Stewardship

Our God is a God who works through means. He can and has worked immediately without agency, as the Bible testifies, but primarily, on the whole and for the most part, our God works through means. He does this not only for all of our earthly needs but also for all of our spiritual needs. And He does this for our benefit.

He provides for all our needs of this body and life through means. He gives us fathers and mothers to care for us when we are young. Through them, God provides house and home, food and clothing, education and training in the arts and work of this world.

He gives us good government to protect us from harm and danger; He gives us faithful neighbors and good friends to help in times of need and lack. He gives us employers who trade our work for income so that we may acquire the needs of the body. He gives us brains and brawn so that we will have something to trade with those employers for that needed income. This work, which we are able to do only because of what God has provided to us, redounds to the benefit of others. And so, the cycle of God giving through means continues.

He provides for all our needs of our souls. He sent His Son into the flesh to be our Savior. In that body, our Lord Jesus Christ lived the life that God demands of us all – a life we have failed to live because of our sins – and, in that body, He made payment for those sins on the cross, once and for all.

God delivers this forgiveness through the means of His Word and Sacraments. He calls pastors to proclaim, in His stead and by His command, that our sins are forgiven for Jesus' sake. Through these same pastors, God Himself claims us as His own in Holy Baptism,

placing His own name on us in water and Word, igniting faith by the gift of the Holy Spirit. And He gives us His life-giving body and blood to nourish us in this same faith until the end. Our God is a God who works through means.

This is true also of stewardship. This is what St. Paul wrote in Philippians:

"I have received full payment, and more. I am well supplied, having received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent, a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:18–19).

The gift St. Paul received from the Philippian church is a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. They gave to God. God provided for St. Paul through the Philippians. And the God who loves both Paul and the Philippians will supply their every need according to the riches in Christ Jesus. Our God is a God who works through means.

"For all the promises of God find their Yes in [Jesus Christ]," St. Paul tells us in 2 Cor. 1:20. This is true also of you. Trust in the God who provides for all that we need in body and soul through means. And not only will you find His "yes" to you, but others will find it, too, through you. "But as you excel in everything – in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you – see that you excel in this act of grace also" (2 Cor. 8:7).

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Instruments of Praise

Some innovative musicians play instruments that actually melt at their fingertips. Their ice creations — everything from drums and a pipe organ to harps and didgeridoos — make aweinspiring sounds (search online to hear for yourself).

The unique challenges posed by dissolving instruments seem to increase their impact. "ICEstruments" sculptor Tim Linhart says concertgoers, whose bodies also are largely composed of water, often feel a "spiritual connection" to the music.

Although people don't melt, our physical bodies eventually return to ashes and dust. Despite that impermanence, God created us as wonderful instruments to make joyful noises for him: "Let everything that has breath praise the LORD!" (Psalm 150:6).

Christian Symbols

The Chi Rho is an ancient monogram of Christ. The symbol is composed of the first two letters of the Greek word for Christ: XPICTOC (pronounced Christos). There are many variations, but the most common form superimposes the "X" (Chi) on the "P" (Rho). Although it isn't considered to be a cross, the Chi Rho invokes Jesus' crucifixion. The symbol has been in use for more than 1,600 years. Early Christians used the Chi Rho as a sign of their faith, and Constantine the Great placed it on his soldiers' shields.

The Hymn of the Month

The "Queen of Chorales" is the title given to hymn "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright." Composed and authored by Philippi Nicolai, it is considered to be one of the great gems in the hymnal. It is in a style of diction, poetic structure, and has a grand tune. This hymn is in an acrostic structure, that is, the initial letters of each stanza of the original German forms a phrase. The phase goes: W, E, G, U, H, Z, W which referred to Wilhelm Ernst, Graf und Herr zu Waldeck, a friend and student of Nicolai as well as referring to his birthplace. It was first published by Philippi Nicolai in the appendix to his Freuden Spiegel des ewigen Leben of 1599.

Psalm 45 is the textual basis of this hymn. The reference to the "Morning Star" is more reflective of Revelation 22:16. Nearly every word of this hymn is taken from Holy Scripture, according to one churchman. This hymn is a favorite to use at festival occasions throughout the church year, but especially at weddings.

The tune is known as Wien schon leuchetet, also known as Morenstern, Frankfurt. The tune to this queen of the chorales has been used by many great composers such as J.S. Bach, Dietrich Buxtehude, Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy and even Paul Manz, to name a few.

Catherine Winkworth says of this hymn in her book <u>Christian Singers of Germany of 1869</u>: "So popular did it soon become, that its tune was often chimed by city chimes, lines and verses from it were printed by way of ornament of the common earthenware of the country, and it was invariably used at weddings and certain festivals."

You can find this hymn in <u>Lutheran Service Book</u>; it is hymn number 395. This is one of the great hymns of the Epiphany Season. We will be singing this hymn on Sunday, January 12th as part of our Epiphany-Baptism of Our Lord Festival.

Prior to Thanksgiving Day, Christmas music is the season's sounds.

Upon recently hearing John Denver and the Muppets rendition of the "12 Days of Christmas", I couldn't help but smile, but I also recalled that over time, Christian meanings were attached to each of the verses, and I had to investigate. (Internet search engines are a wonderful thing!)

We are still in the Christmas season even though you may be reading this at the beginning of January. The 12 days of Christmas start on Christmas day, and end the day before Epiphany, January 5th, with the Epiphany of our Lord on the 6th.

Even if they don't exactly line up with our Lutheran understanding of theology, (can you spot it?), the verses do remind us about our wonderful Christian teachings.

- 1. The Partridge in the Pear Tree is Jesus Christ.
- 2. The 2 Turtle Doves are The Old and New Testaments.
- 3. The 3 French hens are Faith, Hope, and Charity, the theological virtues.
- 4. The 4 Calling Birds are the four gospels and/or the four evangelists.
- 5. The 5 Golden Rings are the first five books of the Old Testament.
- 6. The 6 Geese A-laying are the six days of creation.
- 7. The 7 Swans A-swimming are the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit, the seven sacraments.
- 8. The 8 Maids A-milking are the eight beatitudes.
- 9. The 9 Ladies Dancing are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit.
- 10. The 10 Lords A-leaping are the ten commandments.
- 11. The 11 Pipers Piping are the eleven faithful apostles.
- 12. The 12 Drummers Drumming are the twelve points of doctrine in the Apostle's Creed.

Let us always continue to celebrate that God came to us as the Christ Child almost 2000 years ago, the most precious gift ever.


What are the grown-ups doing?




