We pause in our service to honor them, rejoice in the blessings that the Lord has given them. There may be others in our congregation that graduating from kindergarten, grade school, college, or advanced degrees, the graduation ceremony is an important event in the graduate's and his/her family's life. - May 19 Last Day of Sunday School --- The kids of Zion will have their final class for the 2018-2019 Sunday School Year. Stewardship

Stewardship is not just about giving money to the church. It includes this, to be sure, but it is not limited to it. Stewardship involves our whole life – everything we have and everything we are.

Let us not, though, fall into the trap of thinking that because we give of ourselves in one area we can neglect giving in another. Stewardship is not stealing from Peter to pay Paul. It is not a game we play whereby we justify ourselves in not giving a tenth of our income because we have given in some other way. This is why our Lord warns:

"Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." (Matthew 23:23)

We are given to do both – tithe of ourselves and what we have. And so it is that St. Paul makes his appeal to us:

"I appeal to you, therefore brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:1-2)

We are to present our bodies as a living sacrifice to God. We are not to have the mind of the world, where we exchange equal weight of this for an equal weight of that, and then think that we have done what God has required.

Our whole life is given over for service in and for the Church of God. This is to be done in thanksgiving for what God in Christ has accomplished for us. This is our spiritual worship, the reasonable response to what He has done for us – not one for the other, but all in all.

But what does this look like? St. Paul never lays down a general principle without also giving us some practical application of what shape that principle is to take concretely. He gives the general principle that our bodies are to be living sacrifices to God, and, after admonishing those who have been given particular gifts of grace to serve the church, St. Paul then speaks generally of what is expected of all. He says:

"Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality." (Romans 12:9-13)

This is what it looks like to present your bodies as living sacrifices. This is how we live out the grace of God here in time.

Let us then heed the apostle's teaching. Let us present our bodies – everything that we have and everything that we are – as living sacrifices to God, our reasonable response to what God in Christ Jesus accomplished for us by His death and resurrection.

Through this we have forgiveness of sins, a new life in Christ, and eternal salvation. And through this worship, the grace of God is made manifest in His saints – for the church and the world.

Why a Women's Retreat?

Because it's hard to hear God's voice above the noise of everyday life.

When is the last time you sat before God without a To Do list hanging over you, a pile of laundry the size of Texas Stadium in the background, or family members pressing in on all sides? If you can't remember, you need to attend a retreat.

"To retreat" means to leave our normally occupied positions and go to a place of safety, quiet, and seclusion. By going to a retreat, we physically remove ourselves from life's distractions, the call of chores, and the demands of people in order to make space for God. If you think you're less spiritual because you struggle to hear from God in the cacophony of your daily life, be encouraged. Even Jesus recognized the value and need to get away. "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house, and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed" (Mark 1:35). Jesus retreated.

2. Because we need each other.

Faith is contagious. Just like a virulent virus, it passes from person to person through close contact. Today's busy world allows little time for women to share faith stories, pray together, and hear biblical messages written with women in mind.

As we consider and apply God's Word together, we learn from each other's varied backgrounds, experiences, and insights. The better we understand God, the stronger our faith becomes. Then we can strengthen others. Hearing other women's testimonies about God's faithfulness helps me realize that God will also take care of me. Hebrews 10:25 spotlights the value of mutual encouragement and warns us not to neglect corporate worship: "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another."

3. Because meeting together spurs us on to "love and good works" (Hebrews 10:24). The Greek word for "spur on" is *paroxusmus*, which means to stir someone up. It has negative connotations, such as stirring up disagreement, but in this passage, it underscores

ative connotations, such as stirring up disagreement, but in this passage, it underscores the fact that meeting together as believers helps us love and serve God and each other better.

4. Standing side by side with our sisters in Christ, and worshipping, praying, and learning about our precious Savior makes us stronger.

When I join a group of women singing praise songs to God, I experience a taste of what **Heaven's** going to be like when we're gathered around his throne. When I sit with my sisters and open God's Word, the insights I gain as we study together add weight and credence to its truth. When I pray for others, and they pray for me, I know I'm not alone, no matter how heavy my burden is. Sometimes their faith strengthens me, and other times my faith strengthens them. Together we bear each other's burdens.

For these and many other reasons, I place a high priority on women's retreats.

FLOATING ON FAITH

As a man and his young daughter were boating one day, their vessel sprang a leak. The father knew he'd have to swim to shore but couldn't with the child in tow. She hadn't gotten far in swimming lessons but could float on her back, so he told her to do so and promised to return.

Coast Guard personnel were skeptical that a child could survive so long in the water. But hours later, as the sun set and they considered halting the search, someone spied a red dress amid the waves. The girl, still floating, was singing a hymn. Astounded, rescuers asked how she held on so long. "My daddy said he'd come back for me," she said, "and he never breaks his promises."

Prayer rests on just such trust. We can't know when God will answer or act, but we know he promises never to abandon us and that God keeps his promises. So we can lie back and float — on faith.



- 5. Finally, there is the little finger, which reminds us to be "small" in relationship to God, and to put ourselves last. When we do so, we end up grateful rather than selfish, praying for our needs, not our wants.

Treat Mom with this yummy, beautiful yogurt parfait.




What you need:
