## He Healeth

Dear Friends in Christ:

February is a month we often associate with love. After all, it is the month of Valentine's Day. My father and two of my children were born in February, so it holds a special place for me. And it probably holds a place in many of your hearts as you celebrate the love of your spouse, or the love of your family and friends. But this happy state of being is not always the case this time of year. It can be a very trying time if you are just not feeling the love.

And who better to understand our circumstances or feelings than our Heavenly Father, who has promised His love to all of us, and has proven His love by the gift of His Son, Jesus Christ? Who better to turn to than our Heavenly Father, who among His many divine attributes can comprehend our sorrow or broken heart? As Psalm 147:3 so beautifully says, "He health the broken in heart, and bindeth up their wounds."

If ever you have had a heart broken from the death of a loved one, or the indifference or actions of someone living, you have experienced the very real physical pain associated with it. That broken heart is not all bad though. It is our offering to oneness with God through Christ. "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, thou will not despise" (Psalm 51:17). Surrender your heart, all of its wounds and its brokenness, to the Lord, and He will make it whole again.

Who better to comprehend and heal our pain than the One whose heart literally broke on the cross, or His Father who witnessed His creation put to death His only begotten Son? They will not leave you alone. Their love is all-encompassing and eternally enduring. They have promised the Comforter, the Holy Spirit to be with us. If you faithfully believe in Him and have given your life to Him, in this very moment, He can comfort and heal you. As it says in 2 Corinthians 1:3-4: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God." We also have comforters among us: those who comfort those who stand in need of comfort. And when we have been healed and strengthened, we can turn and do the same service for others, until one day, "God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes. There shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain" Revelation 21:4.

### The Holy Family

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

From Matthew 2:13-23.

“Now when they had departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, “Rise, take the child and his mother and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you, for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.” And he rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed to Egypt and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, “Out of Egypt I called my son.”

Brothers and Sisters!

Jesus was a little baby, and unable to help himself. Instead, he needed to rely on the help of others, specifically, his mother Mary and Joseph, his stepfather. It was a unique situation, but not unlike our situations.

We have families too. And we know what it means to help each other out. In a family, you learn to sacrifice for one another. You learn to put yourself and your own needs on hold, so that the other person can have their way. This happens more than we realize or take notice of, but it is one of the greatest teachers within a family. Families teach us not to be selfish. And we learn how to sacrifice our desires for the betterment of the family.

Joseph certainly had to sacrifice his time, and livelihood. They say he was a carpenter or construction worker, and no doubt this benefited his situation, because when Jesus was very young, they had to move around a lot. The reason they had to move around a lot was because they were trying to avoid King Herod, who was seeking the life of the child. King Herod wanted to kill Jesus; he didn't want any other so-called Kings around so long as Herod was king. And Herod heard that the child was in Bethlehem, and so he sent soldiers there to kill him. But an angel of the Lord warned Joseph in a dream, and Joseph rose and took the child with his mother Mary and narrowly escaped from Bethlehem.

The angel told them to flee to Egypt. And that is where they went. And I think of what that must have been like for Joseph and Mary, and Jesus, that they had to go to a foreign land in order to escape King Herod. What a sacrifice they had to make in order to keep safe the baby Jesus. How hard it was to travel in those days, and such a journey they had to make to Egypt. And then when they arrived there, Joseph and Mary had to find a place to live, and Joseph needed to find work, to keep things going. All of these were sacrifices on the part of Joseph and Mary, in order to keep Jesus safe and secure.

It reminds me of the passage from Romans 12:1 “I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service.”

We all have our duties in life, we all have things that we must do, whether it be for our job, or our family, or friends, we have obligations to meet. The same is true in our service to the Lord. It's part of life. And how do we go about these duties? With a cheerful heart, or begrudgingly? Hopefully we approach our duties with the right attitude, otherwise, they are no fun for us or for anyone.

Joseph and Mary did not complain to do what they had to do to survive. After the angel warned Joseph, he immediately got up and did as he was told. And that is a lesson for all of us when God calls us to his service. That we listen for God's voice, that we take to heart the calling he has for us in our vocations of family and work.

And see how God gave Jesus such a supporting cast. Jesus was given a family in order to protect him and give him a home in which he could grow up in a safe and secure environment. Mary and Joseph provided the Son of God a house and home. That by itself is profound and worthy of our contemplation today.

And there is the importance of family time versus work. The other day I had a chance to do some work, or I could spend some quality time with my family. I chose to spend quality time with my family. Sometimes we need to do that. We can't always be working, “All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy.” We need also to make time for our family.

Jesus was blessed to have two parents who loved him and provide as best they could for him. But ultimately, it was the Lord who provided for them all, and kept them safe from King Herod.

Nevertheless, we must marvel at God's provision for us through the family. What our mothers and fathers did for us, just think of all they did for us, to raise us and make us who we are today. It is a holy work to have a family, and to be a parent and raise your children in the fear and admonition of the Lord. We have a great example in the holy family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Consider how they loved one another and cared for one another, and how they fulfilled God's commands as they did so.

Jesus was born into very humble circumstances, with Bethlehem and the manger and all. However, God provided him with a great supporting cast: the shepherds, the wise men, the angels, Mary and Joseph. All of these played a role in welcoming Jesus into the world. And they all played a role in the work of our salvation.

For Jesus would be born King of the Jews, it is true, yet he is also the King of Kings, and Lord of Lords. He is not only the son of Mary; He is the Son of God. He is not only the child of Bethlehem; He is the Child of Heaven. He will not only redeem His people Israel, but he will be the Savior of the world.

What a great witness to us all, of how important our families are! We have the holy family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, and what a witness to the truth they are. It teaches us to revere and consider our own family holy.

For each one of us is precious to God, each one is special to him, and each one of us not only has the potential for greatness but is blessed by the heavenly Father even now. May we see in our own homes the blessing of Almighty God, and may we see in the holy family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph our own redemption story. May God grant this to us all. Amen.

**New Business:**



Even as Moses (a kind of redeemer) foreshadowed the work of Christ (our ultimate Redeemer), we remember with awe and humility the pains God took to win us back to Himself, sparing not His only Son.

## February Stewardship Article

Of the three things a person is not to talk about in polite company – religion, politics, and money – the church is called, in one way or another, to talk about all three. Perhaps this is the reason why teaching about stewardship often seems to be an afterthought. It's something that happens only out of necessity when financial constraints are already nipping at the heels.

There is a more excellent way. Stewardship shouldn't be the kind of teaching that comes up only when there is a financial crunch. It should be part and parcel of the ongoing instruction of Christians as they live out their faith in their vocations – members of their family, their society, and their church. This teaching touches upon every facet of our lives; it stakes a claim upon our time, our presence, our prayers, and our possessions.

Stewardship begins with the acknowledgment that we are stewards. A steward is a manager of someone else's possessions. In Christian stewardship, we recognize, according to the Apostles' Creed, that God is the owner of all things as the Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier. And in His fatherly divine goodness and mercy, He gives us what is His to manage here below.

The principal virtue for stewards is faithfulness. As St. Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth:

“Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful.” (1 Cor. 4:2)

Stewards must manage that which belongs to the owner according to the owner's wishes. That is what it means to be faithful in stewardship.

That raises a question: How are Christian stewards to be faithful in their managing of what God has entrusted to them to manage? In other words, what are the specific duties of a Christian steward?

This depends upon what God has revealed in His Word for each of our vocations in life as those in a family (fathers, mothers, husbands, wives, children), society (governors or citizens), and the church (pastors or laity). The Table of Duties from *Luther's Small Catechism* lays this out in helpful and orderly way.

Let's look just at what the laity (hearers as it is labeled in the catechism) owe their pastors:

“In the same way, the Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel.” (1 Cor. 9:14)

“Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches. Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows.” (Gal. 6:6–7)

“Let the elders who rule well be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, ‘You shall not muzzle an ox when it treads out the grain,’ and, ‘The laborer deserves his wages.’” (1 Tim. 5:17–18)

“We ask you, brothers, to respect those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and to esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves.” (1 Thess. 5:12–13)

“Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you.” (Heb. 13:17)

We can see that the Lord commands hearers to support the work of the ministry with the gifts God endowed them – their time, their presence, their prayers, and their possessions. This is the means by which God blesses His people with His gifts: the ministry with the support of those whom they serve, and the hearers with the work of the ministry.

St. Paul expounds upon this further in his letters to the church at Corinth. He instructs them to give regularly (1 Cor. 16:1–2), proportionally (1 Cor. 16:1–2; 2 Cor. 8:12), and generously (2 Cor. 8:20) of our first-fruits (1 Cor. 16:2) with a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor. 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor. 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor. 9:7), and love (2 Cor. 8:23).

All of this teaching is set forth squarely within the context of stations to which God calls us. This is always appropriate for the church to speak because it instructs God's people in how they are to live out their faith as His stewards under those who are created, redeemed, and sanctified by Him.
