenged it gives me the opportunity to reexamine what I think and believe, and to refine the defense of what I hold, or maybe approach the issue with new understanding. The other is from Martin Luther, his explanation to the 8th commandment. "We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light." What motivates this person to say what is being said? What is their desire? What is their heart? What values do they hold dear?

In the heat of a 'discussion' when passions are riding high, it might be a little difficult to hold on to such thoughts. For the sake of community, we need to let such thoughts guide what we say. We are having a difficult discussion in our congregation and obviously there are valid points on both sides. Caring for our neighbors is a key part of who we are and what we do. Caring for our neighbors also has many visible and invisible consequences. Is there a magic bullet, a perfect answer, I doubt it. So let us talk and discuss and disagree and pray that we might arrive at a very good even though it is not a perfect answer.



Church Council Highlights June 10, 2025

- Constanze Hagmaier was re-elected as bishop of the S.D. Synod.
- Income for May totaled \$16,623.31 and expenses totaled \$29,304.86.
- The Council reviewed a handout on stewardship and agreed it should be made available at the semi-annual congregational meeting and published in an upcoming Trinity newsletter.
- The Council discussed problems with Walmart food certificates and the frustration of members of the congregation when they do not always work properly. There are no problems with Family Fare and Safeway food certificates. Council would like to see the sale of food certificates continue because it is an excellent way to support Church Response. They discussed putting a disclaimer in the bulletin about Walmart certificates.
- Council was informed that a meeting had taken place between Tim Doyle of the Rapid City police department, two Quality of Life officers from the RCPD, the director of the Mobile Medical Unit from the fire department, representatives from the two different security companies that employed by Trinity and the Prayer Park, Steinken and church staff Ken volunteers. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss increased problems with homeless individuals sleeping on church property and in the Eco Prayer Park, loitering and littering. Tim Doyle asked Trinity to consider that by providing food five mornings a week, Trinity is actually enabling the homeless population we are trying to Tim asked that Trinity take a two week reset and stop serving food during that time period. After much discussion, the Council agreed that: 1) the reset period was a good idea, 2) the devotions led by Alice Bentley and former Hope Center staff could continue, and 3) it may be time to consider alternate ways to assist people Instead of the feeding program.

• The Properties Committee will be prioritizing property needs and addressing the most crucial things first. Two top areas of concern are the leak in the corner of the courtyard that causes water to puddle in the fellowship hall after a rainstorm and the dampness in the youth room. Also, underground sprinklers will be set to run manually this year instead of automatically. A possible spot in the courtyard has been identified for permanently installing the cornerstone from St. John's Lutheran Church.

Semi-Annual Congregational Meeting Highlights June 22, 2025

- Pastor Wilbur has requested, and the Council has approved, some sabbatical time at Koinonia Farm in Georgia this fall.
- Wednesday night worship services have been going well, although attendance is smaller than hoped for.
- For January 1 through May 31, Trinity's total income is \$129,966.21 and the total expenses are \$154,710.98.
- The Foundation will provide \$40,000.00 to Trinity's budget in 2025.
- A handout on stewardship was distributed. It is always appropriate to look at our individual stewardship; how are we using what God has entrusted to us.
- Doug Krull was introduced as new Properties Committee Chair.
- Members of the Missions Committee are traveling to Two Strike once a month this summer for a community BBQ. Members of the congregation are invited to attend.
- Two native plant botanists have been hired to maintain the Eco Prayer Park this summer through September. The park has contracted for 10 hours per week at a cost of \$1,200.00 per month.
- At the request of the Rapid City Police Department, a meeting was held at Trinity in early June to discuss problems with the

homeless population loitering, littering, and sleeping on church property and in the Eco Prayer Park. The police department asked Trinity to consider that by feeding individuals five days a week, the church is actually enabling them to use their limited resources to purchase alcohol drugs. The police have requested a two week pause in feeding the homeless, to include a two week closure of the Eco Prayer Park. Police hope a two week pause would be a time for behavior to change and perhaps the trouble makers would find a new spot to hang out.

- Attendees at the meeting broke into small groups to discuss the issue of feeding the homeless and a possible two week pause. Good discussions took place. Afterward, several opinions were voiced in the open meeting.
- Members of the congregation voted to suspend the feeding program at Trinity for a two-week period. It was determined that an announcement should be posted to give individuals participating in the feeding program a one-week advance notice prior to the suspension of feeding.
- This is the 100-year anniversary of a "physical building" Trinity's for congregation. St. John's Lutheran Church, which changed it's name to Trinity Lutheran Church in 1942, was built and cornerstone laid in 1925. The cornerstone for St. John's is currently on display in the breezeway. A possible spot for permanently installing the cornerstone has been located in the church courtyard. It is hoped the installation would be part of the 100th anniversary celebration of a physical building for the congregation.

STEWARDSHIP

The dollars part of stewardship, is often the elephant in the room that no one likes to talk about. Giving at Trinity has been a low key affair for quite some time. The Council has not had a stewardship representative for a few years. Our giving has allowed the congregation to maintain an adequate budget for many years. However, our giving is no longer adequate to meet our budget needs.

Shortfalls have been made up with money from Trinity's Foundation: \$32,000 in 2024 and \$40,000 in 2025. While increased, we have also seen funds given to Trinity's operation in other ways. One or two end of year donors often cover any shortfalls. And vital support has increased. And yet we should not depend on a few large donations without looking at what each of us may be able to do.


















God Moments and Blessing Box submissions



Park closure allows for special projects

In response to a suggestion from the Rapid City Police Department,

Trinity Eco Prayer Park was closed from July 1-14. The request came as the result of police observing an increase in loitering in the Park and on the church property. The thinking was that with the Park closed, people would find some place else to go and perhaps not as many would return when the Park re-opened.

Closing the Park was a challenge. However, the RCPD requested barricades from the Street Department to block off the five sidewalks into the Park. The bushes along Hardee's and the wetlands channel, which forms a moat of sorts, created natural barriers on three sides of the Park. Barricade tape strewn across the front of the Park announced that the Park was "Temporarily Closed." Very few people attempted to enter the Park during the closure.

Having nobody in the Park allowed for some projects to take place that would have been difficult with visitors present. The shelter, which was built in 2014, received a new coat of stain. Grassroots Conservation was able to reseed some areas and plant some new species in the Park. The lack of foot traffic created a window of time for plants to get established before people returned to the Park.

Hiring native plant specialists - a "miracle" of sorts

At the Park Vision Board meeting in June, Park Vision Board member Erica Haugtvedt signed an agreement with Grassroots Conservation to handle the Park grounds keeping duties through September 30. This includes general maintenance such as weeding, pruning, thinning of plants, as well as removal of litter and debris from the Park.

But thanks to the native plant expertise of Grassroots Conservation owners Ben Shreves and Anthony Checchi (see related article), the duo will also work to monitor and increase the Park's native plant diversity. Additionally, the team will provide leadership for Park volunteers and tour groups, assist with educational signage and explore possibilities for educational and music events to be held in the Park. They will provide all these services for \$1,200 per month.

"Ben and Anthony are literally the answer to many, many prayers I've prayed over the last several years for God to bring us someone with the skills, passion and grasp of the Park's unique mission to help manage the Park and plan for its future," said Park Director Ken Steinken. "It seemed a nearly impossible ask to find someone who would be a good, let alone perfect, match.


"But God answered in a big way, sending us not just one, but two people with the experience and enthusiasm to see the Park succeed and excel. It's a perfect example of Ephesians 3:20 that says God can do 'immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine."

And to make it even more amazing the job wasn't even advertised. The connection came about as the result of a conversation Ken had with somebody about wanting to find someone to do an inventory of the Park plant species. (See article in February 2025 Trinity News.) That person told his son about it and his son did the inventory before he ever met Ken. The son's name was Ben Shreves.

Eventually Ken and Ben met. After several conversations, the idea came up that the Park could be the newly-formed Grassroots Conservation's first client.

<u>Meet Grassroots Conservation founders -</u> <u>Ben and Anthony</u>



Ben Shreves

Ben Shreves is a South Dakota native raised in the Black Hills for the majority of his life. His love for the natural world developed at a young age and he has been striving to provide education and conserve the state's beautiful landscapes ever since. Ben attended South Dakota State and Black Hills State for his undergrad and Masters respectively. He has held positions in fire ecology and as an interpretive ranger at Wind Cave National Park. He has also held multiple teaching positions, teaching botany at Oglala Lakota College and general biology at Black Hills State.

Most recently Ben has filled roles in habitat restoration with SDSU and the National Park Service, spending multiple years creating and implementing seed collection strategies throughout the Northern Great Plains. Ben's drive and passion for habitat conservation has led him to start Grassroots Conservation, a small outfit that aims to provide native plant expertise and restoration knowledge to folks in and around the Black Hills to help make for a more sustainable landscape in our cities and towns.

<u>Meet Grassroots Conservation founders -</u> <u>Ben and Anthony</u>



Anthony Checchi

Anthony Checchi is a transplant to South Dakota arriving in the state almost 15 years ago to attend college at Black Hills State. He was raised in the front range of the Rocky Mountains, spending time as a child in Colorado and Wyoming where he developed a love for the wide-open spaces and all the things that inhabited them. After graduating high school Anthony pursued a technical program at Laramie County Community College to become a firefighter. After receiving certification from LCCC, Anthony then pursued a biology that brought him to South Dakota and Black Hills State University where he worked on his undergraduate and master's degrees.

Anthony's professional career includes a position teaching general biology at Black Hills State, and positions with the Bureau of Land Management in rangeland management, researcher with National Parks, and most recently as a habitat restoration specialist with Pheasants Forever. Anthony possesses a deep passion for sustainability. Because of this he joined Ben to form Grassroots Conservation, hoping to impact his local community and bring sustainable practices to the urban interfaces of the Black Hills.
