Advent Anticipation



In early church history, Advent began as a time of repentance. It served as preparation for Epiphany, which was the second most popular

day for baptisms (after Pentecost). Common traditions during the Advent season, including wreaths and candles, add to the anticipation of Jesus' birth. Another tradition is to leave the manger empty when you set up your nativity scene. Then, during Christmas morning celebrations, you can place the newborn baby Jesus in his "bed."

A Sure and Bright Faith

Bonhoeffer was in prison because he opposed Adolph Hitler's demonic actions. Bonhoeffer knew he would soon be executed. It was a time of loneliness and dreadful anticipation. While writing a letter to an old friend during Advent, Bonhoeffer remembered this hymn verse:

The manger glows bright and clear, The very night gives out a light, Darkness must not here appear, But faith remain both sure and bright.

The brave Bonhoeffer knew that no matter how dark and challenging a Christian's circumstances may be, we can celebrate joyously because the Lord has come. As he was led away to be hanged, Bonhoeffer said, "This is the end — for me the beginning of life."



Legend of the Poinsettia

The Poinsettia was named for Joel Robert Poinsett, a native of South Carolina. Poinsett was serving as an ambassador in Mexico when he came across the Poinsettia. In 1829 he sent



some home from Mexico to South Carolina, where they did very well in his greenhouse.

According to legend, the origin of the poinsettia was as follows: A poor Mexican girl and her brother were on their way to church on Christmas eve but had nothing to give the Christ child. They gathered weeds and made them into a small bouquet. The other children made fun of their gift. When they laid the branches at the manger in the church the weeds were miraculously transformed into bright red and white leaves that we know was the poinsettia.

Another version of the legend speaks of a poor child who prayed for a gift to present to the Christ child. As he knelt at the altar his prayers bright red and green plants grew up at his feet.

There is another completely unrelated legend, which says that as the Star of Bethlehem shone of the earth the earth responded by producing a plant that mirrored the star's beauty. The flower was star shaped with white petals and a golden star center. On the day that Christ died on the cross the white petals turned red to remember Jesus blood and some remained white to remember the purity of his sacrifice.

The general shape of the plant and the arrangement of leaves is seen as a symbol of the Star of Bethlehem which led the wise men to the baby Jesus. The red colored leaves symbolize the blood of Christ. The white leaves represent his purity.

+ Stewardship +

Throughout his epistles and his preaching recorded in the Book of Acts, St. Paul refers, in one way or another, to thanksgiving and thankfulness nearly 50 times. Whether vertically toward God or horizontally toward the neighbor, thanksgiving is a major theme within St. Paul's body of work.

What does this mean? It means thankfulness is intrinsic to the life of those baptized into Christ. In other words, giving thanks is what Christians do as they live out their lives in this world.

The problem is that we often forget this. Consider your average, run-of-the-mill, normal day. When you get home, and your parents, your spouse or your children ask about your day, what first comes to your mind? After 99 percent of things went right, went exactly as planned, were enjoyable and blessings, we tend to focus on and remember the 1 percent of things that Give thanks for these things. Make a list went poorly, that didn't go as planned, and that were nuisances.

We remember the bad things. We focus on discontent. And we fail to give thanks in all circumstances for everything (Eph. 5:20) and to rejoice in the Lord always (Phil. 4:4).

Thankfulness and contentment go together. We are content with things for which we are thankful. St. Paul could be content with having plenty or when in need because He gave thanks to the Lord for all things. He thanked the Lord for those who had prayed for him and listened to his proclamation of the Gospel. He gave thanks for their good works in and for the Church of Christ. He gave thanks for the grace of God in Christ Jesus and found

that God's grace was sufficient for him. So, give thanks for all things and in all circumstances dear brothers and sisters in Christ. For you have been saved from sin, death, and hell by the death and resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, You have been added to the very family of God in an adoption of grace through Holy Baptism. God is your Father. Our Lord, Jesus Christ is your brother.

But He not only provides for your spiritual well-being, He cares also for this body and life. Your Father in heaven provides food and clothes, house and home, husband, wife, and children. He gives you reason and all your senses. He has given you the raw talents that you have developed into careers. Everything you are and everything that you have is a gift from His fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in you.

every morning if you must. Say them out loud. Sing about them within the congregation of the saints. And remember this: God has given you these things so that you may be of service to those around you - your family, your neighbors, your brothers and sisters in Christ. For to whom much is given; much shall be required (Luke 12:48).

How to Welcome Our Visitors

Research has shown that many visitors to a church make up their minds whether or not to return within the first 30-60 seconds of their entering the church building. This means that for these people, their minds are made up before the church service begins. This means that each of us has a role in making these visitors feel welcome and important.

What can I do? First, be alert to a new face. Open the door for them, smile and say "hello" and shake their hand! Next, be ready to answer any questions, including questions about directions, which the visitor may have. We do have signs throughout the building, but sometimes spoken directions to the bathroom or Sunday school rooms are more helpful. Do not be afraid to sit with a visiting family or individual during worship. Help them if they seem unsure of what to do, say or sing. Finally, after the close of the service, take some time to talk with our guests if you haven't already spoken to them before the service, and invite them to join us in worship again. Invite them to any other activities, Bible study, and events that Zion has to offer; the Zion Chronicle is a resource!

Sunday School Lessons

December 2: The account of God giving "The Ten Commandments" to Moses is today's Sunday School lesson. The children will learn that the law was given through Moses but grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. Talk about God's laws and how they guide us and show us our sin when we cannot keep them. Ask your children, "Who kept the Law perfectly for us?" Though we sin much, daily we have God's forgiveness because of Christ, His Son.

December 9: Today in Sunday School, students will study "Worship in the Tabernacle." In the tabernacle, God dwelled with His people, cleansing them and making them holy through the blood of sacrifices. Ask students, "How did God rescue people bitten by the serpent? How does God rescue you?"

Nine Lessons and Carols

The traditional Christmas Eve service using Bible lessons and Christmas carols was first held in England in 1918 at Cambridge University's King's College. Eric Milner-White, a 34-year-old who had just been appointed dean of King's, planned the service. His previous experience as an army chaplain convinced him that the Church of England needed to make worship more expressive.

The service has been broadcast from King's annually since 1928, missing only one year (1930). Radio listeners could tune in and hear the service during World War II, although the name of King's couldn't be broadcast due to security precautions. During the war, the chapel's antique glass — and thus all its heat — had been removed.

Every year, millions of people worldwide listen to the "Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols." Since 1919, the service has begun with the hymn "Once in Royal David's City."

You can hear the "Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols" on local Minnesota Public Radio stations (in Albert Lea it is broadcast on KNGA 92.7 FM) on Christmas Eve Day.

I would like to thank all who have helped with donations to the backpack lunches that are delivered every week to District 241. We can be very proud of Zion for helping the community out in such a way that brings smiles to these children.

We are serving 329 lunches each week in this district. The numbers may fluctuate each week for meals during the school year. The cost of each meal is \$3.35 per child which we are supporting 35 children with Grace Lutheran Church. The average cost to support a child in a year is \$150 to \$155. Between Zion and Grace Lutheran we are taking every other month to deliver the food to Hawthorne School. Currently, we are delivering 77 meals every week to the school.
