Why does Easter have a moveable date?

That is the million-dollar question! This has puzzled modern Christians. So here is the scoop on Easter Sunday's moveable date.

Easter is always the Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox which can be March 20 or 21. This full moon can appear on any date between March 20/21 and April 18. This year the full moon occurs on Monday, March 29. If the full moon occurs on a Sunday, Easter Day is the following Sunday.

So how early and late can Easter be? Well, that too has been figured out for us. Easter cannot be any earlier than March 22 and no later than April 25.

About ten years ago, we celebrated Easter on March 23. This was early! We had snow on the ground according to my Pastor's calendar in 2008. Holy Week felt more like Christmas than Easter. Thank the Lord for the radiant garden of Easter lilies and spring flowers that adorned the church. The Easter bouquet of smell in the sanctuary made gave you the sense that it was Easter!

If you have not figured this out by now, the dating of Easter each year sets when Ash Wednesday will be, along with how long the Epiphany season will run in length from 4 to 8 weeks. Ash Wednesday falls in the seventh week before Easter. It also marks the first day of the penitential season of Lent.

The season of Easter is fifty days in length. Jesus ascended on the fortieth day of the Easter season, which is always a Thursday. The scripture passage about this amazing account is in Acts 1:1-11. It is the giving of the Great Commission in Matthew 28.

I hope this answers a few trivial questions for you about the dating of Easter. Christmas is easier to explain . . . it always lands on December 25! ©

Stewardship

"Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out" (Deut 28:3-6).

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises a blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground or their wombs, their flocks or their herds. He will make them prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the Lord your God" (Deut. 28:2b). If they did that, He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you" (Deut. 28:2a).

If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and walk in His ways (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail. Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh, fulfilled the law for us – in in our place and for our benefit; died for us – in our place and for our benefit; and is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit.

By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon His work and not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and thereby it becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is not in order to receive blessings but because in Christ we already have.

It is with this in mind that we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).

Palm Sunday- April 14 – 8:00 AM and 10:30 AM

Celebrate with us on this Palm Sunday as we commence with Holy Week. We'll have palms for all the worshippers (children, youth, and adults). Shout "Hosanna" ring forth from the lips of the gathered. The character of the service is one of holy joy to somber humility. It is joy in welcoming of our Lord, yet knowing where He is headed - the cross of Calvary. Holy Communion will be celebrated.

Maundy Thursday- April 18 - 7:00 PM

As we gather on this Maundy Thursday, we begin our three-day Triduum (a service that continues until Easter Morning). It is a night filled with many events: Lord's Supper instituted, Washing of disciples feet, commandment of love; praying in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus' betrayal, arrest, and trial. The service elements will be: confession and absolution, hearing God's Word, celebrating Holy Communion, First Communion, and the stripping of the altar.



Good Friday- April 19

7:00 PM

Good Friday, a life-changing day, marks the death of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on the cross. On that cross, He paid the price for our sins. Worshippers will have the opportunity to nail a nail to a cross. Tenebrae (Darkness or Shadows) will be our service. Candles are extinguished after hearing the Last Words of Christ from the cross. It is a somber and powerful emotional service.

Easter Sunday – Sunrise- April 21

8:00 AM and 10:30 AM

Let the trumpets sound! "Alleluia! Christ is risen! He has risen indeed! Alleluia!" It is our cry on this blessed Easter morn! Everyone is welcome and invited to join us on this queen of all celebration – the Day of Christ's Resurrection! Joyful sounds of praise will arise to the risen Lord! Holy Communion will be celebrated on this glorious day! Following the service, there will be Easter treats and an Easter Egg Scavenger Hunt for the children and youth. That You May Believe and Have Life in His Name

On the Lord's Day, St. John the apostle was given a revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, the Alpha and Omega, the First and the Last. He is the Living One, "the firstborn of the dead" (Rev. 1:5). He died for all people, and behold, He is alive forevermore! Therefore, He has "the keys of Death and Hades" (Rev. 1:18). For His death atoned for sin and conquered death, and in His resurrection He opened the kingdom of heaven to us. The "sharp two-edged sword" of His mouth (Rev. 1:16) calls you to "believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God," that by such faith "you may have life in his name" (John 20:31). To that end, He sends His ministers of the Word, as the Father sent Him, "to give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins" (Acts 5:31).

The Friendly Church

A friendly church is one where worshipers greet one another warmly and sincerely.

A friendly church is one where members seek out newcomers and make them feel welcome and important. Visitors hear that the congregation can help meet various needs: spiritual nourishment, Christian education, fellowship, friendship, service opportunities, support, and comfort during difficulties and more.

A friendly church has something for everyone. It becomes a loving home where people desire to return frequently for spiritual, social, physical, and emotional support.



The 10-Foot Rule

Some churches follow the 10-foot rule: When anyone is within 10 feet of another person on church grounds, he or she offers a warm welcome and cheerful greeting.

This rule originated with Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton, who encouraged store employees to look customers in the eye, greet them and ask if they needed help.

As an ambitious college student in Missouri, Walton discovered that "one of the secrets to campus leadership was the simplest thing of all: Speak to people coming down the sidewalk before they speak to you."

Walton used the person's name if he knew it. "But even if I didn't, I would still speak to them," he said. "Before long, I probably knew more students than anybody in the university, and they recognized me and considered me their friend."

No sincere welcome is unimportant, even if necessity requires brevity.

The Greatest Ornament

"The church knew what the psalmist knew: Music praises God. Music is as well, or better, able to praise him than the building of a church and all its decoration; it is the church's greatest ornament." - Igor Stravinsky

Liturgical Glossary –

In the section of the hymnal, we find a number of words in these services, of which we have no inkling what they really mean. In order to assist you in your study and understanding of them, I have placed a few liturgical glossary items below.



Agnus Dei (AH-nyoos DAY-ee): Latin for "Lamb of God," this hymn in the communion liturgy draws on the words of John the Baptist who pointed his disciples to Jesus, the Lamb of God (Jn 1:29). In the context of the communion liturgy, we are praying to Christ who is there present in his body and blood to have mercy on us and grant us peace.

Alleluia: Hebrew for "praise the Lord" (though in its Greek spelling). It is a word of joy and gladness. An ancient custom is to refrain from using Alleluia during Lent in order to distinguish the penitential nature of this season from the exuberance of the Easter season that follows.

Baptismal Garment: The baptism service provides the option of laying a white cloth on the newly baptized, symbolizing the righteousness (purity) of Christ with which they have now been clothed (Gal. 3:27). This practice is reminiscent of an ancient practice of clothing the newly baptized in a white garment. A vestige of this tradition is the use of a christening gown which is often handed down from generation to generation. (See also Rev. 7:9—17.)

Compline (KAHM-plin): Similar in nature to bedtime prayers, Compline is the last of the daily prayer offices that came into use during the Middle Ages. Prayed in later evening, the service is simple in nature and includes this appropriate antiphon for use with the Nunc Dimittis: "Guide us waking, O Lord, and guard us sleeping, that awake we may watch with Christ and asleep we may rest in peace."

Funeral Pall: A large, white cloth that covers a closed casket during the funeral service. Based on St. John's vision of the saints in heaven (Rev. 7:9), the pall symbolizes the white robe of righteousness given to all believers in Christ. The pall is also

a reminder of the white garment sometimes given at the time of Baptism and symbolizes the new life in Christ first given at Baptism and now fully realized in death.

Hosanna: From Hebrew, its basic meaning is "to save." It functions as a plea to God our king to have mercy on us and save us from our lost condition.

Kyrie eleison (KEE-ree-ay ay-LAY-ee-zon): From the Greek, it is a direct address to God, meaning "Lord, have mercy." The ten lepers, blind man Bartimaeus, and others addressed Jesus with these words. The Kyrie appears early in the Divine Service. It is not part of the confession of sins but a cry to God to have mercy on us and all humanity.

Maundy Thursday: From the Latin word mandatum, which means "command." The reference is to the Holy Gospel appointed for the day from John 13:34, "A new command I give you: Love one another." Also called "Holy Thursday."

Passion Sunday: In the three-year lectionary, the Sunday before Easter. Traditionally referred to as Palm Sunday, the day commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem but then shifts focus toward the suffering that Jesus endured on our behalf. In the historic one-year series, the fifth Sunday in Lent is called "Passion Sunday."

Stripping of the Altar: A ceremony that may conclude the Maundy Thursday service in which the altar is "stripped" of all its appointments (candles, vessels, linens, etc.). Other ornaments may also be removed from the sanctuary. The ceremony symbolizes the stripping of Jesus by his captors (both of his clothing and his honor) as well as the abandonment by his disciples. Usually Psalm 22 is prayed while the altar is stripped.

Tenebrae (TEN-uh-bray): A Good Friday service, though originally observed earlier in Holy Week. Candles are extinguished following a series of readings and/or psalms.

This column can sometimes be titled "Rambling Thoughts of an Elder." You do know how thoughts and conversations can tumble down a path? This might be one of those journeys.

The first thing getting out of bed, I usually go through my mental checklist for the day. I needed to find a computer file instructing how the elders at Zion assist the Pastor with communion. Immediately my mind uttered the Words that I have said hundreds of times while assisting the Pastor when giving the communion wafer to the recipient, "The True Body of Jesus Christ, given for you." What power in those words! Volumes are written about those words.



The first words recorded for us were during the first day of Creation when God spoke: "Let there be light". God gave only humans the ability to speak. Animals can certainly communicate with one another, but only we can articulate our thoughts of history and thereby transfer knowledge.







