

Passing on the Torch

Hebrews 12:1-3



When I was a Pastor near Calgary, Alberta, Canada at the time of the Winter Olympics in 1988, the Olympic Torch, having been first lit in Olympia Greece, was passed from runner to runner all the way across Canada and ultimately carried to Calgary where the final relay runner ignited the main torch at the opening ceremony. This is the tradition which marks the opening of each successive *modern* Olympic Games, which were recovered at Athens in April, 1896.

It has been my honor and responsibility to be your Pastor (congregational shepherd) these past eleven years plus one month. In the words of the Apostle Paul, "*I have [now] finished the race [and] I have kept the faith [here at Zion]*" (2 Timothy 4:7). In an effort to organize material for Sunday School and to improve the appearance of the lower level of our church, we have formed a Beautification Task Force to attain the goal set in our prior statement. We now have six members that are willing to help with this task. This has been taken through the Trustees for approval. This is being done not only for the Sunday School Office, but also for all the rooms. We have started in the room closest to the elevator and provided new curtains and taken tables not used to the parish hall. All supplies have been returned to the Sunday School Office. Old electronic equipment has been



recycled. Floors have been vacuumed and sills dusted. Old baby toys that were broken and hazardous have been removed from the Nursery room. We went so far as to wash the piano keys in the room closest to the elevator. A small Sunday school room has been set up and toys for it have been washed. We also plan to

remove any over-stuffed furniture because they are collectors of lice, mice and germs. (Health Department) These overstuffed items that will be removed are also a huge fire hazard. (Fire Marshal Directive) The newer set of four un-upholstered connected chairs from the Bauer Funeral Home will be kept. The Directive for Policy that we received was not just from the District but also was sent to all churches and schools in the Missouri Synod. It was sent out two years ago. 

Everything we have and everything we are is a gift of God's providential care. We understand that we're not islands unto ourselves. We could not exist without those who have gone before us and those who walk alongside us. God has given us forefathers in family, country, and faith. We are recipients of what God worked through them. We know God provides for our well-being through these means.

He gives us farmers and ranchers so we can eat. But more than that, God created and gave us all the things those farmers and ranchers cultivate. He gave us the corn, the beans, the wheat, the cows for milking, the steers for grilling. He gave each of those things for our nourishment and sustenance. Without God creating and instilling in those things their taste, their nutritional value, etc., we would not exist.

God gives us doctors, surgeons, nurses, and hospitals. He gives us medicine and medical instruments, and, of course, He gave us everything to make those medicines and medical instruments. He instilled in those things the properties to be utilized for those purposes. Without God creating and instilling healing properties into those things – and without God creating the ability within man to learn this and implement it to serve our medical needs – we would not enjoy the health we do now.

But there's more. He gives us gainful employment through our employers and provides for the necessities of life through the labor of our hands:

“Then Moses said to the people of Israel, ‘See, the Lord has called by name Bezalel the son of Uri, son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah; and he has filled him with the Spirit of God, with skill, with intelligence, with knowledge, and with all craftsmanship, to devise artistic designs, to work in gold and silver and bronze, in cutting stones for setting, and in carving wood, for work in every skilled craft. And he has inspired him to teach, both him and Oholiab the son of Ahisamach of the tribe of Dan.’ ”
(Exodus 35:30–34)

And one step back from that, He has created and given us hands, and attached to hands are arms with strength. He created us with minds to make those arms and hands move and accomplish the work set

before us. And with that mind, He has given us reason and senses.

That mind, because of the reason God has instilled in it, is able to work through difficult problems before we press those arms and hands into labor. It allows us to grapple with concepts and run through scenarios instead of having to experience every situation personally. It allows us to learn from the mistakes, as well as from the accomplishments, of ourselves and others. This can be done for our entire body, all our skills and talents, everything that makes us ... us.

So, everything we have and everything we are is a gift from Him. This is what we confess in the First Article of the Creed when we say that we “believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.”

But that is just the First Article of the Creed. We confess two more articles that deal with God's provision for our spiritual well-being. He sent his Son to die and be raised on the third day for our justification. He delivers that justification through the means of grace (baptism, preaching and the Word of God, and the Lord's Supper). And to give you those means of grace, He gives pastors and teachers, etc. Literally everything we have and everything we are in this life – and the next – is an inexpressible gift from God.

And it is for this, all of this, that we give thanks. And that is what stewardship is all about — giving thanks for God's provision for us. To give thanks is more than having an attitude of gratitude, more than just a feeling in our hearts.

It is an action. It begins in the heart, but it doesn't stay there. It works its way out through the mouth in praise for God's gifts and in love and charity through the hands to our neighbors in family, country, and church.

“For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey him” (*The Small Catechism*, 16).

So give thanks to God for His inexpressible gifts — for everything we have and everything we are. Do this not only in word but also in deed.

**RECONNECT to the Body of Christ
Circuit 28 — Texas District
\$50,000**



Did you know that the United States is the third largest mission field in the world? Hard to believe but unfortunately all too true. But, think of the opportunity to share the Gospel right here in our own backyard! There is no place more in need of missionaries than in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas on the Mexican border. This area of Brownsville is the lowest socio-economic area in the US as of 2015 with 35% of all households living in poverty, and the majority of these people is Hispanic and unchurched. A large part of the problem is that we, like most Americans, do not know our neighbors. We need to reconnect!

The harvest is plentiful, the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, send the workers into His harvest field ... (Luke 10:2).

The goal is to bring the Good News of Jesus through these new relationships with students, congregations, and the community using the missional training programs provided through this grant. The beauty of this idea is in sharing resources — trained church workers for the circuit — and using existing ones in new ways such as ESL classes and literacy programs in local congregations. These ideas bring people together and establish new relationships, sharing the love of Jesus with them. The grant will provide for startup costs, training materials, scholarships, transportation costs, and other expenses to train new leaders to go and make disciples. Praise God!

Heavenly Father, we lift up this new ministry in Texas seeking to reconnect the churches with their communities, the people with their neighbors, and all with the love of Jesus. There are so many poor people in this area that need Your mercy and grace. Help the leaders and churches of this community to reach out to the lost with the love of Christ. 
