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## A Child's Steps

My wife recently told me a story about her father. One day her family were to go on a tour of a bog where there were places of danger: thick deep mud and quicksand. Her father gave her a few simple rules to obey, since she was only four years old: she was to follow the path that her father walked, she was to hold on to the guide ropes, and above all she was to stay close to him. He strongly expressed to her his love and how if she listened to him, she would be safe and well, and would have fun with the hike. He told her of the dangers of the mud and quicksand and assured her that he would stay near her as she stayed near to him.

Ordinarily, a four year old child might run off the paths or explore some mud or might be distracted by a bird or squirrel and run after it, but having been thoroughly prepared by her father's words she avoided the dangers that could have beset her that day. This is a story about a father, and a daughter who obeyed her father, and that is the point. There is not tale of a child falling into quicksand, a last-minute rescue, or anything of the sort, but there could have been.

One of the most troubling aspects of quicksand is that it can appear quite solid until one steps on it. Only an experienced guide, on a pre-marked path, could navigate the area they would be walking through. There is a spiritual lesson that can be learned from my wife's experience as a young girl. Often, I am asked by people to pray for their loved ones, their children especially. There is a special love shared by a father or mother to their child. One of the best ways we can show our love for our children is demonstrated by the story I relayed. As the child is assured of their parent's love, they are more likely to listen to the voice of their parent, hearken to their words, and follow in the steps of their parent. Nothing is as clear as Jesus's relationship with his Father, and his demonstration of the way we are to walk in his Kingdom.

The first rule Lindy's father gave her was: She was to walk the path. The path could be another way of saying "the way." In the early church, "the way" referred to the teachings of Jesus as he opened the scriptures to his disciples. In John 14:6 Jesus said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you had known me, you would have known my

Father also.” Jesus asked his disciples to follow him; and if we follow him, we will be on “the way” to eternal life.

She was to hold onto the guide ropes. The guide ropes are the things that keep us on “the way,” that we can hold on to. Things like the Bible, hymns, and most importantly, the Holy Spirit. John 16:13 says, “When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth.” This Helper is most important because, sin like the quicksand in the bog, can be deceptive, and you can be lured into it if not holding fast to the Word. As Jesus says, “If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, for he dwells with you and will be in you” (John 14:15-17). When the deceptions of the world and of Satan come to tempt us off the narrow way, the Helper is within us and can guide us to truth, to the recognition of our Lord and Savior and his loving sacrifice for us.

She was to stay close to him, last of all, and most importantly, we are to stay close to God. How do we stay close to the Father? We do His will, just as Jesus did. He has given us commandments, He has given us His Son, in order that we may be like Him, and that we know His mind and will. We listen to Him and obey Him because of His love for us, as Jesus told us in John 16:27 “For the Father himself loves you.”





## ZION LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES-July 8, 2020

The July meeting of the Zion Lutheran Church Council was held in the fellowship hall July 8, 2020. Council members attending in addition to Pastor Hinckley were Rocky Knippling, Jim Ristau, Darrel DuVall, Rick Hargens, Kurt Kelsey, Todd Van Den Bosch, Mark Klein, Joe Mason, Mike Reimer and Marsha Houska. The meeting was called to order by Rocky Knippling at 8:03PM. Pastor Hinckley opened the meeting with prayer.

The council minutes from the June 10, 2020 meeting were provided by Secretary Marsha Houska and read individually. Kurt Kelsey made a motion to approve the June minutes as provided. The motion was seconded by Joe Mason. The minutes were approved.

The treasurer's report was provided by Todd Van Den Bosch. Todd had not yet received the bank statement in the mail. The approximate beginning balance is \$25,000 with an ending balance of approximately \$20,000 in the general fund. 

#### **LWML Devotion God Raises Me Up**

Read Psalm 40:1-5.

David wrote this Psalm as a response to a time when he felt God had pulled him out of a horrible pit. We don't know exactly what David had experienced that was so bad, but we see how much he felt the hand of God in his life. David responded with a new song of praise to God that God himself had placed in David. He also believed that others would see his delivery and cause them to praise God.

We lived in Ibadan, Nigeria for six years. During those years we rarely saw a clear sky. The high humidity kept a haze between the sun and us. One day as we were driving to the north to visit Bible translators, I suddenly became aware that my mood had changed to one of great joy. What had happened to me? As I thought about it, I realized that we had left the haziness of the coastal area and the sun was shining ever so brightly.

That is what it is like when God raises me up from the down times. There is a sudden burst of joy as I am released from a burden, when I finally can accept the fact that there is no strength in me to deliver myself. Taking the burden to my Lord Jesus Christ and leaving it there, remembering that He has already taken that burden to the cross, leaves me free to worship and praise Him. Why does it take me so long to let God raise me up when there is such freedom to enjoy? Why do I muddle in "the horrible pit" filled with mud and clay when I can sing a new song of praise and worship in the freedom Christ has gained for me?

*Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice.* Philippians 4:4 reminds us that the real joy is in the Lord. Paul goes on to say in verses 6 and 7, *do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.* He goes on to remind us in verse 8, *Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.* It is God Himself who raises us up as we look to Him for help not only in the down times, but always.

My mother used to go about her work in the house singing hymns. I believe it made her work lighter and more joyful. She gave a sense of dependence on God for her strength and peace. It was evident to us as she lived through the time of my father's heart attack without once breaking down in our presence, that God Himself gave her that inner strength. She faced the task of running our farm with the help of my 15-year-old brother, who took up the tasks without complaining. Her strong husband was now incapacitated and could only give directions from his recovery bed for the months it took to heal in a time when heart surgery was not yet an option. I can still hear her singing, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

What a friend we have in Jesus,  
all our sins and griefs to bear!  
What a privilege to carry  
everything to God in prayer!  
O what peace we often forfeit,  
O what needless pain we bear,  
all because we do not carry  
everything to God in prayer.


Have we trials and temptations?

## How to Memorize Scripture (and Why It's Important)

If you grew up going to Sunday School or confirmation classes, I can almost guarantee that you had to memorize Bible verses. It likely went something like this: You remember you have a Bible verse due today. You quickly memorize it by repeating it to yourself a bunch of times, stumble through presenting it to your teacher, and then immediately forget it.

Many of us don't have any Bible verses memorized besides John 3:16. This is a problem.

Memorizing Scripture has a lot of benefits for every Christian, but we usually don't think of it as a spiritual discipline along the same lines as Scripture reading, prayer, and fasting.

We hear stories of people in nursing homes who are unable to remember their children's names but can still recite hymn stanzas and Bible verses. Or we hear about Christians in captivity who repeat verses of comfort and peace in the midst of their persecution. If we were in a situation like that, what would we have to hold onto? A One Direction lyric? A baseball statistic from 1967?

Let's look into some of the reasons why we should memorize Scripture, and some practical tips for incorporating it into your daily life!

### Why Should We Memorize Scripture?

#### To Remind Us

*Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.*

Deuteronomy 6:4–9

When we memorize a Bible verse, it reminds of the truth of God's Word every time we think of it. Depending on the verse, it could also remind us of God's prov-

idence, sovereignty, love, peace, power, or forgiveness.

These verses from Deuteronomy really cement how God's Word should be in front of us in everything we do—sitting, walking, lying down, and rising up. When you start memorizing Scripture and hear or see certain words, you'll be reminded of these Scriptures wherever you go.

#### To Strengthen Us

*Only be strong and very courageous, being careful to do according to all the law that Moses My servant commanded you. Do not turn from it to the right hand or to the left, that you may have good success wherever you go. This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it. For then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have good success. Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.*

Joshua 1:7–9

One of the greatest motivations for memorizing Scripture is to have the comfort of God's Word with you wherever you go! If you don't have access to a Bible, you can tap into the Scriptures you've memorized to provide godly comfort whenever you need it.

Whether you're taking a final exam, getting ready for a big meeting with your boss, or at your wit's end with parenting—no matter the situation, you can find comfort in God's Word through the Scriptures you hold in your heart.

#### To Prevent Us from Sinning

*I have stored up Your word in my heart,  
that I might not sin against You.*

Psalms 119:11

If you read all of Psalm 119, you'll see a common theme—love for God's Word. These verses show us all sorts of reasons for memorizing Scripture and holding it near our hearts, but verse 11 is the one that always sticks with me.

Memorizing Scripture can prevent us from sinning. Of course, on this side of heaven, we will sin often, but having God's Word inscribed on our hearts can encourage us in our battle against sin and the devil.

## How Can I Memorize Scripture?

### Use an App

There are a variety of apps available to aid you in memorizing Scripture. I personally use a free app called “Bible Memory,” which allows you to import verses and has three levels to help you gradually memorize them. As you memorize a verse, the app automatically schedules the next time you need to practice based on how many times you have repeated the verse correctly. The more times you repeat it correctly, the longer you can go without practicing it.

One nice thing about this particular app is that you only have to type the first letter of every word in the verse, not the whole word, making it quicker and easier to memorize!

### Notecards

I used to use the notecard method, where you write out each memory verse on one side and its reference (book, chapter, and verse) on the other side. If you prefer handwritten methods, this is definitely the way to go! Notecards are portable, but not quite as portable as an app.

### With a Friend

Memorizing Scripture with a friend is a great way to encourage each other! Whether you memorize a verse each week with your small group Bible study or a longer passage every month with a long-distance friend over FaceTime, involving other people can help keep you accountable as you consistently memorize verses.

To start your Bible memorization journey consider getting The Lutheran Study Bible: Journal Edition to take notes in the margins and highlight important verses.

## Memory Verse Challenge

The church confesses to Christ, “You have the words of eternal life” (John 6:68). The church is encouraged to “Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly ...” (Col. 3:16).

Psalm 1 teaches us to meditate on God's Word day and night. It is our great opportunity and joy to read and study God's Word. One beneficial practice is to memorize the Scriptures and, in so doing, to meditate on it. The LCMS invites everyone to join together memorizing a verse together each week.

Memory verses from previous weeks:

July 6 — Romans 6:3–4

*“Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.”*

*“So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ.”*

July 20 — John 16:33

*‘I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world.’*

July 27 — 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

*“Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.”*

Winston Churchill reportedly said, “we make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give.” According to Churchill then, our lives are defined less by what we have gotten and more by what we give away.

Our Lord’s life is defined in this way. He gave completely of Himself for us. He became man for us. He taught the truth of God’s Word. He healed those with many and various diseases. Because when we give, we join in the bond of friendship and family, the bond of service to those around us out of love for them. And love is the fulfillment of the Law. It is the nature of God Himself, for God is Love. Thus, we are participating in the divine nature. As Jesus said, “It is more blessed to give than to receive” (Acts 20:35).


