

Pastor's Page

(The following is my message to the eighth grade graduates of Zion Lutheran School, June 13, 2016)

As You Graduate, Remember the Source of the Greatest Knowledge of All

Text: Isaiah 41:10

As you stand before your parents, families, and friends this evening to receive your diploma, the faculty and staff of Zion Lutheran School are making the statement that you are prepared to advance in your studies to attend high school. You are prepared to move ahead not only officially. You are also intellectually prepared because you have been well-taught in the process. Over the course of these years Zion Lutheran School has taught you broadly. You have learned about mathematics, science, reading and writing, literature, art, music, history, how to think critically, and even learned about the birds and the bees! You have also participated in physical education, and for some of you, team athletics.

This training is what we expect Zion Lutheran School to do. We believe that God made the entire world even as He has also made you. Since God made the heavens and the earth and you, together with your own capacity to appreciate His creation, the Bible encourages you to get out there and investigate the things that He has made. Psalm 19:1 says that *"The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament proclaims His handiwork."* I love to encourage learning about God's world! Albert Einstein changed the way every scientist now understands the universe because of his theories of relativity. I want you to understand that Einstein's childhood gave no indication that he would become

perhaps the greatest theoretical scientist in history. When he was a child he was in fact very slow at learning to walk and even talk – so much so that his parents feared that he was not going to develop normally. Yet today almost everyone recognizes the name Einstein, even though it is also true that very few understand his theories. You may be surprised at how Einstein explained his own success, even though he never boasted about it. Einstein said his sense of curiosity, which was far stronger than that of his peers, motivated him to learn about the world. I hope that I keep a sense of curiosity about this world for the rest of my life. And I pray that you too nourish a sense of curiosity. There is no reason for you to ever be bored. There is always something new and interesting to learn!

And yet there is also another means to learn which Zion Lutheran School has also sought to instill in every student. That means of learning is by **revelation**. Revelation is when people speak to each other. We Christians believe the Bible is God's revelation to us in matters pertaining to His will and how we as sinners can have a personal relationship with Him. Now, you will encounter people today who are NOT associated with Zion Lutheran School who believe it is silly to trust in revelation. They feel everything we need to know that is important can be discovered by the tools of scientific investigation (microscopes, telescopes,

computers...). But that notion is false. As Christians we believe that revelation is not silly but rather **necessary**.

Take a moment to imagine what it is about your closest friend that makes him or her most important to you. How would it be if the **only** thing you could know about that person is what you could see or touch, and measure by scales or a ruler? If that were the case, our relationships would be utterly and sadly incomplete. We learn the most important things about others only when we open our ears and **listen** to them.

In the same way, it is by means of the Bible **alone** that we can learn the **most** important things **God** wants us to know. Your chosen graduation verse is an excellent one! Although the knowledge you have gained in your classes is important, the **most important truth** you can know is what this verse says, that God is with you as *your* God, to strengthen you and to uphold you. Trees and stars can't tell you these things. Nor can birds and mountains tell you how much God loves you – which is so much that He sent His Son Jesus into the world for you. These most important truths of all are found in God's revelation to you in the Bible. The most important message I can pass on to you tonight is: in all your studies, keep your hearts rooted in God's revelation, the Bible, where you are reminded of God's on-going love and care for you.

The 66th Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod will be held July 9-14, 2016, in Milwaukee at the Wisconsin Center.

The LCMS national convention affords an opportunity for worship, nurture and inspiration, fellowship, and the communication of vital information.

The convention is the principal legislative assembly, which amends the Constitution and Bylaws, considers and takes action on reports and overtures, and handles appropriate appeals. It establishes general positions and policies of the Synod, provides overall program direction and priorities, and conducts business in order to provide responsible service for and on behalf of its members.

The convention is open to the public, and there will be seating for visitors available in the back of the hall. With large screens in the front of the hall, you will be able to see and hear everything that is happening. You can also visit the many exhibitors in the Exhibit Hall, and you can attend the opening worship and some of the evening events.

Convention visitors do not need to register. Registration is needed only if you have an official role or responsibility at convention.





Reconciliation – Peacemaking Message

Giving Up Ground?

When people share the same goal or purpose, shouldn't it bring about a positive outcome? Actually, it depends on a few factors like: *what is the goal? Why do they share it? Are they on the same side – or do they oppose each other?*

The book of Genesis records an occasion when a shared goal led to conflict. Abram and Lot’s herdsmen had something in common: the need for good pastureland. Since the land could no longer support the needs of their ever-increasing flocks, a resolution was needed to this very practical problem.

Abram’s response offered a solution and averted lingering contention between the two parties: ***“Let’s not have any quarreling between you and me, or between your herders and mine, for we are close relatives. Is not the whole land before you? Let’s part company. If you go to the left, I’ll go to the right; if you go to the right, I’ll go to the left,”*** (Genesis 13:8-9, NIV).

While some may view Abram’s concession as a sign of weakness, I see it as a sign of his unshakable faith. Abram lived with the confidence that, no matter what the outcome, God was going to take care of him. He valued his relationship with his nephew above his material possessions, and God greatly rewarded his selflessness with this promise: ***“Look around from where you are, to the north and south, to the east and west. All the land that you see I will give to you and your offspring forever,”*** (Genesis 13:14-15, NIV).

Final Thoughts...

As I think of Abram, I can’t help but wonder if sometimes we gain more ground by giving up just a little. Oh, there will be times when we need to stand our ground – no doubt! But, there are also times when we need to seek common ground through compromise, trusting that God ultimately has our best interest at heart.

Some situations are complex, and it’s tough to know when to make concessions. Yet, as we go to our Father and seek His wisdom, then check our own heart and motives, the Spirit of God can help us discern on which occasions we need to hold the line and which ones we can concede some ground. The journey to peace with our fellow man is filled with tough choices. Thankfully, we don’t have to go it alone! *Walk the path.*



LCMS Stewardship Article July 2016

In our Lord's parable of the vineyard workers, the vineyard owner says to those who worked the longest, "Or do you begrudge my generosity?" (Matthew 20:15)? It's an unfortunate translation. It's not wrong, but it doesn't give us the full picture. What the vineyard owner actually says is this: "Or is your eye evil because I am good?" Earlier in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus said, "The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness" (Matthew 6:21-23).

This statement comes right in the middle of our Lord's teaching about giving. He said, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness! No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money" (Matthew 6:19-24).

Having an evil eye does not let in the light. Having an evil eye means that we are so focused on what we don't have, that we

are unable to rejoice in what God has given. An evil eye makes us distressed when we see others prosper. It makes us rejoice when others suffer. An evil eye makes us so love ourselves and our money, that we don't want to share with others; we don't want to give of what we have because we are so focused on keeping what we have and getting what we don't.

Whereas a good eye is an eye that lets the light in so that our lives are filled with it. This light shines upon all that we have and reveals that it comes from our Father's divine goodness and mercy. A good eye that lets in the light, unencumbered by the darkness, so that we have a good will, a benevolent disposition, and a genuine happiness to see others prosper and the desire to be part of it.

Jesus came to give you a good eye and to take away the darkness that fills your life. Christ our Lord, through His death and resurrection, has forgiven your sin, removed your evil eye and given you new eyes that let in His light and truth. "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

The reality is that you have all that you need and more. You have the love of God in Christ Jesus. You have the forgiveness of sins and life everlasting. You have house and home, all that you need for this body and life. So, lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy. And you will see that your hearts will follow, just as Jesus promised.

LWML News

LWML Mite Explanation and History

Based on the Biblical account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1-4), the mite box is intended for regular contributions of "mites" - offerings above and beyond the support given to congregations and the LCMS. Mite Box contributions amount to millions of dollars that fund district and national mission grants and implement the LWML program.



The Widow's Mite

Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a fraction of a penny. Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth, but she, out of her poverty, put in everything - all she had to live on" (Mark 12:41-43).

LWML Mite Boxes

Over the years, many Lutheran Ladies Aid societies used a box to gather funds in support of local and synod ministries. Under the original 1928 Lutheran Women's Missionary Endeavor organizational plan, each woman in every congregation would receive a Mite Box if she participated in the Ladies Aid. Receipts from the 92 Ladies Aid societies totaled \$6651.31 in 1930.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, formally recognized by the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in 1942, required by the newly adopted constitution and bylaws, that 25% of all missionary contributions be given to the national organization, shared from the districts.

Throughout the decades, Lutheran women have stepped out in faith, setting goals and trusting God to move the hearts of His people to give generously to LWML to proclaim the Gospel.

Times and Mite Boxes Change



Mite boxes have changed in color and design over the years, but what has never changed is the dedication of freely given offerings for the purpose

of reaching out to others with the Good News of Jesus Christ. Districts still retain 75% of mite offerings for the work of the LWML at that level. National mites fund over \$1 million in mission grants.
