Stop, Look and Listen

Lent, the season of the church year that's associated with repentance, begins on Ash Wednesday (February 26 this year). While some people deny themselves by giving up something for Lent, others prepare for Easter through special Bible studies or devotions.

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Christians observe Lent for these reasons:

• It causes us to **STOP.** Lent says, "Stop and rest awhile," as well as "Stop doing wrong."

• It tells us to **LOOK**. Look inward for an honest self-examination. Look upward to see the cross of Christ offering healing and love. Look forward to the hope of the Resurrection.

• It tells us to **LISTEN**. Listen to the words of Christ. Listen to the voice of God. Listen to the winds of the Spirit of God.

Stop, look and listen. These three words aren't only important for our safety in travel; they're also helpful for our journey through the 40 days of Lent.

Stewardship News

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts, the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God, those that pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

The easiest example of this is fasting. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned.
You have, though, learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above in order to do it.

There is another example of this. It is almsgiving. This is an increase in giving to the church and its mission during this time. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is in leading you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and[a] we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." (1 Tim 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.

Of Rocks and Repentance

Before recently closing to tourists, Australia's majestic Uluru (formerly called Ayers Rock) was popular with climbers. Many took home illegal souvenirs, sometimes later mailing them back to park rangers after experiencing what they considered bad luck.

So many pilfered mementos were returned, often with notes of apology, that rangers called them "sorry rocks." The returns merely created more work for park staff, who urged visitors not to take specimens in the first place. "Sorry rocks" is a fitting image for our sins, which the Bible describes as weights and entanglements (see Hebrews 12:1). As sinners, we can't remove those heavy burdens on our own. But through Christ's redeeming work on our behalf, we can "return" the rocks of wrongdoing. When we repent and seek forgiveness, God promises to "remember [our] sins no more" (Hebrews 8:12)



Ladies Society



Zion's Sacred Building Art

THE PULPIT

Like the font, the pulpit also stands directly on the nave floor. The font and sides are stone slabs anchored to a formed wrought iron frame, which is terminated at the top by an iron railing with a wood capping.

The opening corner miters of the frame are to expose inside paraments in the liturgical colors of the season. These are to supplement the paraments on the pulpit desk.

The symbols of the vine and grapes are deeply carved into the stone slabs as a crowning band. The vine and grapes signify unity, and remind of Jesus' words: "I am the Vine, you are the branches."

Below this cresting, a symbol of remembrance is carved on each slab.

On the front panel a carving is deeply incised to show, as if in the distance, the form of a building set on a rock indicating Zion.

A symbol of the Tree of Life is modeled in high relief, over the base of which is the long parchment of the Epistles of St. Paul, with His symbol of the crossed hilted swords.

> On the side of the pulpit by the steps, we see the Cross and Orb, symbolizing the triumph of the Savior over the sins of the world. It clearly signifies the Gospel's conquest of the world which is symbolized in the underlying parchment.

On the side by the chancel pylon is a symbol of the Anchor Cross on a Shield. Just as an anchor is unsee, so Jesus is our unseen Anchor of Hope. "We have this hope as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul." (Hebrews 6:19)

The messianic Rose surrounds the symbols of the Anchor, and of the Cross and Orb. It is also set into the wrought iron frame.

May we all continue to be in God's word daily.



Colors: The usual color for Lent is purple, signaling repentance. Black may be used on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, scarlet on Palm/ Passion Sunday. Easter's colors are white and gold.

Ashes are a sign for humility, mortality, and repentance, which are placed on the foreheads of Christians on Ash Wednesday in the form of the cross.

• Forty Days is the length of the Lenten season. The Israelites spent 40 years wandering in the desert, just as Jesus spent 40 days in the wil-•derness after His Baptism in the Jordan River.

Palms were an ancient Jewish and Roman symbol of victory, used in triumphal processions and for decoration.

Are you a morning person or a night owl? I am a morning person—remember, I like to be early!




A Lenten History Lesson

Though the date of Easter varies, the majority of the Lenten season occurs during March. In fact, the word *Lent* comes from the Anglo-Saxon words *lenctentid* (meaning "March") and *lencten* (meaning "spring").

The first reference to Lent dates back to 325 AD, in one of the 20 canons decreed at the council of Nicaea. By the eighth century, Christians started observing Lent, and a 10thcentury monk named Aelfric connected the use of ashes and "the Lenten fast" to the pre-Easter period.

Lent lasts 40 days to represent Jesus' time in the wilderness, when he was tempted by the devil. The six Sundays that occur between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday aren't counted as part of Lent; instead, as the traditional day of worship, they're considered "mini-Easters."

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


