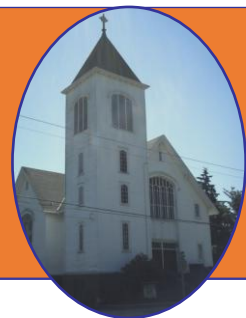

Pastor's Page

***"Fear the LORD, you His saints, for those who fear Him lack nothing!
Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the LORD delivers him out of them all."***

Psalm 34:9, 19

Some say that Psalm 34 is a crazy psalm. Why is that? There are two reasons. The first reason this psalm is a bit crazy is because it is an alphabetic acrostic. That means that each verse of the psalm begins with the letters of the Hebrew alphabet in order. These seem like kindergarten lessons to us.

Apples are for eating
Balloons fly so high
Cats meow softly
Dogs bark at the sky

Many kindergarten classrooms have pictures and poems that help us to learn the alphabet. One of the reasons they seem so elementary is that the primary structure (the alphabet) seems to dominate the flow. What do apples and dogs share thematically?? If you do not know the alphabet the poem seems like nonsense.

That is not the case with Psalm 34. It holds together thematically as David reflects on his perilous flight from Saul and Achish (1 Sam 21) where he feigns madness so that the king will write him off. His flight began with saying goodbye to Jonathan and the flight of arrows scheme. He runs away with nothing causing the priest concern. Why would David have no bread or weapons with him? David gets out of Saul's kingdom thinking he will be safe in a foreign country, but King Achish's advisors suggest that David is a spy planning an attack. Later (1 Sam 27-29), when David has a band of fighters with him, he gets hired as a raider against Achish's enemies. David lets Achish think he has been raiding Israel when he really was raiding other enemies.

So here is more of the crazy. Samuel has anointed David king to replace Saul. Saul has fits of madness that only David can calm by playing and singing psalms to Saul. Saul throws spears at David and tries to kill him. David consistently spares Saul's life. David has been told by the prophet and the king's son that he should be king but he flees the country with nothing. Then he himself feigns madness and writes a psalm about "the One who fears the Lord lacks nothing."

Most people would say David had nothing. He is on the run from Saul and Achish and has to beg for food. David, however, comes up with an entire alphabet of reasons to trust in the deliverance of the Lord.

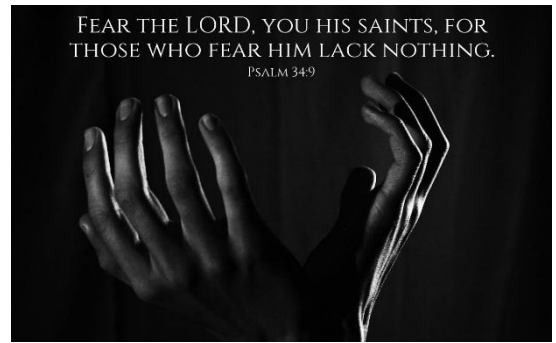
PSALM 34:19

On the ninth Sunday after Pentecost this year the Gradual switches from talking about beautiful feet to the fear of the Lord. We shift a bit from the joy of hearing good news to the reality that there is still a lot of ugly in this world. We need Jesus to strengthen our faith, to see the good, to be the good. David teaches in Psalm 34 that it is better to fear the Lord than to fear man.

The Epistle lessons also take up the last part of the book of Hebrews where we are encouraged not to grow weary but to believe in God and His Mount Zion and the New Testament that unites us to the fire of God. "The Lord is my helper. What can man do to me?" Heb 13:6

My friends, I doubt that your many afflictions can add up to the ones David was facing, yet I pray you will have the same faith that the Lord is our deliverer.

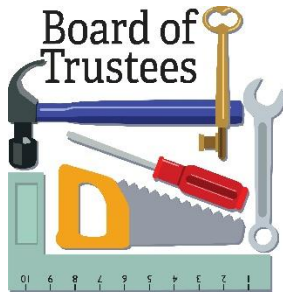

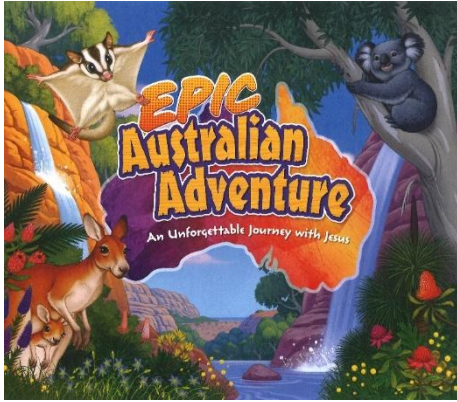

August 2025 ~ LCMS Stewardship Ministry

“Jesus’ transforming presence”

“But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, ‘Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount.’ Jesus said to him, ‘Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost’” (Luke 19:8-10 NIV).

Who knew, all those kids sitting in Sunday school were getting a lesson in stewardship! Generations of children have very often heard lessons based on the familiar account of Zacchaeus. The diminutive tax collector’s curiosity surrounding the person and ministry of Jesus is what the Holy Spirit used to set him on a collision course for a total stewardship transformation. This transformation, according to the text of Luke 19, is not just about this life. This stewardship transformation is about eternity as well!

Remember the story: Zacchaeus was a tax collector. Do not think of friendly neighborhood IRS agents. This was more like a toll booth operator, but the governing authorities did not set the toll. They would contract men to staff roadside booths and tax the commerce that was passing along the road. This was an enterprise full of greed and graft. The tax collectors would take as much as they could and only pass on a portion to the government. The rest did not go into the community chest either! It went into the pocket of the tax collector.

This is why the people had such disdain for *Jewish* tax collectors. They were seen as both crooks and traitors. They were crooks in that they extorted their compatriots and others in the toll process. But worse, they were seen as traitors because their efforts supported the occupying Roman authorities. That is the real reason that the people would not make way so that short Zacchaeus could see Jesus.

For this reason, he runs ahead and climbs a tree. He had heard all the stories. He wanted to see this Jesus with his own eyes. Mercy is on display. This hated

crook and traitor gets a direct audience with Jesus — at Jesus’ own request! Jesus invites Himself to Zacchaeus’ house. This is where the transformation is about to take place!

Notice how Jesus does it. He does not preach a three-week sermon series, nor does He ask Zacchaeus to make a pledge. There is nothing programmatic about Jesus’ approach. But Zacchaeus is completely transformed! The transforming force is the very presence of Jesus! Direct time with Jesus takes a crooked, selfish, criminal and makes him the most faithful steward.

This new life of stewardship is marked by the promises made. First, he gives half of his ill-gotten gains to the poor. These are people whom he would not have defrauded at all! Yet, after spending time with Jesus, they are His first concern. Only after this does he double the requirement of the Levitical law on fraud. And what does Jesus say is the result? Salvation!

Doing the acts of stewardship does not save. Rather, the faith in Jesus that is created by the Holy Spirit is what saves! This is critical for us to confess. Failed stewardship can and will cut you off from God. The only antidote for failed stewardship is the presence of Jesus.

We do not need to run ahead and climb a tree for this presence of Jesus. He makes Himself available to us every week in the Divine Service. He speaks His Word of invitation to us in the pages of Holy Scripture. This, and this alone, transforms us from sinner to saint, from owner to steward of all that belongs to the Lord.

Do you want to become a more faithful steward? Spend more time with Jesus. Make the Divine Service a weekly priority. Feast on Christ’s body and blood weekly! This is the great gift that brings salvation from God’s House to yours!

Mite Explanation and History

Based on the Biblical account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4), the Mite Box is intended for regular contributions of "mites" — offerings above and beyond the support given to congregations and the LCMS. Mite Box contributions amount to millions of dollars that fund district and national [mission grants](#) and implement the LWML program.

[Mite Boxes](#), available from the district, zone, or LWML office, are distributed to every woman in a society, and often to each member of the congregation. Local groups submit Mite Box offerings to the appointed district officer.

The Widow's Mite

Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a fraction of a penny. Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth, but she, out of her poverty, put in everything — all she had to live on" ([Mark 12:41–43](#)).

LWML Mite Boxes

Over the years, many Lutheran Ladies Aid societies used a box to gather funds in support of local and synod ministries. Under the original 1928 Lutheran Women's Missionary Endeavor organizational plan, each woman in every congregation would receive a Mite Box if she participated in the Ladies Aid. Receipts from the 92 Ladies Aid societies totaled \$6651.31 in 1930.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, formally recognized by the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in 1942, required by the newly adopted constitution and bylaws, that 25% of all missionary contributions be given to the national organization, shared from the districts.

At the 1953 convention, delegates reaffirmed the policy of raising funds only through voluntary offerings. Instead of "mite boxes" some societies called their ingathering devices "blessing boxes" or "mission boxes" or "thankoffering boxes." The first Mite Box design had space for districts to imprint local messages. In publications and speeches, Leaguers were reminded not to just tuck their Mite Box away out of sight and then on the day of the meeting take out a dollar bill, put it in an envelope and hand it to the secretary. Among the suggestions offered were:

- Put your pennies in the box at the end of each day
- Say "thank you" with an appropriate amount whenever calamity or misfortune has been averted
- Empty all your loose change from your kitchen coin bowl into the box on meeting day

Throughout the decades, Lutheran women have stepped out in faith, setting goals and trusting God to move the hearts of His people to give generously to LWML to proclaim the Gospel.
