

Pastor's Page

"Love in Lent"



Have you ever had something painful or difficult that needed to be done? For some, even getting out of bed in the morning might come to mind! We all struggle with pain and difficulties. In a live-for-pleasure world, the difficult and painful thing is usually something we try to avoid. Some people cope with pain by attaching meaning to it: "meaningful suffering". Two examples of this would be investing money for later use or a return, or adding in serious exercise in order to improve your health. This view of pain as the cost for later benefits can still be merely a worldly idea. The saying, "No pain, no gain!" has been used to help motivate people to get difficult or painful things done holding out the hope of gain.

If we think of pain from a theological perspective we get a sanctified view of pain. In the season of Lent, we are to look at the pains of Christ on the cross and we are to set our minds on God. Consider these words from Romans 8:5–7:

For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. For to set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot.

Submitting to God's law, though at times painful to the flesh, is life. On the other hand, letting the flesh do whatever it wants, though it may seem pleasurable, is death. The Scriptures say that such slavery to the flesh or sin is death. Jesus said that whoever commits sin is a slave to sin. James says, "Desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death."

What can be done? Christ Jesus, who did not consider the pleasures of heaven as something He must hold on to, humbled Himself and became obedient even unto death on the cross. Jesus saw the cross as an opportunity to prove God's love for the world. It was both painful and difficult, but Christ had the faith and love of God that moved Him to do what none other could. He broke the bonds of sin and death with this, and opened to us the forgiveness of sins.

He taught us the beauty of love, of love that is willing to do the painful or difficult, a love that flows from the One Who has first loved us.

So what do we do when we are faced with something that needs to be done which might be painful or difficult? We might try to pretend it does not really need to be done. We might hope for someone else to do it for us. Or perhaps we can take heart and believe that God is working things for our good; we can remember His cross, trust He is able to sympathize with us, and look forward to the day when our pains will end. We can go forward in love, believing that the mind, set on the Spirit, is life and peace.

Dear children of God, this Lent may you look to the cross and see love.

"My son, be attentive to my words; incline your ear to my sayings. Let them not escape from your sight; keep them within your heart" (Proverbs 4:20-21).

The Sunday Morning Bible Class is currently working through a study on Witnessing to Dechurched Adult Children. This curriculum encourages those of us in the Church to form genuine relationships with the dechurched by listening to them and asking them questions so that we can better understand where they are coming from and connect them back to Christ.

Listening is an important part of the Christian life, but it does not involve just listening to those around us. As much as we want to form genuine relationships with our family members and friends by listening and learning more about them, we also want to learn more about God and who He is. We do not witness to people simply because we want a better relationship with them, rather we witness to others so that they can know the love of Christ that we know—and how better to know that love ourselves than to learn more about the One who loves us? What a blessing that He has given us an entire book that tells us about Him!

"All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17).



The world tends to push us farther away from God. When we go out into the world to share Christ with it, we need to make sure that we are staying rooted in Christ. When we start talking to those who are dechurched, it can be easy to get confused, and start questioning what is true, but when we turn back to God's Word, we can be confident in His promises of who He is and trust Him to lead our conversation.

"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105).



Thus, if we want to reach out to those outside of the Church, we also need to be continually turning back to God and listening—listening to who He says He is, listening to what He promises He has done, and listening to what He promises He will do. We can listen in Church, in Bible Studies, and in our own reading of God's Word. What a blessing that He has given us, and what a blessing we can share!

Thoughts from an Elder

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

During Sunday's Bible study, we are studying "Witnessing to Dechurched Adult Children." This is important to many of us as we have unchurched adult children. I am interested in this class because we have four children raised with regular church and Sunday school attendance. All were confirmed, but after leaving home, they all left the church. None are outwardly hostile to the Gospel, but are not interested in anything related to the church. What I need from this class is how to open a discussion with each of them.

When I passed my 80th birthday, there was a change in my thinking and a sense of urgency about the things I wanted to accomplish before God called me home. Before that, I didn't feel like I was getting older; there was always time to talk to my children, but now I realize the Lord may call me home in only 5 or 10 years, or it could be tomorrow. I pray that God would guide me to water the seed planted when they were young and that the Holy Spirit would grow their faith through them to my grandchildren and great-grandchildren. A conversation you might have with your dechurched adult children could include telling them about your faith in Jesus Christ and how He has prepared a place for you in heaven. I can hear you saying, "They already know that." But they may not; at any rate, it might help them through the five stages of grief - denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance - which are a part of the framework that makes up our learning to live with the one we lost. My dad lived his faith every day in a way that I knew without saying he would be waiting in heaven for me. On the other hand, my mother was very private, and I didn't know for sure what she believed. When I had an appraisal on the Sammamish Plateau, I would stop by her house, I would grab a handful of chocolate chip cookies, and she would make a pot of coffee, and we would talk. On one occasion, she told me about her love of Jesus and all that He had done for her. When I left there, I was praising God for the message He had given me. A few weeks later, we received a phone call telling us she had passed away. I had read about the stages of grief years ago and expected I would have to go through them, but instead, all I felt was peace.



March 2024 ~ LCMS Stewardship Ministry "Cherish What God Has Given"

In the Small Catechism, Luther follows a pattern when explaining the Ten Commandments. With each commandment, there is something prohibited, and something commanded. There is something wrong which must be avoided, and there is something right which must be done.

The one time this pattern is not followed is with the Sixth Commandment.

"You shall not commit adultery. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other" (SC I).

Here, the catechism focuses solely on the positive: we should live in a chaste and decent manner in both word and deed, and husbands and wives should cherish and honor one another.

Keeping this commandment, and all of the commandments, is a lot easier if you see your chastity and your spouse as a gift from God that is to be protected and cherished. In the same way, you will find keeping the Fourth Commandment easier if you see your parents and other authorities as a gift from God, given to you for your blessing.



This is the key stewardship insight that runs through all of the Christian life: Everything that we have has been given to us by God. We deserve none of it. All of it comes to us by God's fatherly kindness and open-handed generosity. If I know that everything I have — every possession, every relationship, every ability — is a gift from God, then my perspective changes. All of these things are both gifts to be cherished, and things that I should direct towards

God's purposes. My possessions should be shared generously according to how God has called me in my family, church and community. My spouse should be cherished, loved and encouraged in faith. My children are on loan from my own Heavenly Father, and I have but a brief time to show them the path of righteousness. My neighbor is a gift from God so that I can imitate His kindness toward me.

No matter the gift, everything has been given to me by God so that I may participate in His own goodness and open-handed generosity.

Lutheran Women's Missionary League Grant #8 — Expanding Gospel Proclamation Worldwide

Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, MO - \$100,000

The LCMS receives frequent requests from other Lutheran church bodies around the world to share theological knowledge and doctrinally sound practices. Supporting and expanding theological education is one of LCMS's key mission priorities to ensure there will be well-educated pastors to lead these congregations.

Very few of these church bodies have the resources to send students to the United States for advanced studies and there is a need for seminary professors who have advanced theological degrees to instruct and mentor pastoral students in their home countries.

God has equipped our seminary professors to fill this gap. International students will come to Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, to complete advanced degrees, and they will return to their country to train pastors who will then shepherd their local churches. This grant will provide aid to international students completing their advanced degrees.

From 2011-17, he served as pastor for Kita-Suzurandai Lutheran Church (Kita-Suzurandai, Japan). After he earns his Ph.D., he will become a professor at Kobe Lutheran Theological Seminary.



Alan Furst is a Ph.D. student from Ipiranga do Norte, Brazil. A member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Brazil (IELB), he earned a bachelor's degree in theology in 2013 from the

Lutheran University of Brazil and, in 2016, earned a master's degree in theology from the IELB's seminary in São Leopoldo. After he earns his Ph.D., he expects to be called to serve a congregation. It is IELB policy that one must serve a parish for a minimum of five years before becoming a seminary professor.



Rev. Daniel Kofi Akoh is a Master of Arts (M.A.) student from Accra, Ghana. In 2001, he earned a four-year diploma from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ghana's (ELCG) Lutheran Seminary. He has

served his church as head pastor for Ghana's Volta region and as national youth director. He says a main reason the ELCG urged him to apply to study at Concordia Seminary is that the church needs professors with advanced degrees to enable it to upgrade its seminary.




