

Dear Christian friends:

“I will stand upon my watch, and set me upon the tower, and will watch to see what he will say unto me, and what I shall answer when I am reproved.”  
Habakkuk 2:3

When I was a teenager, I had a camping experience where I was blindfolded and asked to traverse an obstacle course. My instructions were to listen to my leader’s calm voice to reach the opposite side of the course. The only

difficulty was that others shouted at me from other directions telling me false information, at the same time, trying to mislead me into running into obstacles and not reaching my goal. This exercise was to teach me that listening to the Lord, as spoken by the Lord in His Word, the Bible, and preached by his servants, would be difficult if I listened to competing voices more. The other misleading people’s only goal was to keep me from listening to the voice of my leader, who represented the Lord. This is a small illustration to demonstrate the difficulty of tuning out opposing voices to listen to our Savior, Jesus Christ. If you have watched anything on the national news the last four years, and specifically this last election season, and its aftermath, you have heard for yourself the difficulty of discerning the truth from lies.

Even our Lord Jesus had experience with this when he went into the wilderness to commune with his Father and was beset by the devil. This shows us that no one is immune or above the difficulty of hearing and hearkening to the voice of the Lord as found in the Scriptures and as preached during Sunday service and Bible studies. During the temptation He Himself faced, Jesus gives us a hint in how to overcome Satan and his opposing voice, “Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God” (Matthew 4:4).

There are several things we can apply to ourselves from the Scripture of Jesus thwarting the temptations of the devil. One of the most significant lessons is that the more we know the voice of the Lord, the easier it is to recognize it, and in turn, recognize evil. Jesus was very well versed in the writings of the prophets of the Old Testament, so much that he could quote the verses at will. How many times does he say, “It is written?” so we can infer that reading, contemplating the meaning of, and memorizing the Scriptures is invaluable to us in learning the voice of the Lord.

Another lesson from this Gospel is that the Father wants what is best for us. He tells us the true course to happiness, everything else is a lie. Once we understand that truth, we can put all other voices and distractions to the test. Will this affect my eternity? Will this lead me toward the Lord or away?



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It is not only important to be able to discern the voice of the Lord; we must also follow what He tells us to do. It is said that we should not just hear the Word, we should also follow the Word, and when we hearken, or listen and obey the Lord we receive several blessings. The first one is detailed in Matthew 8:24: "Therefore whosoever heareth these sayings of mine and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock: And the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and beat upon that house; and it fell not: for it was founded upon a rock."

When we listen and respond to the word of the Lord, we are promised that God will give us good gifts. He tells us again in Matthew 7:7-11: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For everyone that asks receives; and he that seeks finds; and to him that knocks it shall be opened. Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will he give him a stone? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask him?"

We receive good things from the Lord, whereas the evil one only wants our destruction. Every weekend we speak the Lord's prayer, so the Lord's promise to deliver us from evil should be instilled in our heart, as not only what we want, but what He wants for us.

If you were to number the times the Bible says, "Thus saith the Lord" you would realize that the Lord spoke, and is still speaking, and all we need to do is listen, to humble ourselves and

obey. Sometimes what the Lord wants us to hear may go against our cultural proclivities, our political beliefs, our natural tendencies or our "Old Adam," maybe even our common sense. The world preaches to us the need to hate, to divide ourselves from each other, or any other unholy way. The Lord teaches us a better way, if only we have ears to hear.

This Lent we will be looking at the Gospel from the perspective of trees in the Bible, beginning with the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the Garden of Eden. Instead of listening to the Lord and His command about the tree, Adam and Eve chose to listen to the serpent and his lies, and so they ate of the forbidden fruit and were subject to sin and death. But the Lord would send a Messiah who would come and crush the head of the serpent, and Jesus did that when he died on the cross and rose again on the third day. Because our Lord did this for us, because of His great love for us, we listen to His voice. Amen.

## THE INVISIBILITY OF LONELINESS

Senator Ben Sasse, at the 2019 Q Ideas conference in Nashville, talked about what he calls a national epidemic of loneliness due to a disconnect from community of place, from community of work place, from friendship.

He describes a connection disconnect, if you will, because of the transient nature of life in America and the digital world, now exacerbated by COVID-19. In a digital world, we don't have to be where we are. We can skim the surface. We can be free from people and things, we can move on, we have permission to disengage.

The epidemic of loneliness and isolation is resulting in increased mental health issues, suicide, feelings of desperation, lack of control or choice, and feeling invisible in our loneliness.

The Church can become a place of belonging for everyone. As much as a person feels invisible in their loneliness, the church has a place for them. Your Church can be a place where each person finds they are indispensable to the body of Christ.

It's all about belonging. Dr. Erik Carter of Vanderbilt University researched this idea of belonging, and he found ten dimensions that people described: **Present. Invited. Welcomed. Known. Accepted. Supported. Cared for. Befriended. Needed. Loved.**

May I suggest ways that three of these dimensions can communicate belonging to those who are lonely.

**Welcomed:** It's not enough that the signs or the mugs or the bulletins say "All are welcome." Each person is approached with a "we are so glad you are here" attitude. Introduce them to others. Invite them to share about themselves. Connect them to someone.

**Accepted:** We are all God's children. Each is a part of the Body of Christ. Our differences are created by the Creator. We have unconditional posi-

tive regard for each person. We've been waiting for YOU. You are just what we need!

**Needed:** Recognize each person's worth. Identify their gifts early on. Ask them to take on a role. Let them know they are missed when absent. Authentically communicate that we are incomplete without you. We have gaps and holes in our community that only you can fill.

**Belonging:** No special programs are needed, you already know how to do these things. No training required. Maybe some guidance on intentionality. These are universal needs. It's about genuine, authentic relationships.

So, what stops us? To be authentic is to be vulnerable with others—and that may make us fearful. It might be messy, and that makes us uncomfortable. It takes time. Our reminder as we seek to become a place of belonging is 1 Corinthians 12:18: **"But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose."**

“I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich” (2 Corinthians 8:8-9).

Without commands or even arm-twisting, St. Paul encourages, even challenges, the Church in Corinth to demonstrate the sincerity of their faith by their generosity in giving. He does this because giving generously is a gift of the Spirit given to us through the Gospel.

St. Paul wrote: “But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving” (2 Corinthians 8:7). In other words, just as we grow in faith and speech and knowledge of eternal things by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, so also do we grow in giving from the same Spirit through the same Word.

The problem is that the grace of generosity often grows cold in us. It’s not so much that we stop giving, but we don’t put it first. We treat it like all the other bills that must be paid. It becomes a chore, just one more thing to check off a list of things to do. That empties it of its spiritual power and robs us of the joy that Christ and the Scriptures assign to it.

On top of that, since this generosity is linked to faith and knowledge of divine things, a lack of excelling in giving is sure sign that our faith and knowledge of God are under attack as well.

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that we who are poor might become rich. Thus, the incarnation, suffering, and death of our Lord on the cross is the reason, source, and driving force for our generosity in giving to the church.

And since Christ who was rich became poor so that we might be rich in His grace—of which generous giving is part—so we also who are rich in His grace can excel in pressing His grace into service toward the gracious work of the church.

Pay attention to what you give to the church so that you may excel at it. And if you find that your heart has grown cold or indifferent toward it, immerse yourself in God’s Word. Read it at home. Attend Bible Class. Hear and listen to it preached in the Divine Service. Be reminded of what Christ has done for you in His incarnation, suffering, and death. For this will strengthen your faith and knowledge. And where that excels, so will the grace of giving excel also.


