LWML Mission Grants 2018

Lutheran High School Education Tuition Assistance

\$54,000

Northrop Martin Lutheran High School, Winona Hope Lutheran High School, Mayer Lutheran High School and Roseville Concordia Lutheran High School provides tuition assistance for needy families who prefer their children to attend a Lutheran High School and receive the education centered around Christ. Lutheran Schools provide training to the next generation for Christian leadership. The students learn through God's Word to grow in their faith and share that faith with others long after graduation. The funds of this grant will be disbursed between the four schools. Each school will receive \$13,000. St. Michael and All Angels Day: September 29

"As Your holy angels always serve You in heaven, may they also defend us here on earth."

O everlasting God, whose wise planning has ordained and constituted the ministry of men and angels in a wonderful order, mercifully grant that, as Your holy angels always serve You in heaven, so by Your appointment they may also help and defend us here on earth; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Holy Cross Day: September 14

Merciful and everlasting God, You did not spare Your only Son but delivered Him up for us all that He might bear our sins on the cross. Grant that our



hearts may be so fixed with steadfast faith in Him that we may not fear the power of any adversaries; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen

This complex cross, also called the Crusader's Cross or Fivefold Cross, has several interpretations. The main cross is composed of four tau (T) crosses representing the Old Testament law. The four small Greek crosses symbolize the fulfillment of the law in the gospel.

The five crosses together represent the church's mission: to spread the gospel to the four corners of the earth. They're also said to symbolize Christ's five wounds (hands, feet and side). Godfrey de Bouillon, the first ruler of Jerusalem after it was liberated from the Muslims, used the cross on his coat-of-arms. It was also embodied in the heraldry of the Crusaders.

I am a GUEST will you please . . .


- Smile at me as I walk in the door. You are my first impression of the church.

- Notice me even if I am not a "family." I don't want to feel invisible just because I am unmarried, divorced, a single parent, a teenage, or an older person.
- Talk to me again the second week when I come back, and the third. I am still not a part of your church family.
- Invite me to become part of something. I need to be affirmed by a group of people who know me by my first name and who care about me as an individual.
- Don't assume that some else in the church is going to do this. They are probably making the same assumption.

For the last few months, my siblings and I have had the not so comfortable conversations with my parents of about their ultimate deaths. My parents are writing down their desires and updating their will with the assistance of a lawyer.

We are all going to pass someday and letting trusted loved ones know your desires is a tremendous help when that day comes. Write things down. Memories fade and grief clouds memories under the stress of a death. It is a good idea to write down your desires as I was surprised at a few things my parents requested. Had they not written down some of their wishes concerning their deceased bodies and shared them with me,



I would have presumed differently.

Consider an Advanced Health Care Directive. How do you want to be treated during the last days of your life and whom do you want to make those decisions? Consider your End-of-Life Housing desires. Where do you want to live?

Take the time and have a will prepared. The reality is that everyone has a will. If you do not have one prepared, the state has one for you. The state will have first claim on your property and distribute it as they see fit if you don't have a proper will prepared. A "dresser drawer will" is usually not going to work.

Collect in one place all your bank accounts, insurance, deed locations, etc. Even collect all those computer account passwords so they can be dealt with. Do you really want your Facebook account open for years after you pass.

Take some steps and pre-plan your funeral with the assistance of a funeral home. At the very least, let you loved ones know where you want your funeral. Pick your favorite hymns and verses. Write some details you would like included in your obituary.

I admit, I have only completed a few of these suggestions, but these a just a few "Thoughts from an Elder"

Food for Backpacks

Many of our local children will be going back to school in a few weeks, for the Albert Lea School District #241, the first day of school is August 21. Did you know that there are over 200 children in the Albert Lea School District who go hungry on the weekend? For them ithe only meals, healthy and balanced, are the ones they receive during the week at school. Several churches in the community have banded together to assist these specific children through the program "Food for Backpacks." Zion and Grace Lutheran Churches are partnering in the "Food for Backpacks" program at Hawthorne Elementary School. The children will be receiving a bag of healthy food that cost \$1.31 per weekend. The program runs for thirty-four weekends during the school year. The food bags will be placed in their backpacks by the school's social worker before the kids go home for the weekend. Zion's goal is to sponsor 25 children for the 2018-2019 school year. Support this program through your prayers, picking-up, organizing, and delivering the food to school. Additionally, your financial support for this caring program will provide meals for these 25 children or more as the Lord blesses. Envelopes to support this program are in your church mailboxes or earmark your check "Food for Backpacks." Additional information on the meals is on the Community bulletin board. September Stewardship Article

It's September, and everything is in full swing again: back to school and back to church attendance after vacations and weekends away. And since everything is back into full swing, it's a perfect time to get back to basics, back to the foundation.

At the end of the first of his chapters on the virtue of faith in *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis provides a helpful reminder, by way of analogy, for the foundation of stewardship. He wrote:

Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So then, when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to its father and saying, "Daddy, give me six pence to buy you a birthday present." Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is sixpence to the good on the transaction. When a man has made these two discoveries God can really get to work. It is after this that real life begins. (128–129).

This is the first thing we are given to confess about stewardship, and it has to do with ownership. God owns everything, and we are simply managers — stewards — acting on His behalf. This is true not only of all that we have in this life (Deuteronomy 8:17–18), but also all that we are in this life (1 Corinthians 6:20).

The rest flows from here. Since we are stewards, or managers, of what belongs to God, entrusted to make use of it according to His will, there is an expectation of responsibility and accountability.

For the Lord said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b).

And from this comes blessing and reward: "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master" (Matthew 25:21).

We have everything we need to support this body and life from our God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We have everything we need for our spiritual life also from His merciful hands.

On account of the sacrifice of His Son, our Lord Jesus, through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, we have the forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and everlasting salvation delivered to us with absolute certainty that it is ours — not as stewards but as sons (Galatians 4:1–7).

Let us then, as His own sons, press all that He gives to us into the service of His church and to His glory.
