Begin the New Year Embracing a New You!

"You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness." Ephesians 4:22-24 NIV



Perhaps you will find a supply of grace within yourself to share with those who deserve none. Just as you who are undeserving have received grace from the crucified Jesus.

And finally, begin the year with the attitude of being fully forgiven of all of your wrong doings, all of your sins, by God. Hold your head high, the King of the Universe loves you, has forgiven you, and will give you the strength and courage you need to live a different life, filled with righteousness, mercy, grace and hope. All qualities of a person seeking holiness, seeking to live a more holy life. That part of Jesus found through the Holy Spirit, imparted to you in your baptism, will draw you nearer to him as he continues to shine his holiness in and through you. Have a blessed New Year, and may the Lord continue to make you a 'new creation' in this new life you have in him.


February Newsletter Article Deadline


January kitchen duty is Becky Harvey.

Anniversary News

Happy 2024! The coming year will be a very special one for Zion Lutheran Church as we celebrate 175 years as a congregation and 50 years since the construction and dedication of the sanctuary and administrative offices.

On June 10, 1849, the constitution of the German Evangelical Protestant Congregation of St. Marys was adopted. A band of rugged German immigrants assembled to

organize their own church to meet their spiritual needs, with 50 men signing the constitution. Undoubtedly, the founders of the church were among the pioneers attracted to the community by the opportunities created with the construction of the Miami & Erie Canal.

The first house of worship was known as the Rooster Church because of the distinctive finial or weathervane on the spire. NO pictures of this structure are known to exist. It stood at the intersection of Perry and High Street.

On February 14, 1864, a split occurred in the congregation following the adoption of a constitution to apply for membership into the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States. Our congregation reorganized as the "German Evangelical Lutheran Church", while those who did not support the decision and did not sign the constitution went on to found the St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed Congregation.

The two congregations continued to worship in the same church for a while, but then the newly formed German Evangelical Lutheran Church worshipped in the old Baptist church until 1874. A new church was erected and dedicated on the large lot that was acquired in 1866 and is where we worship today. The wood church was 50 feet long and 30 feet wide. The height of the graceful steeple tipped by a fine cross was 92 feet. The church was dedicated 25 years after the church's organization. This church was located where the current bell tower stands. By 1906, the congregation had grown so that the need for a new church was apparent. A cornerstone was laid for a new church in 1907. As preparations for the new church were being completed, the wood church was moved to High Street. Later the church was moved to North Front Street and remains as a private residence.

The new brick church was dedicated on August 9, 1908, having been constructed at a cost of \$22,000. The Tudor style church was of solid brick, 50' x 75', in a cruciform shape. Interior details included a magnificent high alter in white and gold, with statue of Christ and two adoring angels, the beautiful pulpit, the art-glass windows and fresco decorations. The high alter is currently in the Chapel. The new house of worship included Sunday school class rooms, and a room for society meetings. At the time of dedication, the first service was conducted in German and then in English for the two additional services that day.

During the planning for the congregation's 1948 centennial, a \$50,000 goal was adopted for the Church Building Fund. This effort became the seed for the construction of the Zion Lutheran Educational Building, dedicated in 1956, and the planning and construction of our current sanctuary/administration facilities, dedicated in 1974.

The 1908 brick church was razed in 1974 for the construction of the current main sanctuary. Zion will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the sanctuary on April 7, 2024.

Our congregation has had several names. In 1870, the congregation voted to incorporate as the German Evangelical Zion's Lutheran Congregation. In 1921, the church's constitution established the name of Zion Evangelical Lutheran, a name retained to the present.

You are encouraged to attend and participate in the numerous events and celebrations being planned this year to celebrate our congregation's 175 years of teaching, preaching and sharing the Gospel as well as the 50th anniversary of our sanctuary.





Three Powerful Prayers

Amy Carmichael (1867-1951), an Irish Protestant missionary, served in India for 55 years. Much of her work was with children, especially rescuing them from sexual slavery. Carmichael wrote 35 books and many articles about her mission work. The Church of England remembers her on January 18, the anniversary of her death.

The following brief but powerful prayers are attributed to Carmichael:

- May thy grace, O Lord, make that possible to me which seems impossible to me by nature.
- Holy Spirit, think through me, till your ideas are my ideas.
- God, hold us to that which drew us first, when the cross was the attraction, and we wanted nothing else.

Predictions for the New Year
