Abel was. By faith, Abel gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, Abraham prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything, yes, even His life, enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us – like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ – give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart – for the joy set before us – the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me," Matthew 25:35

This November, the elders are again hosting a food drive for our congregational families that are inneed of food, and for the Salvation Army food shelf. Some in this congregation and community sometimes struggle being able to afford food. I believe many of us can empathize with this situation at one time or another in their life. As a church body collecting food, this is a small way for us to help provide a few meals.

Unfortunately, we are not always able to recognize our members that may be struggling. If you or your family are in this position, let Pastor Matt know, and we will add you to our list of families we make a delivery to.

Many of the members we deliver food to are single, so last year Pastor Matt had suggestions of food items that make for easier meal preparations. Any non-perishable (but please check the expiration dates) food is welcome during the month, but these items are suggested:

Suggest donations:

November 4th canned soups and stews November 11th canned fruits and vegetables

November 18th cereals and oatmeal November 25th pastas and more

Other useful items given in the past were paper towels, bath tissue, dish soap, and even batteries. The elders will distribute the food the following week after Thanksgiving. Depending of the amount of donations, and the number of congregational families/ persons, determines the amount we donate to the Salvation Army. Usually we have given the Salvation Army about a third of the food total.

Why Go to Church?

A churchgoer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. "I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. . . . So, I think I'm wasting my time and the pastors are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all."

This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the editor. It went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher: "I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But, for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of those meals. But I do know this . . . they all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!"

When you are **DOWN** to nothing . . . God is **UP** to something! Faith sees the invisible, believes the incredible and receives the impossible! Thank God for our physical AND our spiritual nourishment!

HYMN OF THE MONTH

"Come, Ye Thankful People, Come," a thanksgiving text written by Dean Henry Alford, was first published in *Psalms and Hymns of 1844*. Later he placed in his hymnal *The Year of Praise of 1867* in which he extended the hymn to seven eight-line stanzas. This hymn went through many alterations that displeased Mr. Alford. In *Lutheran Service Book*, the text is slightly altered from the original text in *The Year of Praise of 1867*.

The Hymnal 1940 Companion states: "The English Harvest Festival, for which this was written, corresponds to the American Thanksgiving Day, save that it is a movable feast, varying between villages according to the season. It is a true Harvest Thanksgiving, with farmers and gardeners bringing the best specimens of their produce to decorate the church. Alford describes the American corn vividly in the second stanza, but it is more likely that he had some other grain in mind, for the English equivalent of American corn is maize."

The tune for, "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come," was written by Sir George J. Elvey. He named the tune "St. George," for he was the organist at St. George's Chapel in Windsor, England. This tune was first used with the hymn text, "Hark, the Sound of Jubilee."

The Festival of Thanksgiving seems to be a little later than usual, November 28, still it the fourth Thursday of November. For a liturgical perspective, it is an interlude as well as a transition, from our celebration of the Last Sunday of the Church (Christ the King Sunday) to the First Sunday in Advent. Wonderful for us to pilgrimage with Jesus, Christ, through His birth, life suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension into heaven, where our Lord is, even now, preparing a place for us to dwell eternally. 75th Anniversary News

In 2020, we mark our 75th Anniversary of Zion Lutheran Church! In preparation for this momentous occasion, we are putting together a new Photo Directory, organizing an anniversary committee, planning special services and gatherings, and focusing on different historical aspect of Zion!

As we come to the close of the Church Year, "Christ the King Sunday," the first item I would like to highlight is the Suspended Altar Cross. Though it is small, it is an impressive piece of artwork, designed with gorgeous details and powerful symbolism.


The Suspended Altar Cross

The cross is of wrought iron with a detailed wood carving of the Christ figure. The four arms of the cross contain representation of half open parchment scrolls. These indicate the Gospel Authors and Evangelists, namely: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The cross arms also show the fish nets reminding us of Jesus' call "I will make you fishers of me."



The cross proper is completed by the inner circle as representing the human person in Christ, and the outer circle the Divinity of Christ.

Christ the Lord and King is designated in the caring. The crown stands for the kingship of Christ in God's Kingdom. The bare feet remind



We see the most dramatic revelation of these two persons simultaneously at Bethany. The human person is recorded in two words, and the Diving person in three: "Jesus wept" and Lazarus, come forth."

A few weeks later, Jesus demonstrated the love of God in His own death and resurrection.

Even though I huddle in my bed and put off getting up, thank you, Lord, that I have strength to rise. Many are bedfast.


Even though the first hour of my day is hectic-socks are lost, toast is burned, tempers are short-thank you, Lord, for my family. Many are lonely.


